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FISHERMEN FIND MRS. ASK ALIVE

Seattle, Wash., May 10.—Almost insane with joy over good news, R. R. Ask, prominent merchant of Skagway, is hastening back to Prince Rupert to join his wife, who was picked up alive on the beach several hours after she had leaped overboard from the steamer Spokane on which she, her husband and her 2-year-old child were coming to Seattle. Reports that she was alive but unconscious were received by wireless as the Spokane steamed into Elliot Bay.

The three boarded the Spokane at Skagway, intending to make a long trip for the benefit of Mrs. Ask's health. She was suffering from nervousness and mild melancholia, brought on by insomnia. After the vessel sailed south from Prince Rupert Tuesday night, Ask remained awake until he was sure his wife was asleep and, after tucking her in, climbed into his own berth. When he awakened Wednesday morning, she was gone.

A hurried search of the vessel assured Captain White that she had jumped overboard some time during the night, and wireless calls were sent out to all land stations and steamships within reach.

Her husband mourned her as dead but 36 hours later he was handed a message telling how fishermen had picked her up alive on the beach near Prince Rupert. How she floated on the rising tide up Granville channel and how many hours she was in the water will never be known unless she can give an account of what happened. It is suggested that she was buoyed up by her clothing, but this does not explain her being alive, for

the water of the straits is icy cold and under ordinary conditions, few people could survive in it for even an hour.

BRAGG IS NAMED FOR LA GRANDE POSTOFFICE

La Grande, Ore., May 10.—County School Superintendent E. E. Bragg has one foot in the private office of the new La Grande postoffice. After weeks of anxiety to democrats and republicans and non-partisans who chafed at the continued suspense in the falling of what is considered one of the choice plums of eastern Oregon, all but the last word was said in favor of the local pedagogue. His name was sent to the senate late last evening, according to advices received here. That the Oregon delegation is agreed on Bragg and that his nomination will be confirmed, follows, and within proper time, G. M. Richley's successor will go into office under the name of E. E. Bragg, true-blue dyed-in-the-wool democrat.

FOSSIL WILL HAVE BIG CELEBRATION OF FOURTH

Fossil, Ore., May 10.—Fossil will hold a three days' Fourth of July celebration this year. This was decided at a meeting of the citizens held Tuesday night and over \$500 was raised at the meeting. This amount was donated for the expressed purpose of providing the best of accommodations for visitors and for their comfort. It is all to be expended in that way and the purses for baseball and other sports are to be provided from a separate fund. J. C. Cooper was selected by the meeting as chairman of the celebration committee and will have full charge. The Condon ball team has agreed to play here during the celebration, in fact this was the understanding when the local team

played at Condon during the celebration there last year.

CATTLE MEN WILL MEET AT BAKER

Baker, Ore., May 10.—A meeting will be held in this city next Wednesday, May 14, at which time representatives of the cattle industry of Eastern and Central Oregon and Southern Idaho will gather for the purpose of perfecting an organization for the promotion of the cattle industry. Almost a thousand notices have been sent, and responses from cattlemen in the territory mentioned indicates that several hundred will be present.

The idea of forming such an organization was formulated by Messrs. William Pollman and Fred Phillips of this city after a recent visit to Texas and other southern cattle districts, where they saw such organizations doing much to promote the industry. These organizations exist in all the cattle countries, and all local cattle men are enthusiastic over the plan, as are all from outside points who have been heard from.

According to the letter sent out, the organization will be for the purpose of protecting the members of the association from the loss of cattle by thieves and otherwise by offering rewards for the arrest and conviction of persons caught stealing cattle from members of the association, and the placing of a brand inspector in the Union stock yards at Portland, and by so doing to practically stamp out the stealing of stock and in many places work to the mutual benefit of the cattle industry in general by regulating range conditions and by recommending the passage of such laws that would advance and promote the cattle industry in general.

GAME GOES ELEVEN INNINGS WITH SPUDS VICTORS BY SCORE 8 TO 6

In the first extra inning game of the season on the local diamond, the La Grande Spuds won from the Buckaroos in the eleventh inning by a score of 8 to 6. It was what might be called a pinch hit game for twice the Pendleton players tied the score by clouting safe ones at the critical junctures and just as often the visitors came back and delivered timely swats at timely times.

Jamieson was on the mound for the Spuds and twirled in good form. Besides he was backed up by errorless support until the eighth. Krause started for Pendleton and, while allowing but few hits, was wild. In the eighth Berger went in to bat for him and McGarrigle relieved him on the mound in the ninth.

Pendleton gave the game away in the early innings by errors and then tried to reclaim it in the latter part by batwork. In the eighth with the score 5 to 3 against them, Augustus made a two base blow and drove across McKune and Lodell, the former of whom had got life through La Grande's first error and the latter through a single. The score was tied and Berger was sent in to bat for Krause but breezed. Then Dougherty flew out to Nadeau and the inning was ended.

In the ninth Druhot singled and Nadeau dropped one between short and the leftfielder which went for a hit but McGarrigle pulled out of the hold safely when Rader nipped a line drive. Pendleton advanced a man to second in the last of the ninth but no farther.

With one down in the tenth, Walters landed on first when McKune fumbled his groundball. Jamieson hit to pitcher and the ball ticked off McGarrigle's mitt, enabling both runners to land safely. A pass ball moved both up a notch but Byrnes atoned for his blunder by a snap throw to third which caught Walters napping. There were two down and Corbin up. He had already secured a couple of hits so it was deemed advisable to pass him up. Four who ones were served and then Beck, who had not made a hit all week, took up his willow. With two strikes on him McGarrigle grooved the ball and it was sent whistling over second base for a clean single. Jamieson scored but Beck was thrown out at second.

The crowd was on its feet yelling like a bunch of Plutes when Pendleton came to bat and, after Lodell had grounded out, Byrnes responded with a corking two sacker. Augustus drew a walk and then McGarrigle fanned and, after Dougherty had two strikes on his crowd made ready to leave. But there was destined to be more yet. Joe sped the ball between short and third and it brought in Byrnes, for the best Naughton could do was to knock it down. Cowan popped out to Beck and the score was still tied up, 6 to 6.

Things started badly for McGarrigle in the 11th. Druhot, first up, salmaded the pellet for three bags. Nadeau hit the ball to pitcher and was thrown out at first but Gooch, who had taken the place of King when the latter was ejected from the field, drew a pass. Naughton fouled out to Rader and the crowd was relieved for Peterson was at the bat and he had not been able to connect all day. He swung wildly on two and then lifted the third one far into left field for three bags, chasing two runs across the pan. Walters struck out but the winners were already over for all Pendleton could do in her half was to advance a man to third.

It was La Grande's game all the way through for the Bucks had one of their erratic fielding days. The Spuds started things in the first by chasing across a couple. Corbin, first to face Krause, introduced himself to the curve merchant by biffing out a double to left. Beck laid down a bunt and was safe when Byrnes mused it up. He started a double steal and Corbin scored when Byrnes threw wild to short. A single by Druhot sent Beck across and the next three men were easy outs.

Pendleton stepped into the lead in her half by chasing three over. With one down Cowan beat out an infield hit, Rader walked and Varian fanned. McKune then drew four wide ones and the bases were full. Lodell drove one to short which Naughton could not handle and Cowan registered. Then Byrnes hit one through pitcher and Lodell and McKune cantered to the rubber.

A three bagger by Nadeau followed by a walk and a couple of errors gave La Grande another brace of tallies in the third and their fifth was registered in the fifth without the assistance of a hit. A walk, a wild pitch and an error were quite enough to enable Druhot to circle the bags.

The game was a slow affair, due largely to the deliberation with which the pitchers worked and the draggy way in which the Spuds came to bat. There was considerable beefing at decisions, the visitors being the principal offenders and Naughton was fined five while Manager King was chased out of the park.

Scoring for the Bears commenced in the fourth, when with one down, Martini hit over second and was sacrificed to third by Johnson, scoring on Harmon's single the only earned run of the game.

Things ran smoothly then until the eighth when the Bears annexed two more, three hits and an error figuring the dope sheet. Brown led off with a single over second, took second on Leonard's sacrifice grounder which Harrod threw wild to first, advancing Brown to third and leaving Leonard safe. Harmon then scored Brown on a long sacrifice fly to deep center, and after Childers had struck out again, Leonard scored on Lundstrom's single through short.

Baker had a man on third and second in the seventh, when Lundstrom pulled Sheely off the base by a bad throw, but failed to score, West flying out to Martini.

There were several hair-raising plays made during the game, Martini being particularly unfortunate in losing Murphy's line drive to left.
