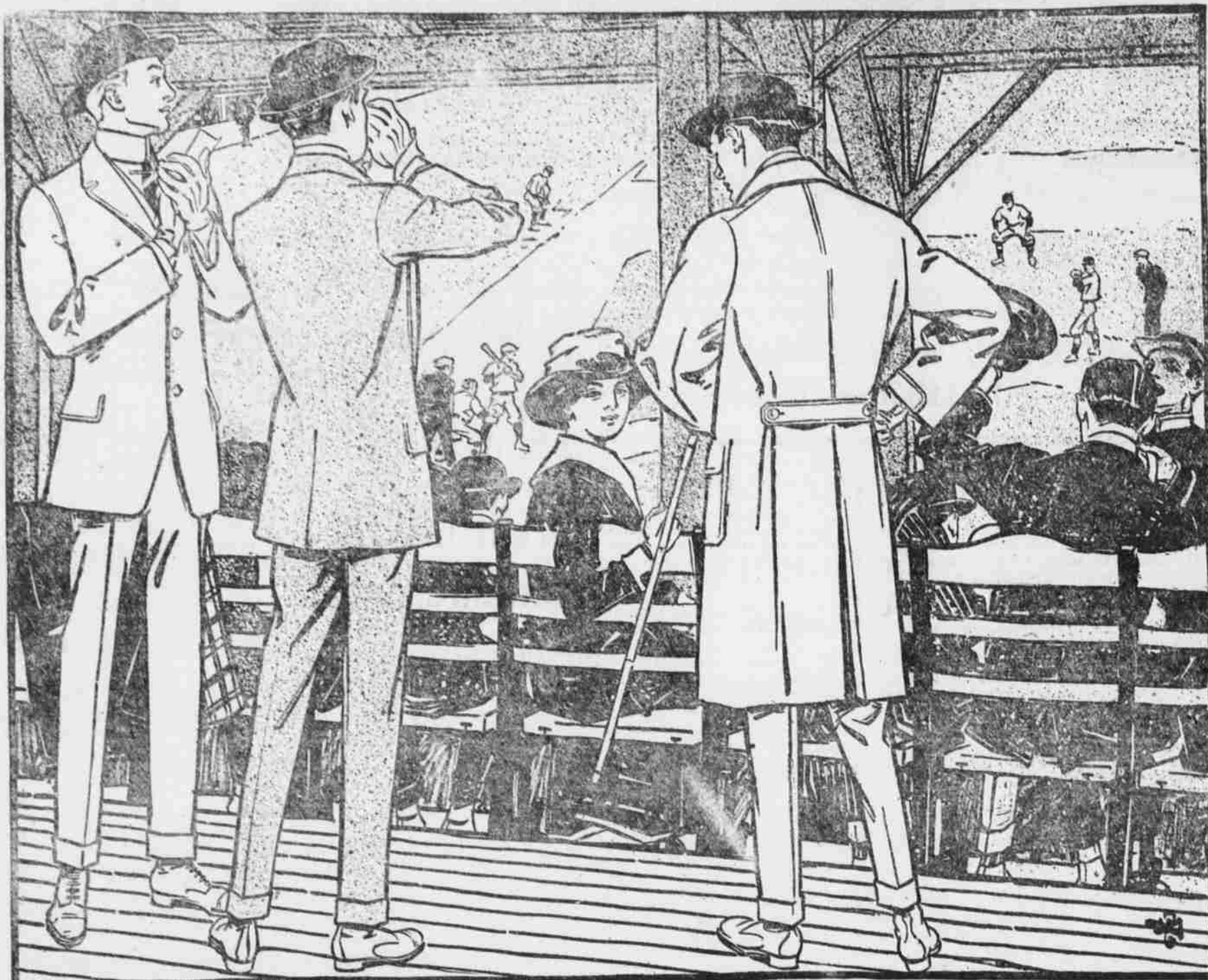

ESCORT BEATEN UP BY GANG OF THUGS

Eugene, Ore., May 8.—A serious affray between a gang of toughs on one side and Hawley Bean of Pendleton and "Bill" Heuser of Portland, University of Oregon students, happened on the banks of the upper mill race Sunday night and Bean has several scalp wounds and Heuser several contusions about the head. Bean says he was struck with a revolver.

The attack came as a culmination of a series of affronts which have offered University men and women during the past few weeks. Revolver shots have been fired over the heads of canoes and into the water close to canoes, and campfires have been scattered.

The students were canoeing, accompanied by University women, according to the story related by Bean, and had camped across the river. As darkness came on, they crossed the river again and landed at the "portage." Bean says that as he was dragging his canoe out of the water, he heard a cry from Heuser from down stream. Bean ran and saw two men starting in the direction of the girls. By the time he reached them some of the men were addressing the girls, using indecent language. Bean attacked the men and Heuser joined him, but the members of the gang overpowered them and knocked Bean down, rendering him unconscious for a few moments. A great gash was cut in his scalp and he spent the next day in the hospital.

When they saw that Bean was seriously hurt the members of the gang ran. Both of the students say that during the fight revolver shots were

fired but they think merely to frighten them.

ILL, PENNILESS, FIGHTS WAY THROUGH COLLEGE

State Oratorical Champion and University Honor Graduate Comes to Eugene Without Financial Resources.
University of Oregon, Eugene, May 8.—Starting for college afire, without money, but seeking an education, David Pickett, of Prineville, came to

the University of Oregon four years ago. This June he will be graduated with honor. He won the oratorical championship of the state last year, and helped Oregon win the debating championship of the coast this year. His education has been earned by daily toil—chopping wood, sweeping halls, and picking up odd jobs whenever he could. He did it all with a frail body, on the verge of sickness much of the time.

Pickett first worked his way through high school in Prineville by serving as janitor at the school. Then his ambition turned toward a higher education and he started on foot for Eugene, 160 miles across mountain and desert. A friend, however, happened to drive to Eugene with a team and the long walk was avoided.

Pickett's freshman year was hard, for sickness, which sent him to the hospital a few days ago in Salt Lake where he had gone with a colleague

to win for Oregon the forensic championship of the northwest, kept him out of college much of the time. He struggled through his freshman year without glory.

His sophomore year was another year of working by day and of cramming late at night upon his studies.

BAKER WILL SOON INSTALL MUNICIPAL LIGHTING PLANT

Baker, Ore., May 8.—By the action of the city commissioners at their session yesterday, it was definitely decided that the city will install its own lighting plant and system. By their votes the people of Baker decided some time ago that it was their wish that such a plant should be owned and operated by the municipality, but the defeat of the water bonds, whereby it was intended to enlarge and extend the water system, left the commissioners in a quandary as to what

course to pursue, fearing that the city did not have sufficient power to operate as large a plant as was needed. This question has been settled however, through the services of a competent engineer, and a resolution was passed yesterday authorizing Mayor Palmer to employ an engineer to prepare estimates as to cost of construction and proceed with the installation of the plant as soon as the bonds are advertised and sold. It is expected that the bond issue will be authorized at the next meeting of the commissioners which will be held next Tuesday.
