SOUTH AUSTRALIAN RADIUM MINES ARE BEING DEVELOPED

Adelaide, S. Aus.—In view of the cost and increasing use of radium, information as to radium mining in South Australia, contained in a review of mining operations in the state during the latter half of 1912, compiled by the chief registrar of the department of mines, is of more than ordinary interest.

"At the Radium Hill mine near Olary, 257 miles north of Adelaide," states the chief registrar, "a considerable quantity of ore has been raised. This is concentrated at the magnetic separator plant in the mine and shipments of the concentrate forwarded regularly to the company's river at Woodwich, on the Paramatta river, near Sydney. These works can now treat about 10 tons per week, have, it is stated, cost over 15,000 pounds.

"The directors report that 'pure radium bromide has been produced. Although only 2 1-2 milligrams were fully prepared, it provides that radium bromide of a purity between 1-800,000 and 2,000,000 radio-activity can be procured from the company's ore, and there are approximately 250 milligrams of radium in the laboratory in various stages of purity,

which will receive its final preparation and be available for sale automatically week by week henceforth. One hundred and twenty tons of concentrates have been smelted, of which 95 tons have been treated for about 350 milligrams of radium, which is equivalent to an extraction of 32.3 milligrams per ton of concentrates. The company also proposes to utilize the various by-products contained in the ore.

"The South Australian Radium Proprietary holds leases adjoining and to the northeast of the Radium Hill company's property. Four shafts have been sunk, and a considerable amount of developmental work has been done. The Rare Metals Proprietary, working on claims about three miles northeast of the Radium Hill mine, has done a considerable amount of prospecting work and raised about seven tons of ore, material analyses from which are satisfactory.

"At the property of the Radium Extraction company of South Australia, Mt. Painter, no work was done during the period under review. The directors' report states that some good ore was picked out and dispatched before work ceased, and one shipment of 2 1-2 tons realized very satisfactory prices."

FARMERS BUILD RAILROAD FOR ONE TRAIN AND LOCOMOTIVE

New Line Will Be 15 Miles Long. Will Stop Every Mile and Enable Wisconsin Agriculturists to Market Products in Two States.

Lake Geneva, Wis.—One of the most productive dairy regions of Wisconsin and Illinois is to be treated in a way that will give it a market in two states by the building and proposed further extension of a railroad promoted largely by farmers and dairymen. This road reached Wauconda, Lake county, Illinois, recently and a great celebration was held. The line is projected further north until it penetrates the Badger domain and ultimately connects the network of electric lines now being built in the region.

This road is called the Palestine, Lake Zurich & Wauconda. It is 15 miles long, connecting with the Northwestern at Palestine. Ultimately it will connect the Fox lake region and find an outlet still further north.

The novel character of this road is that in a distance of 15 miles there are nearly that many stops. There is but one locomotive, a combination baggage, express and passenger car and one coach.

The road was built to tap a section about 25 miles square after all attempts to obtain direct transportation in the last quarter of a century or more had failed. Both steam roads and trolleys for this region got on paper but no further, until finally the farmers and the resort men pooled their interests and started the movement that promises success.

Up to, last fall the merchants of Lake Zurich and Wauconda were obliged to stage their freight between 10 and 12 miles, and the farmers had to haul their products and get their supplies in the same way. Summer people had to take long drives to reach lake homes. Some of them were transported on hay racks at 25 cents a ride.

The road movement was started by committees of farmers and resort men soliciting funds. The farmers traded the right of way for stock at \$100 a share. There is no common stock nor a drop of water in the entire capitalization. The farmers with their teams helped grade the road, hauled ties and steel, and kept at it until the line was built from Lake Zurich, eight miles.

SOUTH AFRICAN PICTURE GALLERY RIVALRY DECIDED

Old Dutch House in Cape Town Wins Honor of Receiving Max Michaelis Gift to the Nation.

London.—It has been definitely decided that the national picture gallery of South Africa will be established in Cape Town. At the time when Max Michaelis made his gift of the collection of Dutch and Flemish paintings, purchased from Sir Hugh Lane, to the South African nation, several towns were mentioned as suitable to the housing of what must prove to be the nucleus of the nation's art collection.

Johannesburg and Pretoria were advocated by some, but Cape Town by virtue of its associations with the earliest Dutch settlers, finally and very rightfully won the day. Besides finding a home in a city of Dutch origin, the Michaelis pictures will, it is affirmed, be hung in one of the oldest of the Dutch houses of the town, on walls similar to those for which they were painted and amidst furniture of the period.

Meanwhile, in the Grosvenor gallery, the English public is enjoying the opportunity of viewing a collection as interesting from its artistic

rarity, as from the study which it provides of the qualities of Dutch national character. Here are Rembrandt, the younger Teniers, Frans Hals, Cuyt, Van Dyck, Snyders, Van Beyeren, Jacob Ruysdael, Jan Steen and many others.

Of all these notable pictures perhaps the most notable is the portrait of "A Young Lady," by Rembrandt. It is a half length picture of a woman wearing a gray silk figured dress with gossamer ruff and a lawn cap.

This picture when sold at the Demidoff sale in Italy in 1880 fetched 6000 pounds. It was first heard of in 1809 when it was sold in Paris for 156 pounds. It figured in the Portales sale in London when it fetched 200 pounds. In 1857 it was lent by Charles Maude to the Manchester exhibition. At Sotheby's in 1873 it realized 1627.0 pounds. Before becoming the property of Sir Hugh Lane, Mme. Isaac Periere of Paris, was its possessor.

The other picture in the collection which is of outstanding importance is the Frans Hals "Portrait of a Woman" from the Mauritius Kann collection. This picture was exhibited in London in the national loan exhibition of 1909.
