NEW TREATY WITH JAPAN WILL SETTLE DISPUTED QUESTIONS

Negotiations Will Begin Soon According to Information Today from the State Department.

BRYAN AND CHINDA AGREE

Question of Citizenship and Landholding Will Be Basis of New Agreement Between the Nations—No Indications Yet of What Japanese Protest Contained.

Washington, May 13.—The new Japanese treaty will settle definitely and forever the status of the Japanese as residents and landholders in the United States and is to be the basis of the new treaty with Japan as soon as it can be negotiated, according to information today at the state department. This treaty, it was said, will be conducted independent of the action Governor Johnson takes on the alien law. It was admitted by attaches of the department that Bryan and Chinda believe the time has arrived finally to settle all points in the controversy and have determined there is a common ground on which they can draw up such a convention. The result of this, it is expected, will be a definitely worded treaty which will replace the present loose understanding of "a gentlemen's agreement" made by Roosevelt with the Japanese. No definite indication of what the Japanese protest against the California bill contained has yet been made public.

It is admitted the protest is general in character and it is denied that Japan has demanded that the Japanese be eligible to citizenship. Persons familiar with the situation state the protest is based on a feeling that there is an effort everywhere in the United States to discriminate against the Japanese because they are ineligible to citizenship. The protest asks the president to remedy this discrimination. Diplomats think a new treaty is imperative.

Sacramento, May 13.—Governor Johnson refused to state today when he would reply to Bryan's message asking him to veto the anti-alien bill. He stated his reply may be ready later in the day.

It is stated by those close to the governor that the reply to the national administration's request will be but a reiteration of his already declared stand that California has a right to enact such legislation, that the state demands it and that he will not put his veto on the bill.

Balloon on Trip to New York.
Philadelphia, May 13.—Carrying Dr. Thomas Eldridge as pilot and two passengers, the balloon Philadelphia No. 2, ascended at 9:30 this morning on a fly to New York. Eldridge expects to arrive in New York by 3. They carry provisions sufficient to last two days.

Tacoma, Wash., May 13.—Four are dead and seven injured as the result of the derailment of Oregon-Washington local No. 362, bound from Portland to Seattle, near Lakeview yesterday afternoon. The train was traveling at 65 miles an hour over a level stretch of track when the accident occurred. The dead:

All of those killed were riding in the smoking car in the forward seats and were crushed beneath the steel baggage coach which jammed its way 12 feet into the smoker.

Railroad officials say the probable cause was a spreading rail. The engine and eight cars left the track, the engine plowing its way 200 feet before it turned on its side and was buried five feet in the earth.

OLD PARTY BEYOND HOPE OF REPAIR

Washington, May 13.—The two day conference in Chicago at which republican leaders outlined plans for reorganizing the party was defended by republican regulars and derided by house progressives today. "The meeting in Chicago," said Representative Hinebaugh, of Illinois, a progressive, "indicates an irreconcilable difference in the old party. The only course for the progressive republicans is to enter the progressive party. Eventually they will."

Representative Moore of Pennsylvania, a regular republican, said: "It is not a time to attempt a republican reorganization. All the trouble in the party has resulted from pretenses of purity on one hand and unwarranted accusation on the other. A sifting process must come to discover who the real republicans are."

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DR. COOK WANTS INVESTIGATION

WRITES TO PRESIDENT

Scores "Armchair Geographers" in Washington—Asks That Wilson Name a Commission to Probe Claims of Himself and Peary on the Discovery of Pole.

Washington, May 13.—Charging government officials with the "propaganda of character assassination," and ridiculing the National Geographical society, Dr. Cook, in an open letter to the president asks that a commission of polar explorers be named to investigate his claim and that of Admiral Peary to the discovery of the north pole. Writing from Chicago, Cook said: "The future of my children demands an exposition of the unfair methods of armchair geographers in Washington."

BOYS CHARGED WITH MURDERING FATHER

Tombstone, Arizona, May 13.—Brought here because of popular feeling against them, in Douglas, Otto and Fred Watson, charged with killing their father, were taken to jail under heavy guard. They were spirited from Douglas in an automobile.

Douglas, Ariz., May 13.—Charged with the murder of their father, Otto and Fred Watson, 18 and 21, respectively, are under arrest here. The father, William Watson, a rancher, was shot and killed while driving to his home from Douglas. The arrest of the boys followed. Neighbors declared they quarreled with their father. Watson was an Arizona pioneer.

URGE REFUSAL OF FRIEDMANN LICENSE

Washington, May 13.—Protest against Senator Hughes' bill to authorize a special license to practice medicine in the District of Columbia for Dr. Friedrich Franz Friedmann was sent to congress yesterday by the district commissioners. The commissioners insisted that the German physician who claims to have discovered a cure for tuberculosis should not be allowed to practice in the district without submitting to the usual test subscribed by law.

"The efficacy of the system of practice of the proposed license," the commissioners said, "does not appear to be sufficiently established to justify a recommendation that he be accorded the special exemption sought in his behalf."

DYNAMITE PLACED UNDER CAR WHEELS

Uniontown, Pa., May 13.—An alleged attempt to blow up the Brownsville-Uniontown passenger train on the Monongahela railroad at Lock-Rone, near here, has caused excitement and a rigid investigation is being made. The jar of the train would have exploded the dynamite, which had been placed under the joints of the rails.

The passenger train was flagged a short time after the dynamite was discovered. The fact that the train carried \$20,000 for the payment of miners of the Consolidated Connellsville Coke company at Mount Vernon, had aroused the authorities to action.

BRITISH CRUISER OFF TO GUATEMALA

Kingston, Jamaica, May 13.—The British Cruiser Aeneas sailed from here Saturday ostensibly for Balize, British Honduras. The real object of the warship, it is understood, is Puerto Barrios, Guatemala, to enforce a settlement of the long standing claims of British subjects against Guatemala. Recently Great Britain placed a time limit on this settlement which expires May 15.

The latter part of April Guatemala made an appeal to the government at Washington against reprisals by Great Britain for Guatemala's bondholders. The Guatemalan minister, in directing attention to the situation, pointed out that plans were under way for a large loan with the proceeds of which it was proposed to pay Guatemala's British debts to aid reform her currency system.

"TO OUR NEW BATTLESHIP—SHIP OF FRIENDSHIP"—BRYAN

Washington, May 13.—Bryan was one of the speakers today at a farewell breakfast given the foreign peace delegates by John Stewart, founder of the peace centenary conference. Bryan proposed a toast "To our new battleship—a ship of friendship."

PANIC PLANNED BY REPUBLICANS

FLAT CHARGES ARE MADE

Democratic Leaders in the Senate Declare Minority Seeks to Block Action on Underwood Bill in Order to Demoralize Business—Uncertainty Wanted Removed.

Washington, May 13.—Flat charges that republican members of the senate seek to delay action on the Underwood tariff until an artificial protest is raised in order to bring about a panic, was voiced by democratic leaders today. The senate is scheduled to vote on Penrose's resolution providing for a state finance committee to conduct open tariff hearings before the consideration of the measure is begun. The democrats expect to reject the plan. Penrose is determined to conduct a filibuster. The democrats expect Borah, Cummins and Kenyon will oppose the Pennsylvania.

Democrats say the business world wants the uncertainty regarding the tariff bill ended, asserting that if the tariff hearings are eliminated the bill will go before the finance committee and be reported out within two or three weeks.

7 TREATIES TO BE MADE BY BRYAN

Washington, May 13.—Special arbitration treaties between the United States and seven other countries which expire by limitation this year will be renewed by the statement if the foreign governments are willing. Secretary Bryan made this announcement yesterday in connection with the proposed immediate renewal of the British American treaty which expires June 4.

Such special treaties to which the United States is a party will expire during the year in the following order: Spain, June 2; Great Britain, 4; Norway, June 24; Sweden, August 18; Japan, August 24; Portugal, November 14 and Switzerland, December 23.

The Franco-American arbitration treaty which would have expired in February, already has been renewed for another term of five years.

FLEECE OF \$5,000 ON FAKE HORSE RACE

Los Angeles, May 13.—The trial of Lee Rail, alleged head of the "National Bunco Syndicate" charged officially with having fleeced G. P. Fries, an Illinois farmer, out of \$5,000 through a fake horse race was continued yesterday by testimony given for the prosecution by A. N. Koehler of Spokane, Wash.

Koehler, whose testimony was offered as a corroboration of the allegation that Rail had a "system," testified that through a chance meeting with "an agreeable stranger," who, he said, was Rail he had gone to a "pool room" at Redondo Beach, a seaside resort a few miles from Los Angeles. Koehler asserted, he was fleeced out of \$1475 and sent on a wild goose chase to Butte, Montana. Before he realized he had been duped, Rail, he declared, said he wanted him to work with him, promising to make him a "rich mah" in 30 days.

CANADA CONSIDERS NEW BUDGET BILL

Ottawa, Ontario, May 13.—Consideration of the new budget including a revised tariff schedule was begun today in the Canadian parliament. W. T. White, in presenting the measure, said the government proposed waiting to see what the American congress does before changing its present fiscal policy. The measure extends the free list to include typesetting and typesetting machines, certain traction machinery, miners' rescue supplies, glassware and scientific apparatus used in hospitals. Under its provision the duty is cut to 35 cents.

LONDON MILITANTS FOR HIKE CAMPAIGN

London, May 13.—When the trial of militant suffragettes, charged with disturbing the peace, was resumed today a physician testified that "General" Mrs. Flora Drummond had completely collapsed and was unable to appear. Suffragettes plan to have 100,000 women march from London in all directions to spread the propaganda. Starting from Trafalgar Square, they will leave by companies for Scotland, Wales and the east and south coasts. The missionaries will be mostly working women who will appeal to men of their class to work for suffrage.

TURKEY WILL GIVE UP LARGE PART OF TERRITORY TO ALLIES

COMMITTEE TO PASS ON O'HARA CHARGES

Springfield, Ill., May 13.—Whether additional testimony will clear Lieutenant Governor O'Hara of charges that he was improperly intimate with Mrs. Robinson, which charges were a sequel of the senate starvation wages probe, will be decided this afternoon by the senate commission. The committee which is investigating O'Hara met this afternoon. It is now believed they will call for further testimony before declaring O'Hara's reputation unsullied.

STRIKERS REJECT SETTLEMENT PLAN

Cincinnati, May 13.—A flat rejection of the plan of Mayor Hunt by which the street car strike here practically could be settled by the men operating the cars until arbitration could be arranged, was made by the strikers today and further serious trouble is expected to result from the company's determination to import strike breakers. The mayor's plan, the strikers decided, was too vague and provided no means of settling the men's principal demand, a recognition of the union. The strikers submitted a counter proposal providing, the question of union recognition would not be considered in the arbitration plan.

AVIATOR FLIES OVER THE ALPS

Berne, Switzerland, May 13.—Maintaining an average altitude of two miles, Osier Bider, a Swiss aviator, monoplane 50 miles over the Alps to Sion today. The trip occupied two hours and 19 minutes. Bider was almost frozen when he descended.

W. VIRGINIA COURT MARTIAL IS ENDED

Charleston, West Va., May 13.—"Fins" was written on the trial of labor leaders and strikers in West Virginia by military court martial by an announcement to that effect by Governor Hatfield today. The governor declares hereafter that charges against strikers will be turned over to the civil authorities. It is believed the decision marks the near abolition of military rule in the Pine Creek district where a state of practical warfare has existed for months. It is not known whether the governor's determination will mean a release of "Mother" Jones who has been a prisoner for months.

Referring to the Kern resolution calling for an investigation by the senate of conditions in the West Virginia coal region, Hatfield said: "I court the fullest investigation of my action in the coal fields strike. I was governed solely by the desire to aid humanity and promote peace and harmony. All law abiding citizens approve my actions."

MOTION PICTURE AND VAUDEVILLE THEATER ASSURED FOR PENDLETON
