## WOMAN AND HER VARIED INTERESTS

### Hat Trimmings.

The placing of hat trimmings is always interesting to the women who ornaments her own hats. This season there is plenty of variety given in both the trimmings and their position.

In the first place it is well to state that the small hat is the favorite, and on this the trimming is usually placed upright, thus accentuating the smallness of the hat it adorns.

A very pretty white hat of coarse straw has an upper facing of cerise velvet. Right at the front are placed four skeleton feathers, which are held in position by a buckle made of beads.

Breasts of eog plumes are quite an addition to a small shape with a rolled brim.

### Changes in Girl's Training.

In these days when college girls are playing the society butterfly only on occasions—as their teachers and mentors may also do—when girls have serious concern in various movements for social reform as well as in their advanced studies, it is amusing enough, says the Christian Science Monitor, to recall how the thoughtful men of the past had to rally to the propaganda of higher education for women, as illustrated in the

### Trimmings for Hats.

### Panel Sash.

Worth is using a sash which may otherwise be described as a panel. It is so important. It is shirred with a heading at the high waistline, and hung in straight loose folds from there to the bottom of the skirt, entirely concealing the flat, scant line of the back caused by the placing of all the draperies and fullness in front.

### Motor Veil.

Motor veils in gray taupe or mulberry colored chiffon cloth of half-yard width are finished along one edge with a narrow pocket, through which is run a fine ribbon that draws up the fullness to fit about the crown base of any hat. The lower side of the veil is gathered into a three-inch wide, narrow knife-plaited strip of the chiffon, which fastens at the back under a small bow of self-toned velvet at the nape of the neck. The frill-bordered veil is much more practical than is the one whose ends must be drawn about the throat and tied, as it positively cannot blow loose. More over, not so much material is needed. Any amateur seamstress can fashion one of them.

### The Double Train.

A new train seen lately consisted of two trains each quite separate, and ending in points. A very lovely evening dress of deep orange charmeuse had this new double tail. One was of the orange charmeuse, and was just a continuation of the dress itself.

The second train was of lemon colored mousseline-de-sole, and started from a drapery at the waist, which came down one side and round the back of the gown, falling into a train the exact size and shape of the satin one. When well down this has a very pretty as well as a very novel effect.

### Plaza Screens.

One or two seasons ago my husband made three unusual but very convenient plaza screens from unused window blinds, says the Woman's Home Companion. He used four blinds for each screen, simply fastening them together with medium sized hinges. They can be moved into position like any ordinary screen.

### Overall Apron.

A practical overall apron has the sleeves reaching to the wrist, and is cut slightly square at the neck, fastening at the back.

### High Evening Coiffure.

Heads are dressed very high for evening. The old-fashioned Grecian coil has returned, and we see heads that have a kind of psychic on the very top. The hair is lightly marceled, then brought in a mass over the crown, covering a round roll. Little soft curls lie all about this top part.

## Interesting Stories from Various Cities

Salt Lake City, Utah, May 13.—After today no woman who works in the state will receive less than 90 cents a day; no girl worker will receive less than 75 cents per day, and no woman or girl will work over 54 hours a week. The minimum wage law passed by the last legislature went into effect today. The 54-hour law has been in effect some time. According to the new law a woman worker learning new work must be paid 90 cents daily; after six months apprenticeship this must be raised to at least \$1.25 daily. Girl apprentices must be paid 75 cents daily, and after six months must be paid at least 90 cents per day.

St. Louis, Mo., May 13.—More than a thousand delegates to the Southern Baptist convention assembled here today at the Third Baptist church for a week's session. The delegates include prominent ministers, lawyers, physicians and educators. The convention has no judicial or legislative function as every Baptist church is absolutely independent. Figures showing a great growth of the church were presented today. According to the report made today, there are now more than 2,000,000 registered members of Baptist churches. Encouraging reports also were read by delegates representing theological seminaries at Louisville Ky., and Dallas, Tex., and delegates representing Baptist colleges in the south. Sectional meetings will be held daily throughout the week to discuss foreign missions, home missions, the Sunday school, the church, and the establishment of gymnasiums and recreation associations in the churches as a means of attracting and holding younger members.

New York, May 13.—The entire membership of St. Patrick's Chapter No. 145, Royal Arch Masons, of Toronto, Canada, left here today for Europe carrying with them the famous "traveling triangle," which is being sent on a journey to the Royal Arch Jurisdictions of the world. The arch is a magnificent piece of solid gold. It will make a ceremonial appearance at every Royal Arch jurisdiction in Europe and will be returned to Toronto, Canada with elaborate ceremonies.

Washington, May 13.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels returned here today after a tour of inspection of navy yards in the south. It was announced at the navy department today that Secretary Daniels will shortly make a statement regarding the advisability of reducing the number of navy yards.
