WOMAN SAYS "IT WAS HIS LIFE OR MINE"

MRS. DELLA STROUD IS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

She Killed Her Husband Who Came Upon Her While She Was Out Riding With a Roomer at Her Home—Self Defense Will Probably Be the Plea of the Defendant.

Shreveport, La., June 26.—"It was his life or mine. I killed him to prevent him killing me." On this statement by Mrs. Della Stroud, the defense hopes to acquit the woman, who on April 14, shot her husband to death as she and Edward Beeler, a roomer in the Stroud home, were riding to Vivian, La. Mrs. Stroud went to trial here today before Judge John S. Land, with District Attorney W. A. Mabry prosecuting the charge. Former District Attorney James M. Foster is the woman's lawyer. Her chief witness will be Beeler, whose leg was broken and had to be amputated because blood poisoning set in after on of the bullets Mrs. Stroud fired at her husband lodge in Beeler's leg just above the knee. The shooting occurred on the road where Stroud followed the two on horseback. Mrs. Stroud says she took the pistol from her husband while he was struggling with Beeler.

AUSTRALIAN ARMY SEEN IN REVIEW

Sydney, N. S. W., Aus.—Fully 100,000 persons witnessed from every point of vantage the first great parade of Australia's youthful army in Sydney. Twenty thousand boys, fully armed and uniformed marched through the streets to the town hall, where Lord Denman, the governor-general, took the salute.

The boys were marshaled in six brigades and formed a column five miles long. They presented a fine appearance and the march past was very creditably performed, considering the short time compulsory training has been in force. The brigades taking part in the parade were drawn from Sydney and suburbs only. The country contingents, if mustered, would have supplied another 20,000 boys.

WOMEN'S SERVICE PLANS ARE TOPIC

Paris, France.—Under the presidency of Lady Aberdeen and in the presence of the minister of the interior M. Klotz, the tenth international women's congress was opened at the Sorbonne recently. A number of interesting and topical questions will be discussed at the sittings and among them the proposal of the president of the German national council of women that women should be liable for obligatory social service in institutions, thus placing them on an equal footing with men in those countries where conscription prevails.

Another proposal emanating from a member of the French council, that women should take the place of men in clerical posts in the army, setting the men free to undertake military duties, will also form a subject of discussion.

Belgian Canal Improved.

Brussels, Belgium.—The great increase in the import of coal, chiefly from England, for the coke ovens which are now being erected on the right bank of the Bruges-Ostend canal to supply the town of Ostend with gas, have necessitated the carrying out of considerable improvements and alterations to the canal. Dredging operations will be carried out to a depth of 6.50m. up to Zandvoorde.

GOLDEN CASKET IS LONDON GIFT FOR M. POINCARÉ

London.—Wednesday, June 25, has been fixed as the date of M. Poincaré's visit to the city of London, when he will take luncheon with the lord mayor at the Guildhall and be presented with an address of welcome from the corporation. The arrangements for the president's visit are in charge of a special committee.

The design for the gold casket, in which the emblazoned address in the form of a scroll will be presented to the president, was chosen at a recent meeting of the committee. The presentation will be made in the library and will be followed by the introduction of the mover and seconder of the address, as well as of the sheriffs, to M. Poincaré.

The lord mayor and his guests will then proceed to the banquet hall for lunch, which will be attended by a large number of distinguished people, including the admiral and the captains of the ships of the president's escort.

BRITISH LIQUID FUEL EXPERT ENCOURAGES OIL COMPOUNDS

London.—Robert W. A. Brewer, a well known expert on the subject of liquid fuel, lectured to the Institute of Inventors recently on "Petrol and Its Substitutes." It was very important at the present time, he said, to take the largest proportion possible of the crude fuels of nature for use in the automobile engine. It was generally supposed that only the lightest benzines could be used for the purpose but the mixing of the heavier and lighter fuels enabled the former fractions to be consumed almost as efficiently as though they were heat treated.

Though petroleum in any shape or form, either as petrol or paraffin, was a very complex substance, it was possible and highly advisable in the interests of economy, that the explosive mixture entering the cylinders should be homogeneous. This was only possible by the use of a carburetor which sprayed the fuel into the finest particles, and in which the air stream was intimately intermingled with the fuel vapor.

The lecturer then dealt with some important characteristics of petrol, such as its volatility, and discussed at some length the variation of viscosity with temperature. The maximum efficiency of combustion could only be obtained by so arranging the fuel

orifice or other measuring devices that the amount of fuel or the quantity of air flowing to the engine could be adjusted to compensate for the rise in temperature of the apparatus when working.

He explained by means of diagrams why large proportions of a fuel like paraffin could be used in conjunction with a volatile spirit in an ordinary carburetor. Alcohol and mixtures of this fuel with benzol could be used under certain conditions, but alcohol was not at the present time a suitable fuel for further experiment in view of the legislative restrictions laid upon it.

If support were given to the production of home distillates much might be done to make alcohol a commercial proposition as a liquid fuel. Benzol was eminently suitable on the other hand, and he thought that this fuel should receive greater encouragement. He favored an increase in the specific gravity of liquid fuel, accompanied by the production of a suitable carburetor, this being the only solution of the problem and of the question of the supply of motor fuel to meet the increasing demand.

CANAL MACHINERY IS WORN OUT CAYS COL. GOETHALS

Washington.—Use of the Panama canal machinery, after the big ditch is completed to construct a federal railroad in Alaska is a plan abandoned practically by the war department, it was learned Friday. That the canal machinery will be worn out when the work there is finished is the belief of Col. George W. Goethals, chief engineer.

"I have told Secretary of War Garrison that in my opinion it would be impracticable to take the canal machinery to Alaska," said Colonel Goethals. The canal builder left Friday for Panama. He will sail from New York next Wednesday.

Colonel Goethals advises purchase of new machinery for the Alaska railroad project if the latter is decided upon.

"For the last year we have not been keeping the machinery in tip-top repair," said Colonel Goethals. "It has been cheaper to discard it as it wore out. It would not in my opinion pay to take down the old machinery, after its purpose has ceased at Panama, pack and ship it to Alaska and repair it and set it up there."

FREE STATES OPPOSE PREMIER IN SOUTH AFRICA

Bloemfontein, S. Africa.—A strongly worded resolution was adopted by 47 votes to 2 at the congress of the Free State section of the South African party, declaring the General Botha had forfeited its confidence, requesting him to resign, and expressing complete confidence in General Hertzog.

Another resolution was also passed declaring that falling General Botha's resignation within one week, the representatives of the Free State province in the house of assembly would be required to withdraw their support from the government and force a dissolution. A large number of Free State members were absent from the congress owing to parliament being in session.

The Heilbronn branch of the South African party has received a letter from General Botha in which, after reviewing the cause of General Hertzog's dismissal, he contends that the former minister has since abundantly justified his (General Botha's) action.

ETTANGS BATTLE SUBJECT OF QUERY

Rome, Italy.—Interrogations on the battle of Ettang were put to the minister of war in the Italian Chamber by the republican deputy, Signor Eugenio Chiesi. The under secretary, who rose in reply, refused to apportion responsibility or to express an opinion on what had happened. The antiquated prejudice was no longer cherished, he said, that infantry should sacrifice itself for guns which once dismounted were only as many pieces of iron. Dirigibles were unable to be used on account of continuous winds.

Naval Maneuvers at Toulon.

Toulon, France.—The grand naval maneuvers to be held at Toulon this month will be attended by President Poincaré, who will take up his headquarters on the armored cruiser Jules Michelet. He will be present at the final maneuvers of the squadron and will hold the review.

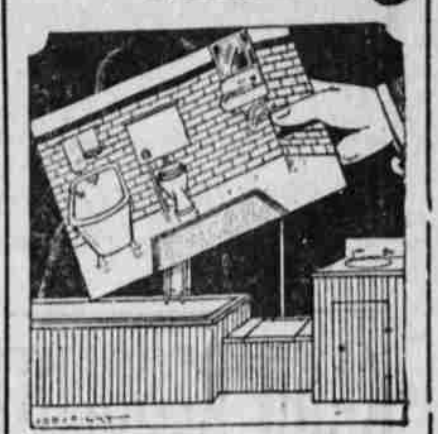
IMMENSE KILN IN NEW SOUTH WALES

Sydney, N. S. W., Aus.—A brick-making plant has been set up at Clyde New South Wales, with a kiln that is said to be the largest in the world. The cost to the firm concerned has been upwards of 50,000 pounds but the large kiln is likely to effect considerable savings in the cost of production. It has 36 chambers, each capable of holding 34,000 to 35,000 bricks, or a total of about 1,250,000, and can if necessary, turn out 600,000 bricks per week. About six burners will be needed to deal with the maximum output but this is only half the number that would be required for a smaller kiln.

COL. ROOSEVELT WILL BE OUT OF FALL CAMPAIGN

New York.—It is announced that Colonel Roosevelt will not be in the United States during the campaign this year.

When he goes to the Argentine Republic in the fall he will discuss before them the same principles he advocated in the last presidential campaign.

The invitation was extended through the Argentine government, but it comes from the Musée Sociale, which is an institution corresponding to the Corbione in Paris.

The addresses he will deliver probably will number two or three, and will deal with the relation of government to social reform and the extension of popular rule. It is expected that he will advocate for the Argentine Republic the same legislation that he supports here for the purpose of bringing about these reforms holding that it is as applicable to the local conditions in Argentina as here.

WORLD TRADING WITH AUSTRALIA

Sydney, N. S. W., Aus.—Evidence given before the Dominion's commission brought out the fact that while British trade with Australia has materially increased, foreign trade has increased at a faster rate both relatively and actually.

In 1905 Australia imported from the United Kingdom 20,319,515 pounds worth of goods, from the empire 25,524,830, and from foreign countries 12,821,901. The 1911 figures are as follows: From the United Kingdom 22,735,971, from the empire 40,669,216, from foreign countries 26,298,272 pounds.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA EXPORTING MORE

Adelaide, S. A.—Trade in South Australia is being maintained at a high level. For the first three months of the present year the overseas trade totaled 4,280,941 pounds, being 262,612 pounds in excess of that for the corresponding period in 1912. Imports showed a falling off during the three months of 65,612 pounds but exports indicated an increase of 328,224. Exports exceeded imports in the period under review by 590,267, whereas last year the credit balance was only 196,431 pounds. The totals for the three months in the current and last year were: 1913—Imports, 1,850,337; exports, 2,440,604 pounds. 1912—Imports, 1,195,949; exports, 2,112,380 pounds.

ZIONISTS FAVOR PROTECTION OF RUSSIAN JEWS

May Ask This Government to Request Russian Officials to Exercise More Leniency.

Cincinnati.—The sixteenth annual convention of the Federation of American Zionists opened here. This year's convention is considered the most important ever held by the Zionists because of the number of vital topics to be considered. Among these is the matter of demanding that the United States compel a more lenient attitude by Russian government officials toward the persecuted Jews of that country. It was argued that the establishment of a Jewish university at Palestine will give to the younger Jews of Russia a place to educate themselves.

OLD ASTOR HOUSE MENUS AUCTIONED

New York.—Menu cards of famous dinners at the old Astor house were sold at auction Friday.

The card of the dinner given by the press to Louis Kossuth, December 15, 1951, brought the highest price, \$8. The card for the St. George Cricket Club dinner in 1849, was sold for \$8.50 and that of a dinner to T. Butler King, in 1847, went at the same price.
