A visit to the Volcanic Islands will be a feature of the return trip.

RANCHER LOSES HAND IN FEED CUTTER, GETS PISTOL, KILLS HIMSELF

Martin Michael Goes Direct to Bankhouse and Shoots Self With Remaining Hand.

Kennewick, Wash., June 21.—Crazed with pain and harassed with the prospect of going through life a cripple, Martin Michael, a ranch hand on the Groscep place, on the Yakima river, took his own life.

A short time before the tragedy, Michael while in the act of chopping feed, got his right hand caught in the machine, and it was completely severed at the wrist. Michael went to the bank house, secured a six shooter and with his left hand sent a bullet through his head. The cook, hearing a shot made an investigation, traced blood to the bankhouse and found Michael lying on the floor dead.

ARTIST KILLS HIMSELF WHEN HIS SIGHT FAILS

Carl Mauch Bemoans His Inability to Paint Pictures of Years' Dreaming.

Chicago, June 21.—Despondent because his eyes failed him just when he conceived, after years of dreaming, the picture he hoped would make him famous, Carl Mauch, an artist, took poison and died from its effects. He was 63, and rapidly losing his sight.

Recently Mauch told a fellow member of the Palette and Chisel Club that the inspiration of his life had come to him and bemoaned the fact that his eyes were failing, and that he never again would touch a brush to canvas.

Mauch was born in Wurttemberg, Germany, and his club fellows tell a story of how, when a boy, he whipped the future king of the province. According to them, it was the rule at the school which Mauch attended that the prince should always be the winner of any game. When he saw his friends contriving that the prince should be the victor, he flew into a rage and attacked his young majesty.
