Fitchner grounded out but the Yaks had made enough to win the game.

Gordon was an enigma that the Bucks solved but once. In the sixth Rader hit a terrific drive to right center which was good for three bags and Lodell's single in the same direction rang the bell.

Varian delivered a hard blow to right but Fitchner made a spectacular catch and doubled Lodell at first, retreating the side and snuffing out the hopes of the fans.

Line Card Cases.

MANY MILLIONS OF DOLLARS ARE NOW SPENT ABROAD

The meeting which will be attended by the leading boosters of the Pacific coast cities all the way from British Columbia to the Mexican border will consider further plans for making the Pacific coast the "playground of the world" and for advancing the "See America First" propaganda. The association already has the unqualified endorsement of many of the great railroad systems and of the principal hotels of the coast.

Steps will also be taken to send high-class lecturers fully equipped with lantern slides out through the East to assist in the general work of interesting tourists and pleasure-seekers. Various other forms of calling the world's attention to the marvelous natural beauties of the coast together with the unrivalled series of high-class amusement, entertainment and educational attractions embraced in the different festivals and expositions of the association.

A number of enterprising cities of the West not already identified with the movement have asked to be admitted. These include Salt Lake, Oakland, Sacramento, Boise, Ida., Everett and North Yakima, Wash. Other applications will be presented during the coming meeting.
