PENNANT RAISING CEREMONIES TODAY

Walla Walla, June 12.—Preparations for the raising of the Bears' 1912 Championship Pennant at Sportsman park this afternoon were completed yesterday by a committee from the Boosters club and the local management. The event promises to be a memorable one in the history of baseball in Walla Walla.

It will mark the first organized baseball championship ever won by a Garden City team, upon which future generations may look back with pride. Since the organization of the Western Tri-State League, the Bears have been the leading team and the local fans have almost always given them loyal support.

There will be music for the occasion and short ceremonies preceding, after which the Bears and La Grande will play their third game of the present series, with probably "Tiny" Leonard in the box for the home club and Nockeby for the Spuds.

Last year the La Grande team finished last in the race, but now they are maintaining a higher position and threaten to break into the first division at any time. They are the Bears' jinx, too, for the games are always close and hard to win. For this reason the game this afternoon should be one of the best of the season.

Although Thursday is usually Ladies' Day, the management has decided to charge the fair sex admission this afternoon, because of the special ceremony and the fact that the club needs the money. This day will be made up for, however, later in the season.

THOUSANDS LEFT TO TUBE CO. EMPLOYEES

William C. Cotton, Late Treasurer of American Plant, Divides Upward of \$40,000 Among Score of Workers—Many Other Personal Bequests in Will.

Dedham, Mass.—More than a score of employees of the American Tube Works of Boston receive bequests under the will of William C. Cotton of 357 Kent street, Brookline, former treasurer of the firm, which with two codicils was filed Tuesday in the Norfolk registry of probate here.

Miss Elizabeth A. Cotton receives the personal property, 461 shares of stock in the American Tube Works, all real estate on Beacon, Kent, Chatham and Borland streets, Brookline, owned by the testator, an annual income of \$15,000 from the estate and a sixth of the residue after other provisions have been satisfied.

The Bears got one in the third by a hit by Davis and an error by Naughton, another in the fifth on hits by Martini and Sheely, and two more in the sixth by Lundstrum's single, Harmon's three bagger and a wild pitch by Jamieson.

MAN WHO TERRORIZED SETTLERS NEAR THE DALLES IS SHOT DOWN

the youthful highwayman. Pettijohn's career of crime, in brief, from then until he met death, is:

He shot at Ellis and George six times when they saw him across a canyon in the Three Mile valley. The bullets did not reach their mark.

He went to the E. Hyer home on the Friday place on the Benson road. He shot at Hyer three times. Two shots tore through Hyer's clothing, but didn't wound him.

Threatened Mrs. Hyer with death if she didn't give him a pair of spurs.

Captured Hyer's son-in-law, Ed Wallace, and held him captive for some time, making him break into William Hickman's ranch home and hunt for spurs and gun.

Made Wallace, "Spot" Ferguson and boy search Wickha barn for spurs; later made them lie down in road while he walked away. Shot several times at Ferguson. One shot hit Ferguson's dog.

Placing gun against head of small daughter of Mrs. Ferguson, threatened to kill child if Mrs. Ferguson "made a noise." Falling to find spurs, or gun, at Ferguson home, went away without harming woman or children.

At point of revolver, compelled Mrs. Roy Taylor to give him rifle and ammunition.

By stubbornly placing his horse across road nearly caused Monroe Grimes to wreck his automobile in getting around him while he was in road.

Compelled Grant Bolton to point of gun, to drive a mile to Fred Drake ranch and search barn for spurs.

Tried to break into home of Artie Harriman and was instantly killed.

No means of identification were found on the dead man's person. However, an envelope addressed to "Miss Beesie McCullough, Echo, Oregon," was found, together with several love letters from "Beesie M." to him.

Coroner C. N. Burget got into communication Tuesday night with Miss McCullough, who in one of her letters to Pettijohn said she is 18 years old, and she identified the desperado as Cecil Pettijohn, Coroner Burgett talking with Thomas Pettijohn of Dayton, Wash., yesterday and the latter established the identity of the highwayman beyond a question of a doubt as his brother.

Sheriff Chrisman was notified Tuesday afternoon about a half hour after Pettijohn stole the horse at the O. K. stable, and with Chief of Police Gibbons started after the desperado. They followed along the Dufur road and Pettijohn by cutting through Thompson's addition and going across country, threw the officers off the trail.

After going several miles, the officials returned to this city and then started out again on the trail. In the meantime Deputy Sheriff Allen took up the hunt. They did everything they could to find Pettijohn and reached the Harriman ranch shortly after the shooting.

PHILADELPHIA IS SIXTH GRAIN PORT

Philadelphia.—Among Atlantic seaports Philadelphia ranked sixth in exportation of grain and flour this year to April 26, as shown by statistics issued by the Chamber of Commerce.

The figures cover shipments of domestic as well as Canadian bonded grain flour in transit and indicate that Baltimore led with 28,135,000 bushels; New York second with 24,500,000 bushels, and Boston, New Orleans and St. John, N. B., all exceeding Philadelphia, which handled only 8,752,000 bushels.
