NEW INTERURBAN STATION IN DALLAS TO COST \$2,000,000

Plans Just Made Public Show a Nine Story Building With An Immense Basement Occupying an Entire City Block—Ambition is for Finest in Land.

Dallas, Tex.—The Interurban terminal station to be built at Jackson and Browder streets will occupy an entire city block; the building will be nine stories high with an immense basement. There are to be 12 tracks in the train shed. The total cost will be close to \$2,000,000.

The combined building and train sheds will extend 200 feet on the Jackson and Wood street sides and 270 feet on the Browder street side. The building will have an aggregate floor space of 155,000 square feet. The train sheds can house 35 interurban trains at a time. All of the interurban lines now running into Dallas being built into Dallas and those which are to be built in the future are expected to use these terminals.

It is estimated by those in charge that 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 people will be brought into or taken out of Dallas, passing through this station during the year 1914, and that this number will continue to increase as more lines are built, and as the country tributary to Dallas continues to fill up. It is also figured that when the various interurban lines now under way are in operation that 500 interurban trains will pass through this station every day.

Just what the Interurban activity means to Dallas can readily be seen, for at present there are lines only to Ft. Worth, Sherman and Waxahatchie. At the present time other lines are actually being built to Corsicana, Waco and Greenville, and it will be but a comparatively short time until work is commenced on another line to Terrell. In addition to these lines, a number of others are being considered by various traction companies.

The Indianapolis terminal station has had the reputation of being the finest in the country. Mr. Parker says that the new Dallas terminals will be far ahead of those in Indianapolis from every standpoint. Not only will the accommodations for the public be more thoroughly provided and up-to-date, and the ground area more extensive, but the building will be larger and will be vastly more expensive.

JOHN STACK IS MAROONED.

Former City Councilman On Strawberry Island.

Pasco, Wash., June 10.—John Stack former councilman of Walla Walla, has been marooned for several days on Strawberry Island, about eight-tenths of a mile east of this city in Snake river. The Columbia river is now higher than it has been since 1894. Strawberry island contains about 30 acres. Mr. Stack has been raising fruit, and dairying on the place. Early in the week, Mr. Stack and his stock, and all belongings were in serious danger. Yesterday and today the water has receded. He has ample food for the family and stock and telephonic connection has been restored. No serious consequences are now anticipated.

BULL GORES HORSE IN VAIN ATTEMPT TO KILL FARMER

La Grande, Ore., June 10.—Horns of an angry gull gored a valuable horse belonging to Mr. Morrison, who lives on the Henry Rhinehart place between Summerville and Elgin, and while the animal may recover from the wounds it is not at all certain, and furthermore Mr. Morrison figured in a very fortunate escape from death. The affair happened during the evening hours. Mr. Morrison had sent a daughter to the pasture on horseback to round up the cattle for the night but an infuriated bull in the herd gave chase and the girl rode up to her father, who himself set about the task. He brought a gun with him and on entering the pasture was set upon by the bull. He fought the charging brute with the gun barrel but the animal evaded the blows and buried his horns in the flanks of the horse, mauling the horse's heart by a matter of inches, and Mr. Morrison's leg by a smaller margin. The horse was not so badly injured but that he could carry his rider to safety, but

had the horse been killed outright or Mr. Morrison's leg broken by the charge he would doubtless have been gored to death.

D. P. A. Carleton of La Grande was called to treat the wounded horse and reports it to be in a critical condition.

PROFESSOR GOES ABROAD.

A. G. B. Bouquet, Horticulturist at O. A. C., Sails for England to Study Gardens.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., June 10.—Prof. A. G. B. Bouquet, head of the vegetable gardening department at the Oregon Agricultural College, leaves today with his wife to spend the summer in England. They sail from New York June 18 on the Cunarder Campana and will visit Mr. Bouquet's old home in Yelten, Sanderstead, Surrey Co. He will study particularly vegetable gardening methods in the big island, and also general horticulture and agricultural methods of England.

During Mr. Bouquet's absence his work will be carried on by W. H. Dunha of Portland, who graduates from a special course in vegetable gardening at O. A. C. this month.

KANSAS RAINS CAUSE A DROP IN WHEAT

Chicago, June 10.—The crop situation in Kansas was the criterion by which the trade judged wheat values this week, and when rains fell over the Kansas wheat belt and minimized the danger of serious damage from drought, the market commenced a decline. Covering by shorts on Friday served as a temporary check, but when the market closed July was 1-8 under closing price last Saturday, and September 2-4 under.

RAILROAD SUE FOR FIFTEEN MILLION

Des Moines, Ia., June 10.—Under their contract with the Polk county board of supervisors, George S. Wright and Addison G. Kistler, attorneys, filed suit in the district court against the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway company to force the collection of \$15,559,000, in alleged unpaid taxes. Interest of six per cent together with a 50 per cent statutory penalty is demanded.
