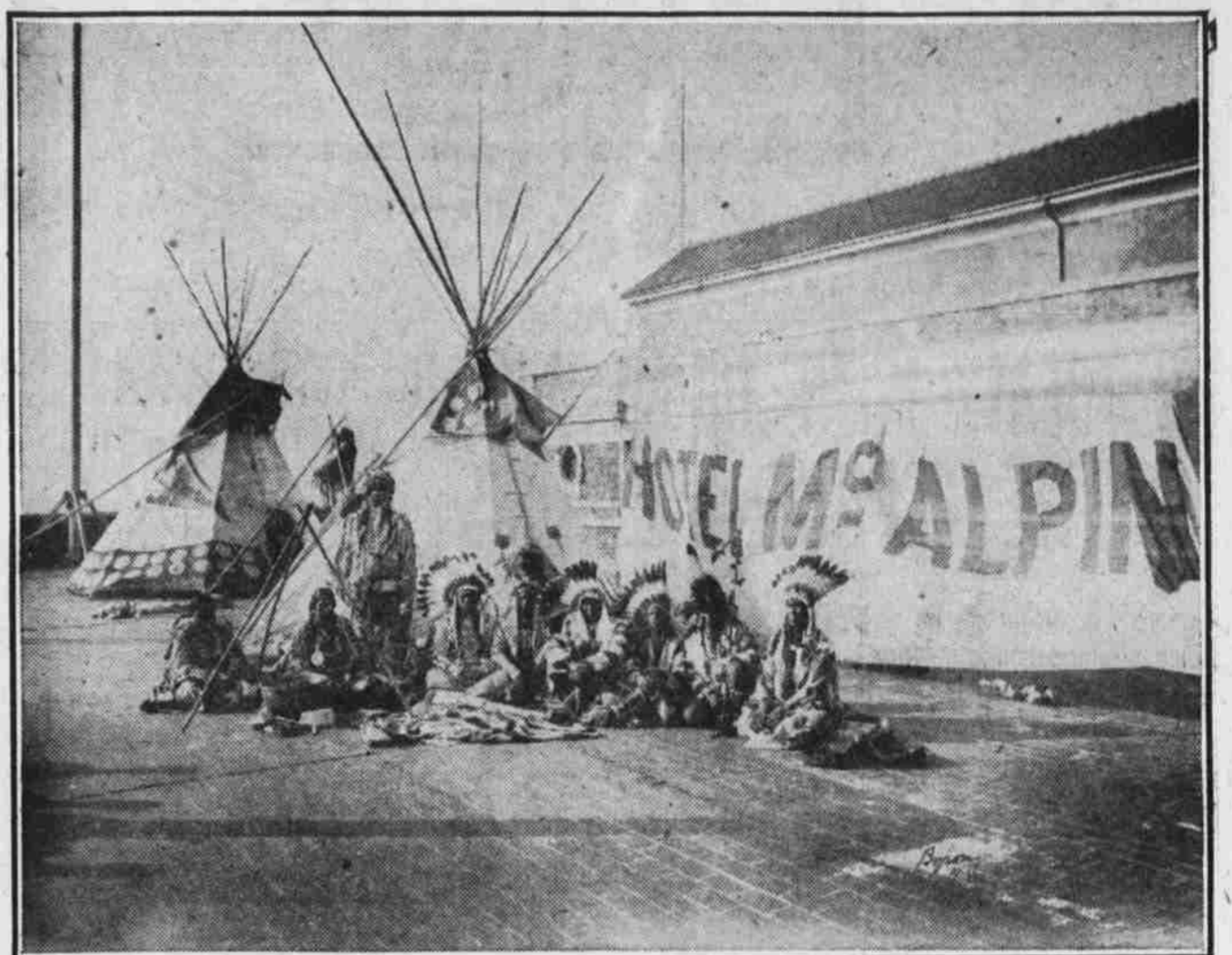

BLACKFEET INDIANS IN GRASS DANCE ON BROADWAY.



Blackfeet Tribe Performs in Honor of Women Along Street.

New York, March 20th, 1913. Broadway was treated to an Indian dance yesterday when Big Top and ten Blackfeet Indians, here to see the sights in connection with the Second Annual Travel and Vacation Show, performed in honor of the women along the "Gay White Way." To music of tom-toms they danced for several minutes in front of the offices of the Great Northern Railway which furnished them a special car from Glacier National Park reservation, Montana. Indians camped on the roof of the Hotel McAlpin, living in tepees and cooking their food in pots, loaned them by Manager Boomer, who is entertaining them. The Indians are in charge of "Big Jim" Shoemaker of Montana. They arrived in Jersey City Sunday and where brought to New York on the ferry. At the first sight of the skyscrapers Chief Three Bears, who is 80 years old offered prayers. The band was awe-stricken. Chief Big Top, the tribe orator, was asked what his tribe thought of the city.

He likened the high buildings to mountains in Glacier Park. Those in the band are, Big Top, leader, Three Bears, Medicine Owl and squaw, White Calf and squaw, Long-Time-Sleep, Fish Wolf Robe, Lazy Boy and Cecile Ground, 8 years old, the daughter of a Carlisle School student. The band will be in New York for ten days in connection with the Second Annual Travel and Vacation Show at the Grand Central Palace, New York City.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST SALOONS PLANNED

Philadelphia, Pa., May 13.—H. L. Sheldon, 413 Couch building, a prominent attorney of Portland, and R. P. Hutton, will launch a campaign looking to the absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic in that state, and will lead the fight for the proposed amendment to the federal constitution, at the national convention of the Anti-Saloon League of America to be held at Columbus, Ohio, November 19-23.

After reading the above dispatches Attorney Sheldon admitted that the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon, of which he is superintendent, is planning a campaign for statewide prohibition, and that the national organization will fight for nation-wide prohibition.

"In Oregon we expect to initiate a petition for the repeal of the Home Rule amendment to the constitution, to be voted on in 1914," said Mr. Sheldon. "If we are successful in knocking out the amendment we will then make a campaign for statewide prohibition in 1916."

"This fall, probably before the league's convention in November, a campaign for nation-wide prohibition will be launched. This can only be accomplished through an amendment of the federal constitution. Our first efforts will be to have congress adopt the amendment. This done, the various state leagues will then work to the end that the necessary 36 states adopt it."

FOREIGN MERCHANTS COMPLAIN ABOUT SHORT POSTAGE

Washington, May 13.—(Special)—The department of commerce is receiving complaints in increasing numbers from business men in foreign countries against the short postage on letters received from the United States. These foreign merchants aver that the double postage which they are required to pay on letters from America is so annoying that it turns much trade away from our country.

Commercial Agent Thompson writes to the department from Marseilles that the large French importers report that about half the American correspondence comes with only a two-cent stamp affixed. This unfavorable impression is created. The rate on letters to France is five cents for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce and three cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

A mercantile firm at Buenos Ayres in calling attention to the receipt of so many letters from the United States with two cent stamps only thereon, for which they must pay a fine, suggests to the American consul there: "We suppose that this is due to a wrong interpretation of the postal rates very general among the commercial circles of your country. In view of the enormous increase in commercial exchange with the country you represent, we recommend that you take the necessary measures to correct this deficiency, which will not develop commerce with Argentina." Similar complaints have reached the department from Africa, Australia, and many other parts of the world and the statement is usually added that short-paid letters from the United States are beginning to be refused. SHORTAGE WILL EFFECT VALUES

Much fear is expressed by the wool trade as a result of the shortage in supplies in South America and Australia. Along the river La Platta, there has been a very serious decrease in the holdings of sheep during the last two years; the shortage being especially felt this season. Similar conditions are shown in Australia and the same is true, although in a smaller degree.

Wool prices abroad are firmer and are gaining strength almost every day while the price is being elevated. Domestic wool markets are still of an uncertain nature owing to the tariff talk. Prices being offered are and have been for some weeks, on a free trade basis, therefore the situation from a price standpoint is today as even, is not lower than it will likely be even though the entire duty is removed.

Eastern woolen interests continue to talk loss of tariff to influence growers at western points and they are holding back their purchases to confirm this view. Exactly the same thing was done a year ago when there was no change for tariff lowering; therefore it is quite probable that the price of wool will follow the movement of last season and advance after most of the growers have sold their holdings.—Pilot Rock Record.

\$5000 VERDICT IS GIVEN TO O'CONNOR

St. Louis, May 13.—The St. Louis American League baseball club must pay Jack O'Connor \$5,000 the amount he would have received in salary had he not been discharged as manager, prior to the opening of the 1911 season, a jury in the circuit court yesterday deciding. The trial, which had occupied the court all day came to a close with unexpected suddenness. The jurors were out only 30 minutes. O'Connor claimed he had been engaged to manage the St. Louis team for both the 1910 and 1911 seasons, but that he was dismissed at the end of the 1910 season. A deposition was filed in the case by President Ban Johnson stating that he had instructed Third Baseman John Corridon to play far behind third base when Napoleon Lajoie was at bat in the final doubleheader with Cleveland of the season in 1910. At that time there was great rivalry between Lajoie and Ty Cobb of Detroit for premier batting honors and an automobile had been offered as a prize to the winner. Lajoie secured eight hits in eight times at bat in the double header and came within a fraction of tying Cobb's record.
