NEW METHODS PAVE THE WAY

SCIENTIFIC MANAGEMENT IS APPLIED BY THE DEMOCRATS

New Efficiency Methods Used to Smooth Out the Way for the Underwood Tariff Bill—Senate Has "Whip" Something New in That Body—Will Speed up the Work.

Washington, June 18.—The senate is getting the first taste of scientific management in politics. The democratic majority is applying the new efficiency methods to smooth out the way for the Wilson-Underwood tariff bill.

In the first place, the democrats now have a "whip," James Hamilton Lewis, senator from Illinois. Nobody ever heard of a "whip" in the senate before. It was an outgrowth of unyielding majorities in the house, where the speaker used to appoint an "assistant floor leader" whose job was to hurry the "boys" on to the floor at times when the party needed their votes. "Jim" Watson of Indiana, when he was "whip" made the job a real one. Watson was renowned as never having lost a vote while he was in congress. That was in the old Cannon days. Watson used to stand at the entrance of the house, and as the members trooped in would say "vote aye" or "vote no" and the statesmen would so answer to their names. A majority of 'em didn't know what they were voting on, but they were certain that Jim Watson always had the right dope and they

couldn't be recorded against their party.

Lewis' appointment is a further illustration of the democratic "scientific management" program for the senate. In businesslike manner the new majority has already done away with the furnishing of mineral water to solons; discharged all the masseurs, bath attendants and servants in the fine senate bath room; cut down on the number of clerks and "speeded" up routine of senate procedure by change in the rules. It will be Lewis' duty to "speed up" the work on the senate floor.

It is quite a tribute to the Illinois senator that he should be chosen for this difficult post. Moreover his appointment is another breaking of precedents. Lewis came to the senate on March 4 and three months later he was made "assistant majority leader." In the old days it took ten years for a senator to "arrive" in the upper house. Moreover, custom prescribed that during the new senator's first year of office, he shouldn't open his mouth in debate. Lewis, however, has impressed his colleagues in the senate inside of three months that he is a lawyer of remarkable attainments, a speaker of polish and charm, and one who has a most persuasive manner.

President Wilson is understood fully to approve of the plan to reduce control of the senate floor by the democrats to a science. While granting the minority a full exercise of its right of debate, it is said to be the administration view that henceforth the majority must hold the discussion down as closely as possible to actual business.

WANT A JOB? HERE'S ONE

UNCLE SAM IS LOOKING FOR THE AVERAGE MAN

Secretary Daniels of the Navy Department Has Some Advanced Views Regarding the Way the Navy Should Be Run—Believes the Navy Should Be Made Attractive.

Washington, June 18.—If you are a man, and are between the ages of 17 and 35 years and are from five feet two inches to six feet one inch, and weigh in proportion, with a chest measurement of from 33 to 36 3-4 inches, dependent upon your age, height and weight, Secretary of the Navy Daniels has a job for you. Moreover, he has declared that if you pass all these qualifications and want the job, he will give you as fine an opportunity to see the world as you could get anywhere, on board a floating home that was built for from \$5,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

Secretary Daniels has some advanced views regarding the way the navy of the United States ought to be run, and he is especially "strong" for reforms that will attract and hold the best class of men and boys the country can provide for the navy. He believes the navy should be made attractive to the young man, the college graduate, the school boy and to every man and boy who come up to the physical qualifications mentioned. Perhaps the most radical of the reforms Secretary Daniels would like to see effected is his pet plan to change the rules of enlistment so that it would be possible for college men to accept

the hospitality of the navy and cruise as man-of-war-men during the vacations. He would have it so that college men who have a leaning for travel during their vacations, could take such cruises and acquaint themselves with the duties of a sailor.

Secretary Daniels, explaining his project today, declared he believes every young man should have a working knowledge of the navy. If this were the case, he said, the rank and file of the navy would be raised even higher than it is now.

The secretary's plan is virtually the creation of a volunteer citizen reserve. He would have conditions such that in case of necessity there would be thousands of young men as useful as they were willing to go behind the big guns and uphold the prestige of the United States navy.

Although Secretary Daniels is an avowed "man of peace," he believes in maintaining a high degree of preparedness, and it is his aim to educate the young men so that the navy can be placed on a war footing at very short notice.

At the present time, figures at the navy department show today, the navy is approximately 4500 men short of the authorized enlistment number. Under the Daniels regime every effort will be made to fill these vacancies with enlisted men, as well as to qualify as many more as possible who are now in civilian life, for possible emergency work.

This is one of the reasons for the attractive cruise which has been mapped out for the Atlantic fleet this year. The coming cruise will be in the Mediterranean where every port of moment will be touched and sailors given ample opportunity to spend many hours on shore. Similar cruises are today being mapped out for each succeeding year, and while Secretary Daniels is at the head of the navy department there will be no fear, he

declares, of Jack Tar having too much work and no play.

Following the Mediterranean cruise, it is planned for the fleet to go through the Panama canal to Asiatic ports. This trip is only embryo at the present time. It was said at the department today that announcement of the itinerary for this trip may be made within the next few months.

SHE WINS HUSBAND ARTER CARRYING MAIL 17 YEARS

Woman Has Traveled 100,000 Miles and Has the Unique Record of Never Having Missed a Train—Recently Renewed Four Year Contract With Government.

Stockbridge, Mass. — Miss Florence S. Markham will make her trip as usual carrying the mail between Interlaken and Stockbridge, despite that she has just been married to Archibald Boyd, foreman of a contracting company.

For 24 years she has made the round trip twice a day, traveling more than 1000 miles. That she has just been married was confirmed by Steve C. Burghardt, postmaster at Interlaken. He was certain she would report for work today, however, declaring she had not missed a day's work in all the 24 years she has carried the mail between the two points.

Since the announcement was made on March 4 last that her mail carrying contract with the government had been renewed for four years at \$300 a year, Mrs. Boyd has received more than 100 proposals of marriage from nearly every state in the union. The

bridegroom is an old friend.

Since Mrs. Boyd first began carrying the mail in May, 1889, she has never missed the train. One day last autumn when an automobile ran into her wagon and took off a wheel a mile from the station, she shouldered the mail bag, ran all the way to the station and threw the bag into the mail car as the train was pulling out. When winter storms have prevented her from breaking through drifts by team she has carried the mail on her back.

FORESTERS ARE GATHERING DATA IN COAST WOOD

San Francisco, Cal.—Reconnaissance work on the California national forest has been started. This is in accordance with the plans of the forest service to cruise 387,500 acres of timber land in California during this summer. The work on the sierra national forest began June 15, and on the other forests by July 1.

It is planned to cover 103,000 acres on Corbin and Thomas creeks and the middle fork of Eel river. The methods of reconnaissance have now been standardized in this district in order to insure uniform results. The party will be divided into two-men crews, one of which will take notes on the character of the timber and reproduction and do the estimating, while the other runs the compass and does the mapping. The timber on a strip one chain wide through the middle of each "forty" is estimated, this being 5 per cent of the total volume.

This work will result in detailed topographic maps and estimates of the stand of timber for each logging unit covered. This data is necessary to meet the increasing demand for national forest stumpage and to furnish applicants with detailed information on desired logging areas.
