RECORD PRICE FOR BEEF IS REACHED

Portland, Ore., May 13.—Portland buyers paid more for cattle yesterday than was ever before received by producers here when they purchased five loads of steers at \$9 per hundred pounds. This is 50 cents higher than any previous price, the latter being made last week when some went at \$8.50.

By yesterday's advance the Portland cattle market is higher than any other

in the country, quality considered. The cattle that brought the extreme price came from Idaho and California.

For the first time in years the price for cattle at North Portland reached above that paid at North Portland reached above that paid at either Kansas City or South Omaha. This condition is the result of the extreme shortage of Pacific northwest holdings, which means that consumers will have to dig deeper into their pockets to buy a steak hereafter.

Not the slightest sign of relief is in sight. In fact there is every present indication of still higher prices. Supplies came forward from four states: Oregon, Idaho, Montana and California.

Newsy Notes of Pendleton

Carruth to Waitsburg Schools.

Frank D. Carruth, for the past two years principal of the Stanfield schools and formerly an instructor in the Pendleton high school, has accepted a principalship in the Waitsburg schools, according to a report reaching the city this morning. Rumor also has it that he will join the ranks of the benedicts before taking up his new position.

Local Boy Is Whitman Orator.

Frank Engdahl, a graduate of the Pendleton high school, who will finish his four years' course at Whitman this spring, has been chosen as one of the three seniors to deliver orations at the commencement exercises. His subject will be "The Immigration Question." The other two chosen are Miss Hilda Anderson of Spokane and Paul Garrett of Wenatchee.

By a typographical mistake it was reported in this paper yesterday that Joe Craig, the well known Indian interpreter, was accused of cattle stealing when the Indian in question was Joe Hays, well known redskin buckaroo. Craig is subpoenaed as a witness in the case against Harry Redford, charged with introducing liquor on the reservation. He is one of the best known Indians on the reservation and one of the most enlightened among his people, having been chosen as secretary of the National Brotherhood of Indians. His integrity has never been questioned and the mistake is all the more regrettable for that reason.

On Trail of Horse Thieves.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor is on the trail of the persons who last week stole two horses from this city, one belonging to John Greulich and the other to J. E. Duke. They are supposed to be William Jordan and Julia Walker. They were traced to the John Day ranch of "Old Bill" Walker, the girl's father, where they spent last Friday night. Officers have been notified as far as Portland to be on the lookout for them. Jordan is about 33 years of age and the girl, who is part Indian, about 20.

Flirting Squaw Is Pummelled.

Alice Barnhart, a well known local squaw, was in police court yesterday afternoon on a charge of assault and battery but when Judge Fitz Gerald heard the story, he dismissed the case and informed the complaining witness

that she "got what was coming to her." It seems the complaining witness was a squaw of Lapwai, Idaho, who likes the looks of Alice's husband and proceeded to become flirtatious. When her attentions became to have effect upon the none-too-loyal spouse, Alice took a hand in the affair. In fact she took two hands. She tore a few strands of raven hair from the head of the other squaw and in other ways made her sorry for her actions.

Mrs. A. W. Nye, pioneer resident of this city, is seriously ill at her home on Water street with creeping paralysis. Her daughters, Mrs. Lachlan Macleay of Oswego, New York, and Mrs. Jessie Shults of Portland, are both here to care for her in her illness.

Two Marriage Licenses.

A marriage license was issued yesterday afternoon to Donald Cameron and Sarah A. Arnberg, both of Pilot Rock, and the couple were married last evening in the parlors of the Hotel St. George by Justice of the Peace Joe H. Parkes. They left today on No. 17 for Portland where they will spend a short honeymoon. A license to wed was issued today to David Cody and Gladys Ann Bottorff, a Freewater couple.

Committed to Asylum.

William Russell, 80 years old, a resident of College Place, Wash., who has been living with relatives in this city, was today ordered committed to the branch hospital, an examination having shown him to be mentally unbalanced. The cause of his derangement is ascribed by his son to watching at the sick beds of typhoid patients without sleep. It was thought best to send him to the hospital because of his habit of wandering from home.

Wants Custody of His Child.

Ira D. Holdman is appealing to the county court to be appointed guardian of his child, Ina Vanita Holdman who for the past two years has been living with Mr. and Mrs. John E. Hamer, now residents of Hermiston. His petition states that in 1904 his wife divorced him in Bellingham and has since married another man. The other three children are now with the petitioner and his mother. Mr. and Mrs. Hamer have been cited to appear in court on Thursday, May 15, to show cause if any why the father should not be appointed guardian of his child.

PLANS FOR RECLAIMING 20,000 ACRES OF LAND

Salem, Ore., May 13.—Plans and specifications calling for the reclamation of 20,000 acres of land in the Teel irrigation district in Umatilla county have been filed with State Engineer Lewis by W. B. Hinkle, engineer for the project. Under the plans it is proposed to build a 20-mile canal, one mile of which will pass through a tunnel, and construct a 90-foot dam. The cost of the project is estimated at \$1,000,000, and as soon as possible an election will be held on a bond issue in that sum to finance the project.

BIG DEAL IS MADE BY LOCAL CONCERN

By a deal consummated Saturday in Stockton, Calif., E. L. Smith & Co., of this city, have taken over the holdings of the Holt Manufacturing Co. in the city of Walla Walla and will hereafter conduct the agency for the Holt combined harvester in Umatilla and Union counties, Oregon, and Walla Walla county, Washington. The consideration involved in the transaction was \$42,500 cash, according to a statement made by Mr. Smith who arrived home this morning from Stockton.

The deal has been pending for some weeks, but was not finally closed until Mr. Smith made a trip to the California headquarters of the Holt company. The property transferred consists of an entire block on west Main street in Walla Walla, upon which there is a large building. James H. Sturgis, who has been associated with Mr. Smith for the past three years as junior member of the firm, will leave for Walla Walla in a few days and will manage the business of the company in that city.

E. L. Smith has been selling Holt combines for more than fifteen years. He it was that introduced the harvester into this section of the country, securing one of the machines in 1896 for his own use. It proved so successful that he secured a second machine in 1897 and commenced farming upon an extensive scale, renting land, harvesting big crops and purchasing land for himself with the money he secured for his wheat. The following year he took the agency for the harvester, carrying it as a side line in his implement store on Court street. After its superiority over the old stationary had been demonstrated, it found general use among the farmers of this county and Mr. Smith disposed of his other implements and specialized in the harvester. His son was interested with him for several years and, when he retired in order to engage in farming for himself, Mr. Sturgis was taken into the firm. Mr. Smith declares that since he has had the Holt agency in this county, he has placed over 400 of the machines and has never had a rejection.

The Holt Mfg. Co. conducted its own agency in Walla Walla but recently decided to push farther north and the local company was offered the agency.
