

A Cottolene Strawberry Short Cake

Place on hot plate, tear cakes apart and spread sweetened mashed strawberries between and over the cakes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve at once.

Care of Matting.

Try sewing your new matting with raffia. Dampen and split each strand. This will make a fine seam that will look well on either side. When laying new matting one can prevent ridges and wrinkles if after putting down as smooth as possible, you will wash with a pail of hot water to which a cup of salt has been added. Leave quite wet and in drying the matting will shrink into place. The salt toughens it. Wash with the grain of the matting. Never sweep matting with an uncovered broom as it will split the fiber, but cover the broom with a soft cotton flannel bag and dip in salt water to brighten it.

New Rubbings.

Very narrow frills or plaitings of shadow lace or net are popular this spring. Another simple rubbing is the single fold of fine net headed with a cord in gilt or color. White net folds with a second fancy frill of black are effective, and are by no means limited in their use.

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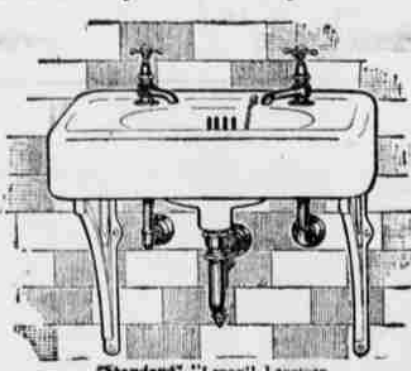
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
