Hearty Salad.

For a substantial salad, place on each plate two or three leaves of lettuce, shredded. Slice a hard boiled egg and add to the lettuce, then some thin slices of radish and a little cheese run through the meat grinder. Put a spoonful of boiled salad dressing over it all.—New York Press.

To Keep Flowers.

Dip the flowers in melted paraffin, withdrawing them quickly. The liquid should only be hot enough to maintain its fluidity, and the flowers should be dipped one at a time, held by the stem and moved about for an instant to get rid of the air bubbles says the St. Louis Republic. Fresh flowers, free from moisture, make excellent specimens.

Porch Plant.

Cheap Hay Box.

When summer heat makes cooking a burden I make a fireless cooker out of a large candy pail, writes a contributor to the San Francisco Call.

The grocer gave me the pail, so my expense was for 10 yards of asbestos. I lined the bottom, sides and inside of the cover of the candy pail with the asbestos. Then I packed the pail with hay, pressing it tightly around a three quart granite pail with a close cover. Next I made a cushion for the top out of an old flour sack stuffed with hay. My cooker works as well as a more expensive one, and has saved me many times 10 cents in fuel.

In Rose Garden.

The rose garden requires constant attention. Stir the soil frequently to keep mellow and prevent weeds. No grass should ever be allowed to grow close to a rosebush, says the New Haven Journal Courier. In cultivating the plants care should be taken not to injure small roots.

Salt the Carpet.

Before sweeping the carpets take an old round tin, pierce holes in the bottom and fill with common salt, says the Chicago Journal. Sprinkle this over the carpet. It prevents the dust from rising, brightens the colors and prevents moths.

FLASHES FROM THE WIRE

Blaine, Wash., June 5.—Eight Russian aliens smuggled across the border and later rounded up near Bellingham are being held here. The leader, Pete Markow, is the only one of the eight who can speak English. The others who have been working in Canadian mills, possessed Russian passports.

San Diego, Cal., June 5.—Word has been received here that Julius Kromberg, said by some to be Sweden's foremost artist, has given his entire art collection, valued at thousands of dollars, to the Raja Yoga college, which Madame Katherine Tingley is establishing on the island of Visigo, Sweden.

Philadelphia, June 5.—Following closely on the heels of peace pacts between San Francisco and New York Chinese tong men, term of peace have been signed by the Hip Sing and On Leong tongs, the two leading Chinese factions in Philadelphia. Moy Ya Hah head of the On Leong tong and Wong Ding, chief of the Hip Sing, shook hands for the first time in years.

Vancouver, B. C., June 5.—Struck by a baseball, Henry Woley, a young boy, died from the injuries he sustained. The lad and a number of other boys were playing when the ball struck him and before assistance could be rendered he passed away.

Washington, June 5.—The public lands committee has voted to report Senator Chamberlain's bill creating a state forest reserve 50,000 acres out of the Santiam national forest, giving in exchange state lands in the forest reserve State students in forestry will receive instructions on this reserve, which is located in Oregon.

London, June 5.—Because he will be "too busy at the time," Chancellor David Lloyd-George has cancelled his proposed whirlwind tour of the United States in September. It has been planned for Lloyd-George to make 12 speeches in the United States and Canada.

ARTIFICIAL PROPAGATION OF THE DIAMOND-BACK TERRAPIN

Washington, D. C., June 5.—The Bureau of Fisheries, department of commerce, has just prepared a circular on the breeding and rearing of the diamond-back terrapin, which is a report of the work done along this line at the bureau's station at Beaufort, N. C. From what has been accomplished it appears probable that in favorable localities the business of propagating terrapins will be profitable and, if the necessary encouragement be given by the state, this rapidly vanishing animal may continue to be one of the sources of income to our fishermen.

Along the eastern and southern coasts of the United States there occur four well defined species and one subspecies of diamond back terrapins, as follows: The Carolina terrapin, which ranges from southern Virginia to Florida; the Chesapeake terrapin, which occurs in Chesapeake Bay and northward along the coast; the Florida terrapin, along the Gulf coast of Florida; the Louisiana terrapin, which inhabits the Gulf east and west of the mouth of the Mississippi river; and the Texas terrapin, along the central and southern coast of Texas.

The experimental work of the bureau, which forms the basis of this report, has dealt with two of these species, namely, the Carolina and Texas

terrapins. The latter species, however, has been kept in captivity too short a time to furnish data of any value. The Carolina terrapins, on the other hand, have been in the ponds at Beaufort over four years, and young bred from them have reached the age of 3 years. It is believed that the results with any other species would have been essentially the same.

The circular contains a full description of the conditions under which the terrapins are kept at Beaufort and of the methods of breeding and a statement of the observations made.

FASHIONABLE FUNCTION TAKES PLACE TONIGHT

Albert Hall, London, Will be Scene of Gaudy Event—Dancers Will Wear Costumes of Period of Louis XIV, XV or XVI—Prominent Americans to Attend.

London, June 5.—The most fashionable social function of the season will take place at Albert Hall tonight, when in the name of charity society will frolic at the gorgeous ball called "A Fete at Versailles." The ball is given for the benefit of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Help Society, and King George and Queen Mary and Queen Alexandra head the long list of patrons.

All the dancers will have to wear costumes of the period of Louis XIV, XV or XVI, from 1646 to 1793, and the ball will culminate at midnight in a grand spectacle in which Louis XIV will receive his contemporary reigning sovereigns attended by their courts. Many prominent Americans will be present, among them Lady Newborough (Grace Carr of Kentucky), and Lady Arthur Paget (Mary Stevens of New York), who have taken a leading part in the organization work. The former will represent Poland and the latter France in the spectacle of the nations.
