TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

Bismarck, N. D., May 28.—Benja-
min N. Ness of St. Paul was convicted
in the district court here of attempt-
ing to bribe Representative Briber
and Twitchell, members of the North
Dakota legislature. Extreme clem-
ency was recommended by the jury.
Ness was accused of offering bribes
in connection with the fight made
against a bill before the legislature
prohibiting the sale of snuff in this
state.

Calgary, Alta., May 28.—Another
change in the course of the Alberta
government prosecution of the prin-
ciples in Saturday's fatal prize fight
was made at a hearing late last night
when Tommy Burns and Arthur Pel-
key were committed to stand trial for
manslaughter in connection with the

death of Luther McCarty, and Wil-
liam McCarty and Eddie Smith were
released on \$500 bail each and order-
ed to appear as witnesses when the
case is tried.

Terre Haute, Ind., May 28.—Emil
Ehrmann, a wealthy manufacturer,
shot and killed Edward Wade, a
teamster last night when the latter
went to the assistance of a girl strik-
er. Ehrmann was arrested on a
charge of first degree murder and F.
H. Rockhart, manager of an overall
factory of which Ehrmann is presi-
dent, also was held in connection with
the shooting.

Chicago, May 28.—Letters to Miss
Alice Turrentine from the Rev. Rob-
ert F. T. Milligan asking her to be
his "queen of heaven" and asking
her to come and dwell in his home
as "the queen" and mentioning his 18
year old wife as his "sister wife" were

read in municipal court. Milligan was
on trial on a charge of attempt to
commit a crime.
