EAGLE'S NEST, CENTURY OLD, IS FINALLY BLOWN DOWN WITH ITS TREE

Florence, Ore., May 13.—An ancient eagle's nest, long since deserted, but visited each spring by the barefooted boys of Florence and Glendena, expecting, with childish faith, to find the great bird returned to sit upon it, has been blown down and its coarse sticks scattered and lost.

It clung to the lofty crotch of a big and decrepit fir up one of the Glendena gorges, and, according to tradition, was more than a century old.

Indian Dan, who died two years ago at the alleged age of 130, said it was an inhabited nest when he first came to the Stuslaw, a boy of 15. It antedates the oldest white settlers and before their time the eagles had ceased to spiral around it. After resisting the winter winds of over a century it still stuck fast to the forks of the tree till the tree, grown rotten, was itself blown down.

TE LEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

St. Joseph, Mo., May 13.—Jessie Gibson, aged 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Gibson, after being punished by her mother for an act she declared she had not committed, jumped into the cistern at the family home here and was drowned.

Washington, May 13.—Although many prominent democrats in the senate are opposed to currency legislation at the special session of congress, a serious effort will be made by the banking and currency committee to draft a measure which at least will pass through the stage preliminary to actual enactment.

New York, May 13.—The Sultan of Turkey through his legal representative was notified that in an American law court his position is the same as that of his humblest subject. The sultan was ordered to put up security for the costs in a case in the supreme court, which has before it the Turkish ruler's suit to get possession of \$10,000 insurance money on the life of H. S. Tavshanjan, a wealthy merchant who was assassinated here in 1907.

Bridgeport, O., May 13.—In a riot among 300 foreigners attending a funeral in the Linwood cemetery here two men were shot and may die; another was probably fatally beaten and a large number of others sustained cuts and bruises. The cause of the riot is not known.

Washington, May 13.—"We are to substitute spirit of peace for the spirit of war. The ideals of peace are greater than the ideals of war. We know of no cause that cannot be settled better by reason than by war." These were some of the sentiments expressed last night by Secretary Bryan who said he spoke for the president of the United States and for the administration under which he holds office. He spoke at a peace banquet.

FAN FODDER

To meet the tallenders in six games, the Buckaroos left last evening on No. 18 for Baker. Accompanying them were Vice President Roy W. Rittner and Financial Manager John Dickson. The members of the team since the cut-down are Pitchers Joe Berger, Wheeler Osborne, Wells and McGarrigle, Catchers Jimmy Byrnes and Haworth, Al Lodel, first base; Terry McKune, second base and manager; Don Rader, third base; Ray Augustus, shortstop; Joe Dougherty and Varian, outfielders; Clark Thomas, the new pitcher, will join them tomorrow.

John Dickson may be in a Pendleton uniform before the season is over. As financial manager, he will travel with the team and intends warming up with them. He is a fast outfielder, a good man on the bases and, if he can hit Class D pitchers like he did the bushers of the Old Blue Mountain league, he will prove a valuable addition.

Cowan, the rightfielder released yesterday by McKune may join either the North Yakima or Walla Walla team. Manager Engle of the Braves at the depot last evening asked for his address in case he wanted to wire him and it is said that Walla Walla has asked him to wait a week before signing with anybody. Cowan made a great hit with the Garden City fans during the first week by his stellar batting.

The depot last evening was lousy with baseball players. The members of the Pendleton, Walla Walla North Yakima and Baker teams were all congregated there and boarded 18 together. There must have been a great fanning bee on the way over.

Rader went through the two weeks of ball here without an error. During the week in Walla Walla, he had one, marked against him as a result of boneheading scoring. There were two down and two on when the ball was hit to him. The natural play was to first and he threw the ball to Lodel in plenty of time to catch the runner. Starkell was watching second and failed to see the play. He called the man safe and Rader was given an error. Not by the narrowest or broadest construction of the scoring rules is this permissible. The ball was perfectly fielded, perfectly thrown and perfectly received. If the man was not out, then he should have been credited with a hit. It was just a case of plain ignorance of the part of the scorer and Rader's 1.000 average is spoiled by it.

It took Walla Walla, the league leaders, ten innings to defeat Baker, the tallers, in the Sunday game and Cotton Harmon was the man responsible for the winning run.

If Pendleton takes the series from Baker, she will be pretty lucky. If she breaks even, the fans should be satisfied. If she loses the series, they have a right to kick. Baker has a hard hitting team and is showing marked improvement in pitching and fielding.

Manager King of the La Grande team has released Goch and Brown, two of his twirlers. This still leaves him Jamieson, Fitchner, Druhot, Moeller and Mountain.

Post has been catching good ball for Baker in the series just passed. He stayed here, however, because of his duties at the high school, and is hoping that he can arrange to play in Baker on Saturdays and Sundays hereafter until school is out, when he may be taken on regular.—Walla Walla Union.

Leonard pitches the opening game in Boise today against Al Bonner, and fans are backing Leonard to the limit. He is scheduled to work another game, while Kelly is also hoped to play two games this week against Boise, leaving one game each for Laird and Shader.—Walla Walla Union.

PAINTS ALBERTA IN UNFAVORABLE LIGHT

Man Just From There Says He Is Glad to Get Away—Copy of Strong Letter Received.

Walla Walla, Wash., May 13.—Two things at the office of the Commercial club yesterday directed attention to the Alberta country. One was when a stranger dropped in to say he had rented a home in Walla Walla and he and his wife expected to live here as they had plenty of Alberta after 18 months there. Another thing was a copy of a letter written by A. McCusker of 425 Pickard street, Edmonton, Alberta.

In this letter Mr. McCusker says he is going to leave Alberta and come to the United States "where life is worth living. After residing in the so-called boasted Alberta country for 13 years have concluded it is not the country for us Americans to spend the balance of our natural lives in and is not the country at all which it is advertised to be, and second when I look around and get located, I want to find a suitable place for my friends to join me—friends who live in Canada and who are ready to leave at any time should they find a land where they would not have to undergo the hardships that they do in this wet and frozen-up country."

Mr. McCusker says he intends to write a book of his experiences to dissuade Americans to keep out of Alberta.

BAKER CITY CELEBRATES OPENING SEASON WITH PENDLETON TODAY

Baker, Ore., May 13.—(Special)—Headed by the Baker Cornet Band and a cordon of police, the booster parade, commemorating the opening of the Tri-State baseball season in this city wound its way through Baker's streets this afternoon.

The parade was divided into five divisions including the city and county officials, directors of the Baker Baseball association, various civic organizations, fans garbed in straw hats and dusters, more sedate fans in street clothes, the auto fire truck and automobiles by the score. The opposing teams, Baker and Pendleton, rode in Ellis' mammoth truck.

The noise feature of the parade was not overlooked in the slightest manner. Cowbells, horns, tin cans, whistles, drums, and in fact everything that could be obtained to make the ears split was brought into action.

Three bands participated, including the one heading the procession, the Juvenile band, and Silver's "Hoodoo" band, which resembled the "Hungry Seven" of Portland fame, although they didn't fall in and down while playing "Moonlight Bay."

Mayor Palmer issued a proclamation Saturday asking all business houses to close for the opener, and almost without exception they responded. The high school will begin one hour early during all of this week to enable the students to witness the games.

Mayor Palmer will pitch the first ball and Dr. William Lockwood Parker, president of the local baseball association will be stationed behind the bat to receive it.
