Seattle, June 28.—Accompanied by Dr. R. M. Anderson, biologist; James Murray, oceanographer; J. W. Hicks, official of the Esquimaux navy yard, and Mrs. Anderson, Vilhalmur Stefansson will leave here Tuesday on the steamer Victoria for Nome, where he will take charge of his exploring steamer Karluk. Mrs. Anderson will return here when the Stefansson party leaves Nome about July 20.

San Francisco, June 28.—"Couldn't you get some one to hunt him up and give him a good thrashing. Instead of getting a divorce?" Judge Dunne asked Mrs. Gertrude Moody who accused Clifford Moody of desertion. "It can't be done," replied the wife, who was thereupon granted a decree.

St. Paul, June 28.—United States Judge Sanborn has issued an order giving Receiver Winchell authority to borrow \$850,000 to keep the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad going during the summer while the judge is on his vacation. 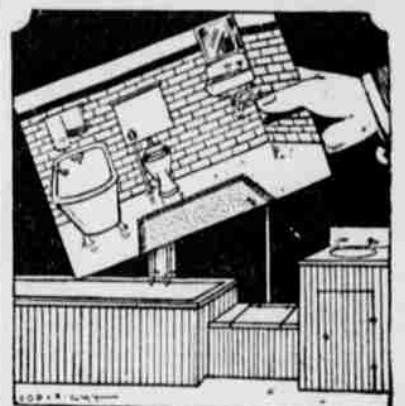

Railway Congress Held in Tokio. Tokio, Japan.—The leading topic of discussion at the Sino-Japanese through traffic conference, concluded recently at Tokio, was the through passenger traffic arrangements from Shimbashi, Tokio, and Peking, covering a distance of 2100 miles. These arrangements had reference to through traffic stations, through fare table, charges for parcels, free weight limit for passengers' baggage, charges for excess weight of baggage, availability of through tickets and their forms, indemnification for loss and damage to parcels and baggage, settlement of accounts and distribution of shares of the respective railways, the through traffic management office and the official language.

According to the decision arrived at, English has been adopted as the official language. The business of through traffic management is to be undertaken in turn by all the railways concerned, and the management of the through traffic will be first assumed by the Imperial government railways of Japan.
