TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

Tampa, April 29.—E. F. Andrews, under sentence of death for murder escaped and his wife is held in jail from which he fled, charged with furnishing him with the saw which released him. Mrs. Andrews was admitted to the jail to visit her husband during religious services. Andrews sawed out of the cell in "murderer's row" and then through the barred outer window into the jail yard. He scaled the prison wall without arousing the guard.

Jefferson City, Mo., April 29.—The supreme court issued an injunction restraining 182 fire insurance companies from terminating contracts now in force. The court did not restrain the companies from ceasing to write new business in the state.

Deadwood, S. D., April 29.—Evidence is being procured by government and state officials to present to the federal grand jury which will meet there next month against several persons who are alleged to have been guilty of criminal negligence in connection with the recent forest fires in southern Black Hills that caused heavy loss to both the federal government and the state.

Washington, April 29.—In a decision of momentous importance, especially as to railroads, the supreme court laid down the general principle that a creditor of a corporation, not a party to its re-organization, may hold its successor for its debt.

Logansport, Ind., April 29.—Mrs. Nellie Paugh, 36 years old, threw her two sons, Donald 12 and Delbert, 6, from a bridge into the stream. The mother and the younger boy were drowned, but Donald swam ashore. Before throwing the boys off the bridge, the mother told them she was doing it because no one loved them.

Boise, Idaho, April 29.—The Hotel Van Wyck in the village of Van Wyck 100 miles north of here, in an isolated section was destroyed by fire of unknown origin Sunday night. A number of guests escaped in their night clothes, but no one was injured. Loss \$4000, partly insured.

Amherst Mass., April 29.—Former President William Howard Taft, now Kent professor at Yale, has been engaged to deliver the Henry Ward Beecher lectures for the next college year in the department of political science at Amherst college. Mr. Taft will give two public lectures and will speak at two student conferences.

Ottawa, Ont., April 29.—An earthquake shock was felt here yesterday. Houses were badly shaken but no one was killed or injured, according to reports. The dome of the dominion observatory collapsed during the shock, destroying apparatus valued at about \$100,000.

Peking, April 29.—The rupture is widening between the Chinese cabinet and the senate regarding the loan of \$125,000,000 to be loaned by Great Britain, France, Germany Russia and Japan. The ministers refused to appear before the legislature to explain the signatures of the contract for the loan pleading that they were ill.

San Francisco, April 29.—Of the six convicts brought from San Quentin penitentiary to testify at the police graft inquiry being conducted by the grand jury, Michael Gallo told a most comprehensive story last night in which the names of the eight police officials under suspension were mentioned freely.

New York, April 29.—Ten thousand peddlers plan to parade with their wives and children to the city hall on Wednesday, should the board of aldermen pass a pending ordinance to banish push carts from the streets and place them under approaches to East river bridge. Indications are that the measure will pass. The parade agreed on at a meeting of the United States citizens peddlers association would be in the nature of a protest and an appeal to Mayor Gaynor to withhold his signature from the measure.

ONLY GRAPE JUICE TO GRACE BRYAN'S TABLE

Sacramento, Cal., April 29.—The grape juice served at Secretary of State Bryan's initial banquet to the foreign diplomatic corps at Washington was not an experiment, according to Secretary Bryan. It was a precedent and for the next four years, or as long as Mr. Bryan shall continue as periodical host to the ambassadors, grape juice in its simplest form will be the only beverage at state dinners. Secretary Bryan smiled when asked concerning the innovation.

"I do not consider it necessary to make a defense of my actions as host to the ambassadors," he said, "and I will not devote any time to answering the criticisms of those who do not agree with me. The incident is closed and the custom may be considered as established. When I became secretary of state at President Wilson's request, I told Mr. Wilson that I would not furnish wine at official banquets unless he directed me to do so. He told me to do as I saw fit, and we had a thorough understanding before I ventured to make the change."

MILITANTS ATTEMPT TO ADDRESS CROWD; ARRESTED

London, April 29.—Militants attempted to address a crowd in Hyde Park today while the king was reviewing the guards brigade. Jeers of the mob almost broke up the review but the women refused to quit. They were arrested.

SHEEP SHEARING GOES ON AT ECHO

(Special Correspondence.) Echo, Ore., April 29.—The Jake Wattenburger sheep shearing plant now operating at the Lidsey place, three miles west of Echo, will finish their run here in about a week. They are operating twenty-four machines with a full crew and shear from 2500 to 3000 head of sheep a day. The wool is being hauled to the scouring plant and warehouses here as fast as sheared. The plant is a portable one and will be moved with the crew to Huntington, as soon as the run here is completed.

The Echo ball team, accompanied by many able-bodied rooters, journeyed to Hermiston yesterday where they met defeat at the hands of that team. Umatilla played Stanford at that place and were likewise defeated. All four teams in the Irrigation League have now played three games, of which
