WHEAT MARKETS

Chicago, June 7.—Continuance of damage news from the southwest caused an opening advance of 1-4 to 5-c a bushel in the wheat market yesterday, with a closing 5-8 to 7-8 above Thursday.

While at the opening the July was showing the smallest advance, it was highest at the closing. This was due to short covering on a fair scale. Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the wheat market responded in a moderate way to the late steadiness of America. Later there was free covering by shorts and prices further advanced on an improved continental demand, with France bidding for wheat freely on nearby cargoes, light Argentine shipments, strength in Manitoba spot and a good local consumption. The large Indian shipments for week and forecast of liberal world's shipments checked the advance. In the United Kingdom rain is rather general, which is unfavorable for winter wheat.

PROMINENT PENDLETON BANKER IS OPTIMISTIC

(Continued from page one.)

In that time he talked of many things pertaining to current tendencies and from his conversation I should say that he is very optimistic for the future. But his optimism is conservative, for anyone who knows Mr. Rice knows that he does not allow himself to be swept off his feet on any proposition. Twenty-two years in the banking business has taught him the truth of the old adage about all not being gold that glitters and hence he is sometimes only lukewarm when others glow with enthusiasm. Therefore it was not surprising that, when avowing a hopeful view of the future, he sounded, here and there, a note of warning.

Real Prosperity.

There are only two kinds of real prosperity as Mr. Rice sees it, prosperity that comes from production, and prosperity that results from growth and development. In other words he rests no confidence in that community wealth that springs from a sudden and sounding boom, regarding it as unnatural, unstable and unsafe. "Prosperity," he said, "is not a question of the transfer of lands at higher valuations but it is a question of the development of lands to a higher state of civilization. Money should not be made through promotion and underwriting but through production."

"We have been through a period of boom prosperity," he went on, "and to some extent have overreached ourselves in the expansion of our credit. Just now we are going through a period of adjustment or liquidation of what might be termed 'over-boom.' We have need to trim our sails and the need is being recognized. We are about to enter upon an era of permanent building in which we will evolve improved methods of farming our land, build good roads and good streets, erect new buildings, establish and maintain schools and other institutions of betterment in a fitting manner. Such achievement must come gradually, for a healthy growth and development requires time. Much haste, much waste."

The Auto Craze.

It was just about here that he interpolated a few remarks of another strain. They were called forth by an automobile speeding past the bank windows. He shook his head solemnly as he watched the gasoline car around the corner. "There's a false note in our harmony," he said, and when I looked at him questioning he went on to explain. "Auto owning has got to a stage where it is a craze. People, ordinarily possessed of good sense and sound judgment, are absolutely losing their heads over automobiles. Many are plastering mortgages on their property in order to ride about like their neighbors. Others are spending money with car salesmen which should be applied on indebtedness and the fault lies to some extent with the salesmen for they are pushing their wares too hard. The automobile is a great convenience in its place. People who are moderately

well to do can afford to own a car for the pleasure derived from it but a man's time must be mighty valuable if he purchases an auto and makes interest upon his investment through its time-saving properties. The great trouble with some of the farmers is that they can't stand to be passed on the road. The old team of grays and the buckboard served his needs very well until his neighbor began to bear down on him with a honk and whisk past him in an auto. Then he decided that the time had arrived to discard the buckboard. I don't want you to understand me as opposed to automobiles. I recognize their value and the fact that they have come to stay. And I don't mean to say that only the rich shall own them nor that a man shall not go in debt to buy one. But I do say that a person already involved should hesitate before purchasing a car, for an automobile is as often a liability as an asset.

Defines Big Farmer.

"By the way, how about the big farmer? Don't you think he is a menace to the best development of the country?" was a question asked him and here is where there was a little surprise forthcoming for Mr. Rice took a stand not common. "I differ with many people on this question," he stated, "for I do not share the objection which many find to the big farm for the reason that the big farmer has brought his land under a high state of cultivation. I have been in this inland empire country 34 years and in that time I have seen a great change in the best methods of farming. It has not been so long ago when the most improved methods consisted of tilling the bottom lands and the rich hillside, summer fallowing late to kill the weeds, and leaving the land in big lumps. The big farmer has brought the land under a high state of cultivation and is getting the maximum returns from his land under the present system of farming. And the present system will remain just as long as it is profitable. That's a fact we can't get away from. Nothing will break up the big farms but necessity. When the time comes that his broad acres cease to yield him a good margin of profit, then your big farmer will begin to unload his holdings and farm that which he keeps more intensively. Until that time arrives, the big farmer will be with us. And I am not so sure that we don't want him for I believe it is largely the big farmer that makes the big merchant."

But here again a note of warning crept into his conversation. It was a warning to the farmer who is inclined to emulate his more established neighbor by doing things on a large scale and plunging himself heavily in debt. "Many men know how to farm and they are confident of themselves but they lack experience. They have not been through a panic when there is a money stringency and when it is hard to realize at any sacrifice on what they possess."

The Banking Business.

"How about the growth of the banking business?" was the next question propounded to him and his answer was that the banking business has kept pace with the growth and development of the country. "The capital, surplus and deposits of the banks over the country have grown at the same rate as have other lines of business and industry. The first statement I ever saw issued by the First National Bank of New York many years ago showed deposits amounting to approximately \$25,000,000, and the last one I saw showed deposits of about \$120,000,000. The country banks have grown in about the same proportion."

About Taxes.

To the question as to whether or not he considered the taxes too high his answer was short and to the point. "It is not a question of how much we spend," he said, "but how we spend it. We want good institutions, we want good roads, we want to supply the needs of a growing and developing country. We are willing to pay for progress but not to overpay. Many times it happens that the money appropriated for a certain work, or a good deal of it, is diverted in passing through too many hands and but little results are apparent to the taxpayer."

"This condition is, however, passing," he went on, "for the whole nation is aroused both politically and commercially and it means a cleansing and a general readjustment. The results will be higher standards of business and higher standards of politics. The sound, capable and conservative business man will supplant the wildcat promoter and the statesman will push aside the grafter and professional politician. That's my prediction for the future in a nutshell."

In view of this prediction, one does not have to be a logician to draw the conclusion that Mr. Rice looks at the future with the eye of an optimist.
