Dusting Made Easy.
Oil cleaning is lessening the labor of housekeepers and producing more sanitary results. It is no longer necessary to dust floors on knees or to flit dust into the air with feather or dry cloth dusters. Loosely woven cloth is chemically treated so that it absorbs dust into its texture and leaves a polished surface on furniture at each stroke. These dust cloths cost 15 to 25 cents. Bags of doubled cloth, prepared with oil and fitted to brooms and floor brushes sell for 35 to 50 cents. Long-handled mops with absorbent yard can be had for \$1.50, while separate "mop heads" for your own handles are 50 cents. Special small mops for inaccessible places are 25 cents.—Mothers Magazine.

Eyelets in Panama Hats.

Selection of Correct Dress for Wear on Ocean.

You will find it very difficult to reach any baggage in the hold after the steamer has started, says Harper's Bazar. You should pack everything that you can possibly need on the voyage in your steamer trunk. It is surprising how little one needs. Do not make the mistake of taking old clothes to wear on the steamer. It is far better to keep the old clothes for rapid traveling on the other side, which is very hard on clothes. Nothing will harm the clothes you wear on the steamer, and the world you move in there is a very small and surprisingly observant one. One good looking suit with a waist to match, a smart ulster and hat, and the best of shoes are necessary if you are to retain your self-respect after you meet that little world. even, dictate an early conclusion of the deliberations of the session; but there are occasions of public duty when these things which touch us privately seem very small; when the work to be done is so pressing and so fraught with big consequences that we know that we are not at liberty to weight against it any point of personal sacrifice. We are now in the presence of such an occasion. It is absolutely imperative that we should give the business men of this country a banking and currency system by means of which they can make use of the freedom of enterprise and of individual initiative which we are about to bestow upon them.

We are about to set them free; we must not leave them without the tools of action when they are free. We are about to set them free by removing the trammels of the protective tariff.

Ever since the Civil War they have waited for this emancipation and for the free opportunities it will bring with it. It has been reserved for us to give it to them. Some fell in love, indeed, with the slothful security of their dependence upon the government; some took advantage of the shelter of the nursery to set up a mimic mastery of their own within its walls. Now both the tonic and the discipline of liberty and maturity are to ensue. There will be some readjustments of purpose and point of view. There will follow a period of expansion and new enterprise, freshly conceived. It is for us to determine now whether it shall be rapid and facile and of easy accomplishment. This it can not be unless the resourceful business men who are to deal with the new circumstances are to have at hand and ready for use the instrumentalities and convenience of free enterprise which independent men need when acting on their own initiative.

It is not enough to strike the shackles from business. The duty of statesmanship is not negative merely. It is constructive also. We must show that we understand what business needs and that we know how to supply it. No man, however, casual and superficial his observation of the conditions now prevailing in the country, can fail to see that one of the chief things business needs now, and will need increasingly as it gains in scope and vigor in the years immediately ahead of us, is the proper means by which readily to vitalize its credit, corporate and individual and its imaginative brains. What will it profit us to be free if we are not to have the best and most accessible instrumentalities of commerce and enterprise? What will it profit us to be quit of one kind of monopoly if we are to remain in the grip of another and more effective kind? How are we to gain and keep the confidence of the business community unless we show that we know how both to aid and protect it? What shall we say if we make fresh enterprise necessary and also make it very difficult by leaving all else except the tariff just as we found

It? The tyrannies of business, big and little, lie within the field of credit. We know that. Shall we not act upon the knowledge? Do we not know how to act upon it? If a man cannot make his assets available to pleasure, his assets of capacity and character and resource, what satisfaction is it to him to see opportunity beckoning to him on every hand when others have the keys of credit in their pockets and treat them as all but their own private possessions? It is perfectly clear that it is our duty to supply the new banking and currency system the country needs, and that it will immediately need it more than ever.

The only question is, when shall we supply it—now, or later, after the demands shall have become reproaches that we were so dull and so slow? Shall we hasten to change the tariff laws and then be laggards about making it possible and easy for the country to take advantage of the change? There can be only one answer to that question. We must act now, at whatever sacrifice to ourselves. It is a duty to which the circumstances forbid us to postpone. I should be recreant to my deepest convictions of public obligation did I not press it upon you with solemn and urgent insistence.

The principles upon which we should act are also clear. The country has sought and seen its path in this matter within the last few years—sees it more clearly now than it ever saw it before—much more clearly than when the last legislative proposals on the subject were made. We must have a currency, not rigid as now, but readily, elastically responsive to sound credit, the expanding and contracting credits of every day transactions, the normal ebb and flow of personal and corporate dealings. Our banking laws must mobilize reserves; must not permit the concentration anywhere in a few hands of the monetary resources of the country or their use for speculative purposes in such volume as to hinder or impede or stand in the way of other more legitimate, more fruitful uses. And the control of the system of banking and of issue which our new laws are to set up must be public, not private, must be vested in the government itself, so that the banks may be the instruments, not the masters, of business and of individual enterprises and initiative.

The committees of the congress to which legislation of this character is offered, have devoted careful and dispassionate study to the means of modernizing these objects. They have honored me by consulting me. They are ready to suggest action. I have come to you, as the head of the government and the responsible leader of the party in power, to urge action now, while there is time to serve the country deliberately, and as we should, in a clear air of common counsel. I appeal to you with a deep conviction of duty. I believe that you share this conviction. I therefore appeal to you with confidence. I am at your service without reserve to play my part in any way you may call upon me to play it in this great enterprise of exigent reform which it will dignify and distinguish us to perform and discredit us to neglect.

LOW WAGES NOT THE ONLY CAUSE

New York, June 23.—A negative opinion concerning the alleged direct relation of working girls' low wages to the social evil, is contained in a statement issued by the voluntary commission of nationally prominent socialist workers who met here April 18 to investigate the subject. The investigators express the belief that an "injustice has been done the working girls, especially to the employees of the department stores, by the widespread publicity given to a mistaken view of the industrial responsibility for the so-called white slave condition."

"The undersigned," the statement continues, "certainly do not wish to intimate that the wages paid are too high or even sufficient. That is a question to be considered on different grounds, and our sympathy is strongly with the working girls." The conclusion of the investigators' report is as follows:

"Our observation and experience indicate that the most important causes of immorality in girls are: Weakness of mind and will; individual temperament; immoral associates; lack of religious or ethical training; injurious home influences; cramped living accommodations, rendering privacy difficult; lack of industrial efficiency; idleness; unwillingness to accept available employment; love of finery and pleasure; unwholesome amusement; inexperience and ignorance of social temptations. We therefore hold that it has been satisfactorily demonstrated that low wages is the direct cause of the loss of virtue among working girls."

WAR OF LIBERATION.

100th Anniversary Will Be Observed by Germans—Thousands Will Participate.
Cleveland, Ohio, June 23.—Thousands of Germans of Cleveland tomorrow will participate in one of the greatest celebrations the German-American Alliance has ever held in this

city. The occasion will be the one hundredth anniversary of the war of liberation of 1813 against Napoleon the Great as well as the one hundredth anniversary of the great musician and composer, Richard Wagner. One of the features of the celebration will be the great chorus of all the German societies in Cleveland will sing German and American national songs on a platform at the base of the Goethe-Schiller monument in Wade Park. Many prominent Germans from surrounding cities are expected to attend.

FINDS METEOR OF SOLID GOLD WEIGHING 20 TONS

Fresno, Cal., June 23.—Fred Williams, a farmer of McFarland, near Bakersfield brought to Fresno for the purpose of having assayed a chunk from a meteor which he says he discovered on his ranch at a depth of 56 feet when digging a well. The chunk has the appearance of solid gold. Williams was unable to find an assayer but took the chunk to a number of jewelers who pronounced it crystallized gold. Williams says the mass must weigh at least about 20 tons. It is only about an inch and a half thick.

DISCUSS CURRENCY.

Pennsylvania Bankers' Association Considers Problem—Delegates See Ball Game.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 23.—Changes that should be made in the currency and banking system of the United States was the subject discussed today by Congressman E. A. Hayes, of California, at the opening session of the nineteenth annual convention of the Pennsylvania Bankers' Association, Colonel H. P. Bope, vice president of the Carnegie Steel company, was scheduled to deliver an address on

"Banking and Business." This afternoon the convention recessed and the visiting delegate bankers were guests of the local chapter of the New York Giant-Pirate game on Forbes Field. On Saturday afternoon the financiers will forget their money and take part in a baseball game to decide the "Bankers' Championship" of Eastern and Western Pennsylvania money handlers. Joseph Chapman, Jr., vice president of the Northwestern National Bank of Minneapolis, and Daniel S. Remsen of New York City, will umpire Saturday's contest, according to plans announced today. Following the game, the delegates will tour the city in automobiles.
