Graceful Draperies.

The touch of the Oriental that is noticed in the spring styles requires that a fabric be used which lends itself readily to graceful drapery. One particularly adaptable material is etamine, which is more popular this spring than it has been for several seasons. The robes of hand drawn etamine are truly beautiful. The drawn-work appears in bands of graduated widths forming a very handsome border for the robe. A narrow band of drawn-work is done along the opposite edge of the material to be used for the smaller trimmings. These etamines come in all the vivid shades that are to be so much used.

Among the silks, fleur de sole, a new form of taffeta with an extremely soft finish, falls in the most graceful lines. It comes in very new and unusual tones, in both plain and figured surfaces. The floral designs that appear on many of these new silks seem somewhat stiff at first sight, but one soon realizes how very well suited they are to the period costumes so affected by our best gowned women. Some of the new patterns now in vogue are exact copies of some of those used in France at the time of the empire.

Children's Coats.

Naturally the successful styles that have been launched in women's fashions have been represented in children's styles. The separate coats have reflected some of the noticeable features and the wise mother is the one who can modify and simplify the youth and figure of her little daughter.

The smartest coats are made in serge whipcords, velvet, heavy corded silks and broadcloths. Nearly all show sashes of satin or wide belts. Buttons are used to trim them, and all the novelties that have appeared in buttons for mothers' dress are reproduced in smaller size for little daughter.

Oval forms predominate. Enamel, bone, wood and glass buttons afford important decorative notes for little coats.

Braid gives a jaunty, military touch in straight lines across the front and forms epaulets on the shoulders. The silk mohair and soutache braids are favored.

A Word About Layettes.

All the best layettes consist of simple garments made entirely by hand. The expectant mother who knows how to do neat sewing may prepare for her baby a layette good enough for a prince and of the same materials as would be used for any little royal highness. The fabrics chosen for little slips and dresses are fine, sheer linen or cotton weave. Where considerable dainty hand embroidery is

to be used linen would best be chosen, as it is durable enough to make the work worth while. It has the advantage of also keeping perfectly white after much laundering and irons smooth without starch. Lawn, either linen or cotton, in fine qualities, sheer muslin and French batiste are preferred for making the baby's dresses and petticoats.

Very narrow Valenciennes edgings in the smallest, neatest patterns are used to finish sleeves and the neck. Laces and embroideries are sparingly used, excepting when made by hand. Feather stitching is a favorite decoration for seams and hems. Eyelet holes are worked about the neck and sleeves to carry baby ribbon. This is necessary to adjust the garment to the very young infant. The layette, of course, is made to fit the child when he is from 6 to 9 months or until he puts on short clothes. They are, therefore, cut too large for the new born infant and are adjusted to the neck and arms by ribbon.

The favorite finish for outside edges is the small hand embroidered scallop, and there is quite a fad at present for pale pink and blue embroidered floss in finishing the little garments. Tiny feather stitched tucks are very pretty, worked in either of these colors. Only white floss is used where considerable embroidery is done on the dress.

Useful Apron.

When cutting out a sewing apron (that will reach a little below the knee) cut a strip about ten inches wide and place across the bottom, finishing off the bottom edge with the apron. Then stitch up and down through the center, forming two compartments or pockets. When doing hand work place all accessories, such as thread, scissors, wax, buttons, etc., in the pockets and they will not fall to the floor, but will be at hand when wanted.

FULL TEXT OF ANTI-ALIEN LAW

Sacramento, May 1.—The substitute anti-alien bill, prepared by Attorney General U. S. Webb, at the request of Governor Johnson and other progressives, follows:

"Section 1.—All aliens eligible to citizenship under the laws of the United States may acquire, possess, enjoy, transmit and inherit real property, or any interest therein, in this state, in the same manner and to the same extent as citizens of the United States, except as otherwise provided by the laws of this state.

"Section 2.—All aliens other than those mentioned in section 1 of this act may acquire, possess, enjoy and transfer real property or any interest therein in this state, in the manner and to the extent and for the purposes prescribed by any treaty now existing between the government of the United States and the nation or country of which such alien is a citizen or subject, and not otherwise.

Rights of Foreign Corporations.

"Section 3.—Any company, association or corporation organized under the laws of this state or any other state or nation, of which a majority of the members are aliens other than those specified in Section 1 of this act or in which a majority of the issued capital stock is owned by such aliens, may acquire, possess, enjoy and convey real property or any interest therein, in this state in the manner and to the extent and for purposes prescribed by any treaty now existing between the government of the United States and the nation or country of which such members or stockholders are citizens or subjects, and not otherwise.

"Section 4.—Whenever it appears to the court in any probate proceeding that by reason of the provisions of this act any heir or devisee cannot take real property in this state which, but for said provisions, said heir or devisee would take such real property to such heir or devisee, shall order a sale of said real property to be made in the manner provided by law for probate sales of real property, and the proceeds of such sale shall be distributed to such heir or devisee in lieu of such real property.

Forfeited to the State.

"Section 5.—Any real property hereafter acquired in fee in violation of the provisions of this act by an alien mentioned in section 2 of this act or by any company, association or corporation mentioned in section 3 of this act, shall escheat to and become and remain the property of the state of California. The attorney general shall institute proceedings to have the escheat of such real property adjudged and enforced in the manner provided by section 474 of the political code and title right, part 3 of the code of civil procedure. Upon the entry of final judgment in such proceedings the title to such real property shall pass to the state of California. The provisions of this section and of sections 2 and 3 of this act shall not apply to any real property heretofore acquired in the enforcement or in satisfaction of any lien now existing upon or interest in such property, so long as such real property so acquired shall remain the property of the alien company, association or corporation acquiring the same in such manner.

In Matter of Leasehold.

"Section 6.—Any leasehold or other interest in real property, less than the

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fee, hereafter acquired in violation of the provisions of this act by any alien mentioned in section 2 of this act, or by any company, association or corporation mentioned in section 3 of this act shall escheat to the state of California. The attorney general shall institute proceedings to have such escheat adjudged and enforced as provided in section 5 of this act. In such proceedings the court shall determine and adjudge the value of such leasehold or other interest in such real property, and enter judgment for the state in the amount thereof, together with costs. Thereupon the court shall order a sale of the real property covered by such leasehold or other interest in the manner provided by section 1271 of the code of civil procedure. Out of the proceeds arising from such sale the amount of the judgment rendered for the state shall be paid into the state treasury, and the balance shall be deposited with and distributed by the court in accordance with the interest of the parties therein.

"Section 7.—Nothing in this act shall be considered as a limitation upon the power of the state to enact laws with respect to the acquisition, holding or disposal by aliens of real property in this state.

"Section 8.—All acts and parts of acts inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed."

Interesting Stories from Various Cities

New York.—War—grim war to the death—is on today throughout the length and breadth of the nation. In every large city and many of the smaller ones the slaughter is on. It began today at sunrise for that was the time set for the first official swat of the Demon Housefly by concerted action on the part of every American Boy Scout organization in the country. War was declared weeks ago. Heads of the branches in every city, following orders from the national headquarters here, assigned to every Boy Scout a section or beat and armed with fly swatter and cards of instructions on the best way to swat the fly a house to house canvass has started. Orders issued today from national headquarters here were for the Boy Scouts to visit every home; every shop or place of business where flies "congregate" and every barnyard to spread destruction to the fly and information on how to prevent fly breeding to householders. No quarter will be shown, and the campaign will be carried on on the same lines if it takes all summer, according to information from headquarters.

Indianapolis.—Optimism as to ultimate success of woman suffrage in the state and throughout the union characterized the opening today of the second annual convention of the Women's Franchise league of Indiana, which is the youngest of all state organizations fighting for the vote for women. Practical politics was the subject matter of today's speeches. The convention closes Saturday.

Cleveland.—With no opposition from the contractors, the 5-cents an hour increase in pay for carpenters of Cleveland went into effect today.

Louisville, Ky.—The quarantine on Kentucky sheep, in effect for more than two years, was lifted today by a decision of the Kentucky Live Stock Sanitary Board. The quarantine was induced by the discovery of scabbies among sheep in Kentucky. It is estimated that the sheep industry of the state amounts to \$5,000,000 business yearly.

Ottawa.—Canadian steamers today began handling all mail between Canada and Great Britain. A large part of the mail formerly went by way of New York.

New York.—Socialist organizations today turned out in force for the annual May Day demonstration and conference. Up to the last minute it was expected that a separate parade and conference would be held by the

Industrial Workers of the World. At the conference telegrams were read from affiliated organizations throughout the United States and European countries telling of great May Day meetings and demonstrations elsewhere. Today's parade started at 2 o'clock from Labor Temple in East Eighty-fourth street. Another section of the parade started at the same time from Rutgers Square. Eight hour working day resolutions and speeches in a score of languages were on the program for the monster mass meeting in Union Square.

West Palm Beach, Fla.—Prohibitionists all over the country today turned their attention here where the polls are open for voting on whether West Palm Beach shall be wet or dry. Both sides claimed a victory and it is believed a few votes may decide the issue. The campaign has been one of the bitterest in the history of the state.

Pittsburgh.—Because he wasn't paid enough, Rev. William Porkess, assistant rector of the Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church, quit his job today. The church is one of the wealthiest in the city, but vestrymen explained that the debt is so heavy they couldn't see their way clear to increase any salaries just now.

Pittsburg.—Rev. Dr. W. D. McFarland, sixty-year-old minister and educator, sentenced to a year in the county jail, following the death of Miss Elsie Coe, a young stenographer, because of an illegal operation, was released from jail today after serving ten months. Good behavior won the minister his freedom two months before his term was up.

New York.—The new building of the Seamen's Church Institute on which stands the Titanic Memorial

Lighthouse, was open today to the sailors of the seven seas. The late J. P. Morgan contributed \$100,000 toward the building; John D. Rockefeller \$50,000; Henry C. Frick \$25,000, and Andrew Carnegie, James Stillman, Arthur Curtiss James, Mrs. E. H. Harriman, W. K. Vanderbilt, A. G. Vanderbilt and Edmund Baylies, \$10,000 each.

Albany.—Governor Sulzer tonight will act as supreme patron at the twelfth annual ball of Stone Mason's Union, Local No. 74, of New York.

Indianapolis.—The public service corporations of Indiana today passed under the supervision of a new commission of five members which succeeded the smaller railroad commission. The law passed by the legislature gives the new commission strong powers to make rates, provides for municipal ownership of public utilities, and calls for physical valuation of the properties.
