PRINTING EXPERT TO QUIT JOB UNDER WEST

Salem, Ore., May 6.—R. A. Harris, state printing expert, has announced that he will tender his resignation to Governor West in a few months, and engage in business for himself in Portland. The character of the business, he declared, he was not now at liberty to disclose. The appointment of Harris to the position of state printing expert was one of the first official acts of Governor West when he assumed the governor's chair two years ago. The legislature was then in session, and immediately Harris

began the work of having introduced a flat salary law for the state printer. This provoked a fight between him and State Printer Dunway which has raged ever since.

SPAIN MAY UNITE WITH THE TRIPLE ENTENTE

It is said it may mean the entrance of Spain into the friendly understanding known as the triple entente between France, Great Britain and Russia. Alfonso arrives here on Wednesday. After a stay of two days, crowned with innumerable entertainments, the King will leave on Friday, witnessing a review of military armaments and aeroplanes just before his departure.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

Seattle, May 6.—Mrs. Beatrice Simonson, 35 years old was stabbed six times with a four inch knife and probably fatally wounded by Thomas Tellefson, a laborer aged 35, who attacked her in the street because she refused to marry him. Believing that he had killed the woman, Tellefson attempted to cut his throat but was restrained by men from a nearby station who ran to the woman's aid.

London, May 6.—Miss Nina Boyle, who in a speech at the meeting of the actress franchise league last Friday night, said that the British government was composed of "cads and cowards," was arrested last night with Miss Anna Monroe, another militant suffragette, while attempting to hold a meeting in Hyde Park.

Chicago, May 6.—Four members of a bandit gang who charged Policeman William Ohm with having picked out desirable places on his beat for them to rob, pleaded guilty to charges of robbery and received penitentiary sentences.

Ohm is being held in jail awaiting trial on a charge of being a leader of the gang and receiving a share of the proceeds of all robberies.

Cleveland, May 6.—Three deaths from excessive heat were reported yesterday, the hottest May 5, for 42 years. John Kroveck, 48, of St. Louis, was stricken in the union station and died a few hours later, Jacob Behringer was overcome while at work and died later and the infant son of Anton Samrak succumbed to heat prostration.

The official record was 86 degrees, but the Kiosk at the street level showed 96 degrees.

San Francisco, May 6.—Orders from Washington delayed the departure of the United States transport Sherman from this port so that 5,000,000 rounds of artillery and rifle ammunition could be shipped on the steamer to the Philippine Islands.

LITTLE SON OF KING VICTOR IS LOYAL TO THE MONTENEGRINS

Rome.—A valiant champion of Little Montenegro is Prince Humbert, the nine-year-old son of King Victor of Italy. Prince Humbert does not approve at all of his father's attitude toward Montenegro in the Balkan war and learned with dismay that Italy was in thorough accord with the other powers in demanding that the Montenegrins lift the siege of Scutari.

A few days ago Prince Humbert was "playing war" with his sisters in the royal nursery. The king was an amused spectator of the game. Prince Humbert was the Montenegrin leader and he "killed off" all the Turks—his sisters—in the game. Turning to his father, the little prince demanded to be sent to Cetinje.

"Why?" asked the king. The prince thought for a moment and remembered that his mother and grandfather were Montenegrins.

"Well," he replied, "I think you ought to be there fighting, but as you are not, I suppose I ought to go to grandpapa and show him that we are on his side. Why are you not with him?"

"You see Italy is still fighting in Tripoli and I am required here," replied the king.

"But, suppose you were not required here," asked the little critic, "would you go to Montenegro?"

King Victor hesitated and chose his words with care.

"No, I do not think so," he said finally.

Prince Humbert shouldered his toy gun and shook his head.

"I think it is very wrong of you," he said emphatically. "I am going to practice so that I can kill all of grandpapa's enemies. They're all Turks, anyway."

ARIZONA'S ANTI-ALIEN LAW MOST DRASTIC

Phoenix, Ariz., May 6.—To take the place of the unenforced measure enacted a year ago, the lower house of the state legislature passed an anti-alien land ownership bill that is far more drastic than the California legislation on the same subject. The act prohibits any alien, who has not declared intention to become a citizen from acquiring title to real property. Opponents of the bill, who wanted to exempt foreigners who were eligible to citizenship, but did not care to forewear allegiance to their native land, were able to muster only six opposing votes.

The bill was sent to the senate, where early passage is indicated.

KLAMATH TO FATTEN HOGS ON POTATOES

Surplus Stock for Which no Market is Found Finds Use at Home.

Klamath Falls, Ore., May 6.—Ten carloads of Sacramento Valley hogs have been shipped to the Altamont ranch, near this city. The hogs will be fattened on potatoes and will then again be shipped south. The disposition of the surplus potatoes in the Klamath country has become a serious question. If the experiment with the hogs proves a success it is likely that other large shipments will be made. The Altamont ranch has over 40,000 bushels of potatoes on hand which, if not fed to stock, will go to waste. It is estimated that there are close to 100 carloads of potatoes still pitted in the Klamath country.
