BEARS MAKE IT 5 OUT OF 6

Big Crowd of Fans from Pendleton Go to Game in Special Train and by Autos—Krause Goes to Pieces in Fourth and Is Yanked for McGarrigle—Bears Bat Hard.

Walla Walla, Wash., April 28.—(Special).—Walla Walla made it five out of six by taking yesterday's game from the Pendleton Buckaroos by a 9 to 1 score. It was the only game of the week that was a one-sided affair, the only one which was won and lost without the element of luck figuring

and neither the large crowd of Walla Walla fans nor the 159 Pendleton people who came over on a special train and by auto appreciated the game.

Tiny Leonard was invincible yesterday, allowing but one hit to the Bucks after the second inning. His support was ragged, but the errors generally came at a time when they were not costly.

Pendleton again entered the game in a weakened condition. Lodell, who hurt his knees in the Saturday game, was unable to play and Berger was again called to do the Hal Chase stunt. Cowan had not recovered from the effects of the beating he received Saturday and Bladen filled his position in the outfield.

Krause started the game for the visitors and was going good until the fourth, when he lost the plate. With the bases full, he walked two runs across the plate and was then yanked for McGarrigle. Before this pitcher got warmed up, two more runs were put across in that inning.

The Bears did heavier stickwork than in any game of the week, Harmon, Lundstrum and Davis each got three safe ones apiece.

La Grande will open here tomorrow afternoon and Kelly will probably do slab duty.

Walla Walla, Wash., April 28.—

When the smoke of the battle cleared away Saturday afternoon in the first of the eighth, the Pendleton Bucks had socked their spurs into the home cushion four times, had hog tied the Angola of one Snoddy to their bench, and incidentally bagged their first game of the week. Score 6-5.

It was some ball game. We will give last year's felt boots to the baseball nut that can figure how any team can win a game and break into the error column 8 times. But they did it. They simply tossed the pill around and juggled it like a bunch of school boys, but it was down on the boards for them to win and they won.

Gather the Game.

The Bucks put the game away in the eighth when they bunched their hits, a thing that they failed to do in the previous four games. Bobby Davis was largely responsible for setting the gasoline on fire, however, and the balloon soon filled and went sailing away, even as the sparks fly upwards. Bobby let Rader's ground, er set away. Varian took a walk when Snoddy missed the rubber on four wide ones. Berger followed with a two base clout and Haworth followed with a two base clout, and, well, Cap Brown and August Bade got their beans together in the doghouse and Kelly was rushed to the hill, Snoddy retiring. Kelly was wearing a flashy pair of socks, however and Ump Storkell waived him to the shade. (See rule 23.)

McKune found the sphere for a hit through the infield and two runners spiked the pan.
