To Clean Ostrich Plumes.
To clean ostrich plumes place them in a basinful of soapuds, made with cold water instead of hot, in which they should be left to soak for an hour or two. They should then be plunged into boiling water and allowed to remain for a quarter of an hour. Each feather should then be taken out, spread on a cloth, and every particle of dirt that still clings to the fronds removed by rubbing with a soft piece of silk dipped in

soapuds. They must be rinsed in several changes of hot water, and finally laid on a towel across the knee, the fronds being touched lightly with a towel made into a ball, so as to regain the curved shape of the feather. When almost dry, the feathers should be well shaken until they appear perfectly soft and fluffy, then immediately put in tissue paper and placed in a cool oven or plate rack of the stove, so as to complete the drying operation.—Minneapolis Journal.

Mats for Hot Plates.

Hot plate mats should always find a place among the linen supply. One of the newest of these mats is of oblong shape open at both ends. The ends are scalloped and the top of the case is embroidered at each end above the scallops, says the Minneapolis Journal. The embroidery is always some simple and quickly made design, which is of course in solid asbestos, smaller than the case is slipped inside when the cover is soiled. The asbestos can easily be removed and the cover laundered.

A rather heavy quality of linen should be used for the dollies and they will be very ornamental if embroidered in colors, matching the china used. If made to match the china they will look well with any luncheon set.

Home Helps.

Never allow a cooking utensil to stand and dry before washing. Put cold water in it immediately. One of the secrets in cooking croquettes naturally lower the temperature of the fat, and if the fat becomes too much cooled by the food-stuffs, the fat will soak, the food the food rather than cook the coating of eggs and crumbs.

Fine sands or bits of paper with plenty of strong soapuds, will cleanse any decanter or bottle. Shake vigorously until all the stains have disappeared.—Newark News.

Dress Shields.

Instead of sewing or pinning dress shields in a waist, sew a narrow piece of tape or baby ribbon at each end of the shield and sew similar pieces at the proper distance apart in the armholes of all your waists, says the Minneapolis Journal. The shields are quickly tied in place, they are easily changed in wash waists and there are no pins to rust or prick.

To Avoid Rust.

To avoid using hooks and eyes that will rust, test them with a magnet, says Mothers Magazine. If they can be drawn by the magnet, they contain steel and should be used on anything that requires laundering.

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SHERIFF CLAIMS AUTO BANDIT STORY WAS A FABRICATION

◆ Alleged Victim Now Under Arrest Accused of Having Jobbed the Officers of the Law.

Vale, Ore., June 28.—Sheriff Kerfoot, after searching the surrounding country for a week, is satisfied that the alleged auto stage robbery between this place and Nyssa on June 18 was a faked scheme on the part of the driver, G. Franklin Ross, and Dr. C. S. Delong of this city. As a result of the investigations, Dr. Delong was arrested yesterday on a charge of improper conduct and is being held to the grand jury in default of \$700 bail.

In the meanwhile the officers will continue their investigations and if possible hold Delong on a further charge of defrauding the county. It being claimed that the county has been put to considerable expense in searching for the "bandits" Delong alleged attacked and robbed him on the Nyssa road.

Sheriff Kerfoot had many hundreds of circulars printed describing the auto bandit, sent telegrams and telephone messages to the officers of the cities in various parts of Idaho and Oregon, and made personal trips in search of them.

Delong, it is alleged, has deserted a wife and two children and is living with a woman in Vale. He will be held on this charge pending an investigation of what charge will be preferred against him for misleading the officers and causing the county to incur a large and unnecessary expense.

The woman with whom Delong is alleged to have been living in Vale has also been arrested and is detained for the present at the Boynton hospital.

PEACE TOPICS TO FEATURE INTERPARLIAMENTARY UNION

Washington.—In a short time eight members of congress—five from the house and three from the senate—will be appointed to represent the United States in the interparliamentary union of the world, which will meet at The Hague in the latter part of the summer. It is understood that Senators Burton of Ohio and John Sharp Williams of Mississippi and Representatives F. C. Stevens of Minnesota and Richard Bartholdt of Missouri will be of the number selected, although no formal announcements have yet been made.

As a part of the ceremony of the meeting the Carnegie building, which is to house the international peace court of The Hague, is to be dedicated on August 29, and the meetings will be in a general way of great interest and importance to all advocates of world peace. Questions relating to world peace and to universal arbitration will be discussed at length, and the program will embrace the names of many of the most eminent statesmen of the world.

The Wilson administration probably will designate several agents to attend the meetings, and these agents will co-operate with the eight American delegates in a variety of ways. For instance all the maritime nations of the world are interested in the rules regulating the measurements which are to be adopted for the purposes of the Panama canal. These differ from those now in use either by the English, the German or the French.

The new American system will be explained to the delegates at The Hague and the representatives of the Washington government will be on hand to profit by the general discussions that will ensue. The new system has been provided for in the Panama canal act of the last congress, and is now rapidly nearing completion. Its details will be issued in printed form a few weeks.

Victorian Grooms English Scouts.

Melbourne, Vic., Aus.—A recent arrival of immigrants included a contingent of over a dozen English boy scouts, who were welcomed at the treasury buildings by the acting premier, Mr. Murray. In addressing the lads, Mr. Murray said he was glad to receive such a fine body of youthful immigrants who had been brought up to farm life.

He was greatly interested in the scout movement, which he believed helped to make manly and useful citizens. They would find plenty of honest work to do in Australia, and plenty of sport and recreation as well, and British scouts would always find a hearty welcome from their Victorian brothers.

It was intimated to Murray that the boys intended to work co-operatively on the land after gaining the requisite experience and saving sufficient money.

Belgian Industry is Prosperous.

Ghent, Belgium.—In Belgium associations for the well-being of working men are largely in evidence and wages are continually on the increase. According to recent published statistics, capitalists also have little reason to complain.

During 1912 506 new stock companies were organized, of which 369 possessed a capital of less than 1,000,000 francs. Of the remaining 137 which possessed the necessary qual-

fications for being listed on the stock exchange, 22 are capitalized for 1,000,000 francs, 81 for from one to five millions, 5 from 10 to 20 millions, and 2 for more than 20,000,000 francs. The aggregate capital stock of the 506 companies amounts to 66,441,310 francs.

RHONDDA VALLEY RAILLESS MOTOR BILL APPROVED

Westminster.—The house of commons has remitted to a committee for consideration three bills to authorize electric traction in the Rhondda valley, in Shetfield, and in North London.

The Rhondda valley bill authorizes the construction of a railless traction route five and a half miles long in connection with the Rhondda tramways. The electric power would be obtained from overhead wires and the vehicles would be free to move from side to side of the road. The vehicles are intended to carry only 28 passengers. The committee have approved the principle of the Rhondda valley bill and have decided that a minimum width of 17 feet for the road and four feet for the footpath will suffice for the road on which the vehicles will run.

The expense of altering the road will have to be borne by the road authority but the company will be liable for a third of the cost provided it does not exceed 4000 pounds, and, in addition, the company will have to pay a road tax of not more than three-eighths of a penny per car-mile annually for the maintenance of the road.
