Better Play Than Book.

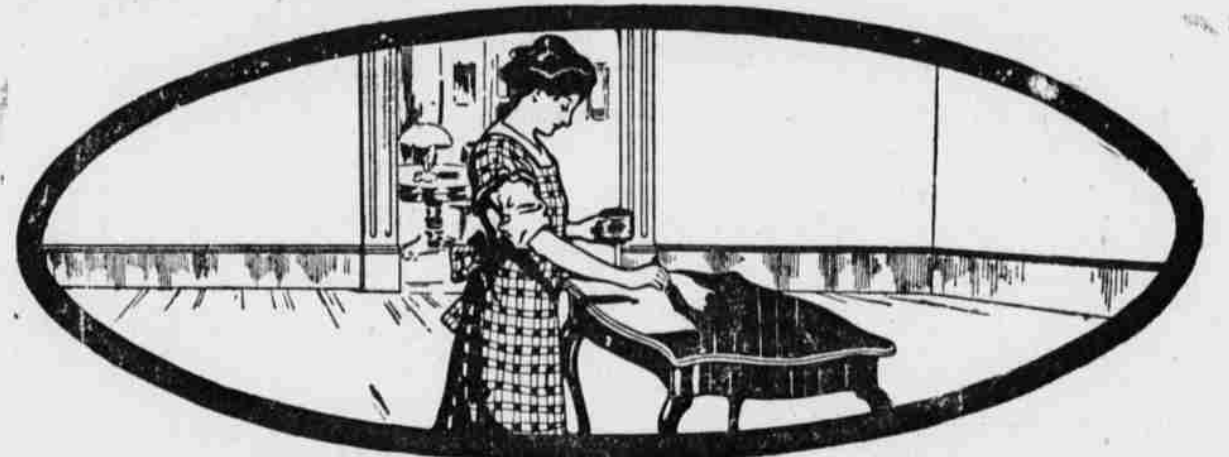
