NEW AUSTRALIAN JUDGE APPOINTED

Sydney, N. S. W., Aus.—Recently the commonwealth government made two appointments to the federal high court. Mr. Piddington of the New South Wales bar and Mr. Powers, a solicitor of the Victorian courts. These appointments caused a great deal of dissatisfaction among legal circles in both capitals, and the appointments were adversely criticized. Mr. Powers has accepted his nomination, but Mr. Piddington refused.

Justice Rich of the New South Wales bench was offered the vacant judgeship, and he has accepted the position. His honor is a distinguished member of the legal profession, and is regarded as one of the best classical scholars in the commonwealth.

TWO MEN CREMATED WHEN AUTO OVERTURNED

Minneapolis, July 1.—Clara Clements and Sam Gillesby were cremated here today when an automobile overturned, the gasoline tank exploding.

Half Come from Dixie.

Out of the thousands who came in yesterday, probably half were from Dixie, and tents south of Confederate avenue many of which were unfilled before, bustled with excitement. General B. H. Young of Louisville, commander in chief of the United Confederate veterans, came late in the day and became the guest of the Pennsylvania state commission.

Mrs. Helena D. Longstreet, widow of General Longstreet and the only woman in the camp, was given a tent by Brigadier General Hunter Liggett.

Edgar L. Bigbee, a Wisconsin veteran, was found dead in his tent last night. This brings the death list to three.

Because of the serious condition that has developed among the veterans, Colonel Bradley, U. S. A., appealed to the local authorities to close all the saloons and prohibit the sale of liquor in the town. It may be necessary to declare martial law to effect this.

At dusk last night the Minnesota veterans came in. This command suffered the greater percentage of loss of any regiment that fought in the battle of Gettysburg.

Reports from the railroad officials to the government authorities at the camp late tonight were to the effect that 29 trains are due to arrive before morning.

This means that probably 10,000 more veterans are to be cared for. At nightfall the army officers estimated that about 42,000 old soldiers had arrived on the field.

They say the 50,000 mark will probably be passed by breakfast time tomorrow.

RADER LEADING HITTER OF WEEK

Don Rader, speedy Pendleton infielder who has been switched to shortstop in the field and to the lead off position in the batting order, was the leading hitter of the last week's series, clouting the ball for a .400 average. Incidentally in the five games he made five runs and drew six passes from the pitchers. Manager Terry McKune was a close second to Rader with the club, getting a percentage of .381. These were the only two Buckaroos who made anything like an exceptional average for the week. Taylor, the Yakima catcher, hit the hardest ball for the visitors. His average was .363. Phil Nadeau was second with .357 and Manager George Angle third with .313. As a team the Braves hit only .225, while the Buckaroos were in the .233 class. The Bucks also outfielded the Yaks by a good margin.

PENDLETON GETS BUT 3 MORE SERIES

New Schedule Adopted By League Directors Last Evening.

Walla Walla July 1.—The occasion of Director R. W. Runstrom's social visit to the city yesterday was hurriedly turned into a director's meeting of the Western Tri-State league, by Secretary Brown. Director Rittner of Pendleton was communicated with and arrived last evening after which the magnates got their heads together and adopted a second schedule for the remainder of the 1913 season. Boise's representative was not present, not knowing of the meeting, but the schedule adopted for submission to that club will undoubtedly be satisfactory, for Boise bets six weeks out of the nine weeks schedule at home. Yakima gets five weeks, Walla Walla four and Pendleton but three.

The schedule was mailed to Boise last night and will probably be accepted and made law by wire today.

According to this schedule, each team meets the other in three series. Pendleton opening the second season next week in Boise with the Bears at Yakima.

If some other team wins the second season's pennant, it will be matched against the Bears for the championship.

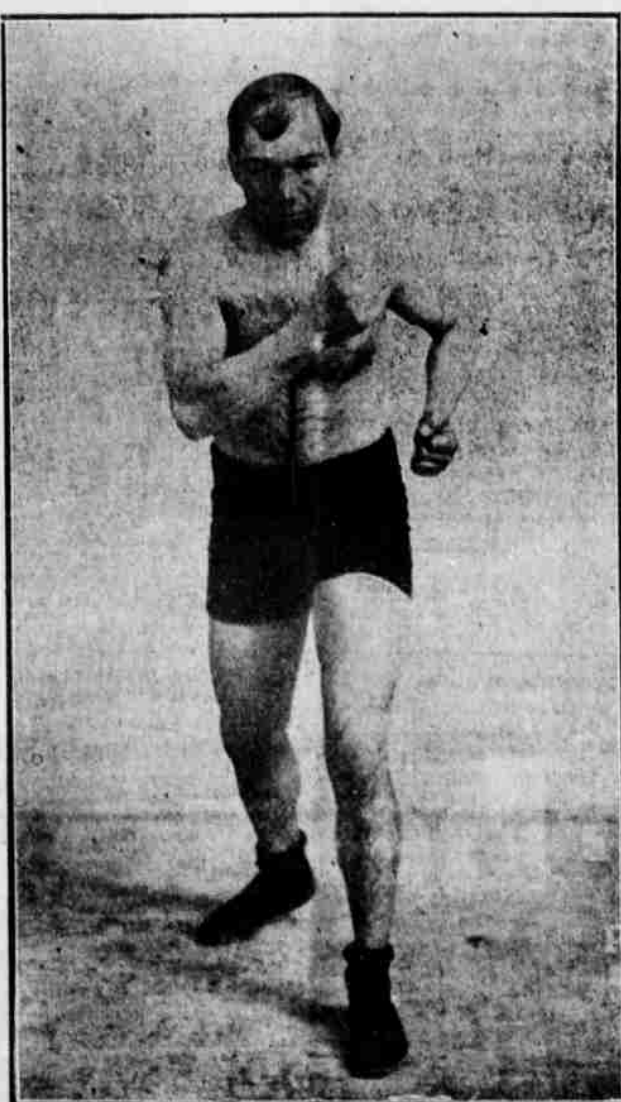
