BUCKAROOS ENJOY A SPUD FEAST; WIN OPENER FROM LA GRANDE 9-3

By gathering little clusters of hits and hittets off the delivery of Collie Druhot and by taking advantage of costly boots made by said Druhot's teammates, the Buckaroos yesterday afternoon succeeded in salting down the first game of the series against La Grande. Score, Pendleton 9, La Grande 3. Berger was in his old hot-weather form and had the Spuds completely mystified until the later part of the game when, with victory assured, he eased up.

Druhot started off in great style and for four innings looked like a good horse to play. True, Pendleton had put a score across in the second frame, but the responsibility did not rest with the heater. Two errors, one by Nadeau and one by Beck after McKune had hit safely, did it. Thus the game was a one to nothing affair until the fifth when Druhot lost his moorings. After striking out both Cowan and Varian and walking Rader, he shot a slant in the groove at McKune and the manager met the pill with a healthy swing. The ball went into left field for three bases and Rader was across the rubber.

Krause, who had relieved Lodell at first when the big fellow had been fined and benched for beefing at and threatening the umpire, singled through third, scoring his manager. Then Bladen scratched a hit through third and there were two on with Augustus at the bat. The little short-stop put a hot one between first and second which Beck did well to stop. However, he was not content with stopping the ball but insisted on throwing it to first after the runner was safe. He heaved it high and wide and Krause sped across the pan. Berger fled out, ending the inning.

When the first three men up—Dougherty, Cowan and Rader, had hit "ones" in the sixth and one run had been chased in. Manager King, yanked Druhot from the slab and sent him out to relieve Jamieson in the field. Gooch was sent to the firing line with two on bases. Varian hit to third and Corbin threw to second to catch Rader but Naughton muffed the ball and Cowan cantered to the plate, Rader taking third. A sacrifice fly by McKune finished the making of the third tally, after which the side was retired.

A homer in the seventh by Augustus and another in the eighth by Rader finished the scoring for the Buckaroos.

In the seventh the Spuds earned their first marker. Naughton hit safely over second, took second on an infield out and scored when King batted out his second safety of the day. A double play, McKune to Krause, retired the side.

In the ninth, Berger began lobbing the ball over the plate and the visitors did some hitting. With one down, Nadeau who had failed to deliver in a sixth inning pinch, poled out one of his famous two-baggers and Naughton got life when one of Berger's benders connected with his slats. A hit by Peterson into right scored Nadeau and put Naughton on third from which point he was brought home by King's sacrifice fly. Walters came through with a single, but when Gooch laid the ball down to McKune, the game was over.

There was some good ball played during the afternoon but much time was lost between innings and the game was further marred by much ragging at decisions on both sides. Umpire Burnside had a bad day of it but it was not apparent to anyone in the grandstand or bleachers that he was trying to hand a package to either team.

PINCH HITTING WINS FOR BEARS

Walla Walla, Wash., May 7.—With the game apparently won in the fifth inning yesterday, the "Gold-Diggers" could not withstand the Bears on the slab and the Bears won the opener in a ninth rally of Captain Brown's proteges. It was one of the most spectacular exhibitions of the season, being replete with those joyous thrills which are daily captivating Walla Walla fans.

Glittering ball was furnished the small opening crowd until the fifth inning, when the Bears weakened and apparently were at the end of their "lucky streak." With one down, Ward was passed to first, and was advanced to third by Roben's two-bagger, but he failed to score on Herrod's attempted sacrifice. With two out and the bases full, the fans were satisfied, but groans were brought forth when Snoddy passed West and hit Dean scoring Roben. Murphy hit a hot one to Lundstrum who failed to stop it for his first error, and two runs came across.

The Bears could do nothing in their half but earned a run in the sixth, when Snoddy walked, was advanced to second on Taylor's error, sent to third on Harmon's sacrifice, and scored on Childers' pretty single over second base.

Baker could do nothing then against Snoddy's delivery until the ninth, but in the meantime, the Bears were slowly creeping up by steady infield work and consistent hitting. They made another run in the seventh when Lundstrum made first on Taylor's error on a bad throw and took second on the play, later being scored by Davis' single over second. The Bears still persisted and in the eighth sent over two more runs on hits by Snoddy, Johnson and Childers.

One run behind, Baker got busy in their half of the ninth and tied the score when Herrod came home on West's attempted sacrifice which was fumbled by Childers and Lundstrum in an Alphonso-Gaston stunt just behind the pitcher. It should have been Lundstrum's ball, but Childers thought he could field it, with the result that they clashed and all hands were safe.

The agony, however, ended in the last half of the inning, when Martin was hit by a pitched ball, was advanced by Sheely's sacrifice and scored on Brown's neat hit between right and center.

PLAYER STOVALL IS DEPOSED FROM TEAM

Chicago, May 7.—George Stovall, deposed as manager of the St. Louis American League team and indefinitely suspended as a player by B. B. Johnson, president of the league, as a result of Stovall's attack on Umpire Ferguson Saturday, may get permission to play again this season and also may be reinstated in his managerial berth, according to Mr. Johnson.

"The case is not closed," said Mr. Johnson. "Stovall is relieved as manager indefinitely and is suspended indefinitely from playing. He may be allowed to play again and it is possible that he may manage the team again. If he is allowed to play his position again it does not follow that he will be permitted to manage the team."

Johnson Ruling Precedent. The deposition of a manager by the president of the league is said to be the first action of the kind ever taken in a major league.

"I cannot recall any precedent for this step," said Johnson. "I did this myself, according to the powers given me by the league constitution, and without any hesitation. What further action may be taken in the case will wait until I have had time to think it over at more length."

Johnson expressed indignation at Stovall's attack and intimated that more punishment might be in store for the St. Louis player.

LOST MY HEAD, SAYS STOVALL.

Manager of St. Louis Americans Expects Severe Punishment.

St. Louis, May 7.—George Stovall, manager of the St. Louis Americans, who was suspended by President Johnson Sunday for his conduct in the game here Saturday, when he snatched Umpire Ferguson's hat from his head and spat upon his coat, expects a more severe punishment.

Discussing the incident, Stovall said:

"I lost my head. Nothing can be said in defense. I was provoked at what I thought was an unjust ruling. I expect the worst is to come."

School children under 12 years of age will be admitted for 10 cents on the opening day, according to a presidential edict issued today.
