Interesting Stories from Various Cities

San Francisco.—Headed by United States District Attorney McNab, state and municipal authorities today combined with federal officials to inaugurate a determined campaign to root out "highbinder lawlessness" in California. Scores of lives have been snuffed out during long wars in San Francisco alone. The plan of the authorities is to deport "hatchet" men as fast as they are apprehended and convicted on the grounds that they have violated their oath of citizenship by carrying concealed weapons.

Washington.—Fifty "100 per cent boys" were in the national capital today. They came from San Francisco and were joined here by a Washington lad who is 100 per cent good. The boys are picked for their ability as musicians, athletes and students and for their moral character. They are in charge of Major Sidney S. Peixoto, of the Columbia Park Boys' club.

Philadelphia.—Meeting in a triangular contest today, teams representing Cornell, Columbia and Pennsylvania universities today debated the question: "Resolved, That American second class cities should adopt the commission form of government."

Washington.—Formal hearing was granted by the senate territorial committee today on the Chamberlain and Jones bills empowering the president to build railroads in Alaska. Senator Pittman of Nevada, chairman of the committee, today laid before his colleagues a big pile of data, representing the opinions of engineers as to the advisability of constructing the proposed Alaskan roads with machinery now at Panama. It was reported that a majority of the committee favor the bill.

London.—Flaks are flying on all government buildings today in honor of the sixteenth birthday of Princess Mary, only daughter and third child of King George and Queen Mary. Artillery salutes were fired in St. James Park and at Windsor Castle.

Washington.—Veteran legislators recalled today that fifteen years ago the 25th of April was the formal opening of the Spanish American war, Spain having formally declared war against the United States on the 24th. This country was notified April 25, 1898.

Washington.—A new plan of governmental cooperation with teachers of the country was started today by the geological survey. It has been determined to give special rates to

schools on topographic maps of the country. For \$3 the survey hereafter will sell any teacher 50 different topographic maps, making the selection of the territory in which school is located and adjacent counties. The price quoted barely covers the cost of printing and paper. Commercial maps for the same sections often cost \$2 and \$3 a piece.

Washington.—The entry list for the National Capital Horse Show which will be held here early in May was announced today. The list shows a record entry including many of the best show horses of the United States. The meeting is to be a four day affair. Seventy-four events are on the program. Some of the most prominent members of social and official life at the National Capital have engaged boxes. Many boxes have been reserved for Baltimoreans, Philadelphians, New Yorkers, Richmond, Va., horse lovers and society people from St. Louis and Chicago.

San Francisco.—More than 6,000,000 applications for concession privileges have been received up to date by Frank L. Burt, director of concessions of the Panama Pacific exposition. Only 31 contracts have been granted.

S. S. CONVENTION CLOSSES AT BAKER

Baker, Ore., April 25.—With words of "Godspeed" and vowing that they have never enjoyed a convention visit so much as the one just passed into Baker history, many of the delegates to the Oregon State Sunday School association convention left for their homes last evening and today. After the song service and the reports of the various committees at last evening's session, William A. Brown gave the last of a series of addresses during the convention. His topic was "Five Ways of Working." He talked for Sunday school expansion and efficiency and better organization. He said in part: "The worst person in my mind is the one who has the greatest opportunity to do good, and does not improve his chances. He is even worse than the professional criminal who knows no good."

Rev. Dickson, the Indian delegate from the Umatillas, criticized the methods of the whites in their dealings with the Indians, saying: "In the early days a part of my people walked to St. Louis to learn something about the Bible. They were unable to be enlightened. They were thrown in contact with the worst scums of civilization and came back very much disgusted."

There were 258 delegates registered at the close of the books last evening and of that number, 88 were Presbyterians, this denomination being predominant.

La Grande, Ore., April 25.—A convention that will bring in the neighborhood of 300 people to La Grande in 1914, has been swung to this city at the business meeting of the annual Eastern Oregon division of the state Sunday school association. The meeting is just now coming to a close in Baker.

La Grande was chosen without serious opposition. In addition to bringing Eastern Oregon people here, the publicity given the convention among Eastern states is material and commercial club circles will be given a material lift in advertising the city next year through this convention.

The local commercial club, the Union county Sunday school association and the La Grande ministerial association sent warm invitation to Baker, and with La Grande people on the scene to care for the movement, La Grande won hands down.

WORLD CONFERENCE HELD IN PORTLAND

The executive committee of the National Reform association, which is arranging for the second World's Christian Citizenship conference, Portland, Oregon, June 29 to July 6, 1913, reports a rapidly developing interest in this world assembly. Already the interest is such as to make necessary the holding of simultaneous sectional conferences the forenoon of each day. Ten such conferences have to date been decided upon, on the following themes: The Family, (including marriage and divorce), Mormonism, Social Purity, Intemperance, Prison Reform, Capital-Labor, Immigration and Emigration, Peace, the Sabbath, Christianity and Public Education. At least two, possibly three or four, such conferences are to be held each day. Governor West of Oregon is to be in charge of the conference on Prison Reform, Dr. Thomas Addison of San Francisco in charge of that on Capital and Labor, Dr. Thomas W. Cochran of Philadelphia in charge of that on Public Education, Dr. S. A. Stewart of Seattle in charge of that on Social Purity, Bishop Charles Scadding of Portland in charge of that on Intemperance. Others, specially qualified, have been chosen to have in charge the other conferences.

Addresses on subjects of public interest with which government is constantly dealing will be given each afternoon and evening in the auditorium by eminent speakers from this and other countries. Those listed to speak from abroad are Dr. Robert J. (Catch-my-Pal) Patterson, Belfast, Ireland; Dr. John Lamond of Edinburgh, Scotland; Dr. Charles Merle d'Aubigne of Paris, France; Prof. Theophil Mann of Germany; Prof. F. De Rougemont of Switzerland; Prof. Signor Davide Posio of Rome, Italy; Dr. Armenag Halazian of Turkey; Ng Poon Chew of China; a-J. Drs. K. Ibuka and S. Motoda of Tokio, Japan. Among the Canadian speakers are Dr. T. Albert Moore and Editor James A. Macdonald of Toronto. Heading the list of speakers in this country are President Woodrow Wilson and Ex. United States Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks. A total of fifty or more speakers are listed for addresses. Christian, moral reform and patriotic organizations generally are appointing delegates to attend the conference. Thousands have already been appointed and the number is being constantly increased.

Commissions are being appointed specially to investigate and report on each of the above named topics or themes from the sectional conferences. These reports are to be prepared from a world viewpoint and are expected to suggest world remedies.

"Daring and reckless ball players sometimes take chances," said Dr. Langford.

"Kept up to a high pitch by the shouts of the crowd, a player will sometimes lead off in foolhardy fashion and trust to luck that the pitcher will not see him trying to steal a base. He knows that he is risking the loss of the game. In spite of this he runs and is put out by an accurately thrown ball."

"Such playing is not considered good baseball. The good player is not the man who takes a chance. He will not allow himself to be caught in a situation which will in all probability spell defeat. The man who sins is taking chances in the Great Game of Life. He will go down in history as the man who threw the game away. A man is taking chances who makes light of the advice of seasoned players."

"Paul the Apostle was an old, seasoned player of the first Christian century. No one ever played the game of life better than he. No one ever loosened the Devil's grip on the pennant in better fashion than he. Paul was a pennant winner in his class."

"You cannot carouse and be what you ought to be, either as a base runner, a runner for a commercial house or a runner on the iron rail."

"A player is taking chances who hesitates in getting to a base. A base is to a player what a storm cellar is to a Kansan. To go to sleep away from one's base is about as risky as sleeping in the cab of an engine."
