TO WAGE FIGHT ON COMMERCE COURT

Washington, June 16.—Fate of the commerce court, that tribunal long on trial as a useless appendage of the government will be decided on June 25, when its opponents in democratic caucus, will make a desperate effort to block further appropriations for its future maintenance.

Representative Adamson of Georgia, chairman of the house interstate commerce committee, and Representa-

tive Sims of Tennessee, ranking members of the committee, today announced their opposition to the tribunal, denouncing it as "a blight on the efficiency of the interstate commerce commission."

Representative Broussard of Louisiana, declared vigorous opposition to this program, asserting that a fight would be made not only to maintain the court but to enlarge its scope.

MICHIGAN COAL OUTPUT CUT BY LABOR TROUBLES

Washington.—The production of coal in Michigan in 1912, according to

E. W. Parker of the United States geological survey, amounted to 1,206,230 short tons, valued at \$2,399,451, compared with 1,476,074 tons, valued at \$2,791,461, in 1911. The decrease of 269,844 tons, or 18.3 per cent, in 1912, was in close proportion to the time lost at most of the larger mines by reason of the suspension from April to May 31 or June 10 or 15, pending the renewal of the wage agreements. The time lost by the suspension was equal to 17.9 per cent of the time made. The decreased production was, moreover, partly offset by a gain in price from an average of \$1.89 a ton in 1911 to \$1.99 in 1912, so that

whereas the decrease in tonnage was 18.3 per cent, the decrease in value was only 14 per cent.

Of the total production in 1912 more than half (635,560 tons) was mined by machines, of which 125 were in use. Of the remainder, 443,222 tons was reported as shot off the solid, and 120,637 tons as mined by hand.

The number of men employed in the coal mines of Michigan in 1912 was 3113, a decrease from 3223 men in 1911 and the average number of working days decreased from 218 to 183.

The exhaustion of the forests and

the decline of the lumber industry have created a demand for coal to supply the salt works and other manufacturing establishments of the state.

Prior to 1896 the production had exceeded 100,000 tons during four years only. In 1897 it exceeded 200,000 tons; in 1899 it exceeded 600,000 tons and in 1891 it was more than 1,200,000 tons. The maximum output of 2,035,858 tons was reached in 1907.

THELMA COUNTY RAISES 1,000,000 POUNDS OF WOOL

Red Bluff, Cal.—The output of wool from Tehama county for this

season amounts to 1,000,000 pounds. This is said to be slightly less than last year. The price paid for the 1913 production is over \$150,000.

The quality of the wool this year is said to be excellent. The price of the wool, however, is said to have been lower this season, an average of 13 cents per pound being paid. Less wool was produced this year than last, estimates placing the falling off at two pounds less per sheep.

Of the 1,000,000 pounds produced, 150,000 pounds are still on the market. Tehama county produced over one third of the wool in California.
