ELECTRICAL PARADE SEEN BY THOUSANDS

Portland, Ore., June 11.—The principal attraction of Portland's rose festival yesterday was the allegorical electrical pageant "Flowers and Gems of Oregon" that took place last night. Eighteen floats ablaze with many colored electric bulbs each depicting a flower of Oregon and a gem constituted the display which attracted the largest concourse of people of the festival week to date.

The only other scheduled feature of the day was the decorated motor-cycle parade in the morning in which more than 100 machines were in line. An unrecorded event that nearly cost the lives of two persons occurred at the Oaks Park where the press club

had sent their Blackfoot Indian guests from Glacier Park to take in the sights. The band was allowed to swim in an inclosed tank which failed to satisfy and they insisted in sliding down a chute into the Willamette river proper. All except the granddaughter of Chief Three Bears could swim. As soon as the girl struck the water she began floundering about, to the amusement of the crowd, and it was not until the girl had gone down twice that the life guards realized that she was drowning. One of the guards was seized with a vice-like grip by the girl and it required the combined efforts of another guard and several people on shore to save both lives. The girl was unconscious nearly half an hour before she was revived. The festival will reach its zenith today. Two large parades are scheduled, the automobile parade in the afternoon and a pageant entitled "A Night in Rosaria," in the evening. In

both parades visitors from many towns in the northwest will participate.

HOME SCIENCE COURSES IN MANY HIGH SCHOOLS

Many high schools are installing home science courses next year, or enlarging the work already begun the past year. The young women of the graduating class at the Oregon Agricultural College are finding no difficulty in securing contracts for the fall.

Newberg is organizing a course with Miss Mary Cate of Hillsboro, an O. A. C. graduate who has been teaching at Independence, in charge. Miss Margaret Osborne of Newport is going to Prairie City and Henrietta Walker of Cleveland to Centralia, Wash. Miss Opal Wassner of Corvallis will assist Miss Karen Davis of Portland at Baker. At Springfield

Miss Mary Hartung of Eugene is to teach. Miss Helen Cowgill of Baker will remain at Hillsboro where she has been teaching this semester while completing the work for her degree. Della Purves of Seattle, Wash., is assisting in the Corvallis schools. Many others have contracts under consideration, or have refused them because they are to take charge of homes of their own.

ANXIOUS TO BE OFF FOR NORTH

STEFANSSON, THE EXPLORER, ON WAY TO FROZEN LAND

Says He Will Stay Away for Three and a Half Years—Party Will Take Plenty of Time. As Schedules Will Be Thrown to the Wind—Unknown Land to Be Mapped.

Calgary, Alberta, June 11.—Anxious to be off to the frozen north, Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the great Arctic explorer, passed through Calgary June 6th on his way to Victoria, B. C., where he will embark with his companions, to close if possible, the last chapter in the book of exploration begun in 1482 by Christopher Columbus.

"The world wonders why I am in such a hurry to get back north," said Stefansson while taking in the sights of Calgary. "I was offered good money to remain and lecture, but I refused. It was either a long lecture tour and no expedition or the expedition at once. By remaining longer in civilization I was afraid that my blonde Eskimos would perish before I could reach them again. In nine months the McKenzie Eskimos died off from 2000 to 40, because of disease brought to them by the white trader and whaler. As I have said before, I would like to see a quarantine established between the Eskimos and the white man, for the latter cannot bring the former anything that will do them any good, but on the contrary, will bring them disease and discontentment which ultimately means the annihilation of the tribes of the north.

"I go to the north as no other explorer has ever gone. It is my intention to stay away three and one-half years, which is longer than any other man planned to remain away. As a matter of fact there have been explorers who have not returned from expeditions for periods of three years or longer, but they were held from returning by unforeseen circumstances, their original plans being to get back in at least a year.

"My party intends to take its time. Schedules will be thrown to the wind. If there is a new and unexplored continent north, we intend to explore and claim it for the British sovereign. I am not sure that there is, but should there be, it will mean that the last unknown land will be placed on the map, and the work that Columbus began on his hemisphere will be ended.

"We are in a hurry to be off. Every day that we remain in the south after June 20th will worry me as we are desirous of taking advantage of the favorable winds going north. We will not take along a wireless outfit but have with us a complete moving picture equipment both for entertainment and for taking films of the country we pass through."

COST OF A COLLEGE EDUCATION.

Figures tabulated at Yale show that the average cost of the four-year college course to students who obtain the bachelor of arts degree is \$4,370. This is divided among the four years as follows: Freshman year, \$1,020; sophomore year, \$1,052; junior year, \$1,136; and senior year, \$1,162.

This average and the averages for each year are far greater than the general average for students in all American colleges. Some time ago John Corbin, in a series of articles upon the colleges, remarked that "a four years' course will probably cost somebody about \$2,000." In the same series of articles, however, he showed that a thrifty and economical student might easily complete the four years' course at any of the American colleges for less than \$2,000, and that this is frequently done.

At the smaller colleges and in the state universities of the west the average is considerably below that of the larger eastern schools. Tuition in all American colleges is low. The cost of books and laboratory apparatus is comparatively small. In most college towns board and lodging may be procured, either through college dormitories and commons, or in private homes, at a very reasonable rate. The year's expenses, by rigid economy, may be made to approximate \$400, pretty closely, and thus the four years will cost only a little over \$1,600.

There are thousands of ambitious young men in the United States who support themselves while at college. If these were compelled to pay over \$4,000, it would be impossible for them to do so. The Yale average, therefore, is not a fair test of the cost of a college career, and the figures need not deter any ambitious boy or any family of moderate means.

If \$500 annually can be spared to the youngster, and he is made of the right stuff, he can readily enough get through his course, and need not be ashamed of himself on the score of parsimony either.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

Tokio, Japan.—Japan's first dog show was held recently in Tokio. The chin, or Japanese pug, so long a pet in Japan, has become a favorite in other countries as well. This little creature was, in the old court life, put under the care of a special woman.

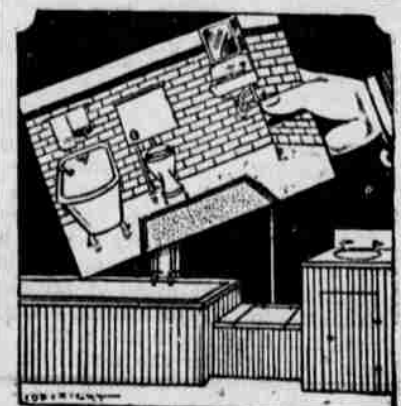
