STOCK MARKET.

(From Monday's Journal.)
Business is growing at North Portland. For the half year closed today there was an increase in offerings in every line of livestock in the local yards. Even cattle showed an increase over the same period of 1912. For the first six months of 1913 the run of cattle at North Portland totaled 40,521, or 290 head more than the same period a year ago. Likewise there was an increase of 633 calves on the market for the same period a year ago the total was 48,280. The increase therefore was 50,105 head. During the half year of 1913 there was an increase in the marketing of sheep at North Portland of 21,772 over the same period a year ago.

During the month of June all lines of livestock showed an increase over the corresponding month in 1912. This month the total run of hogs was 18,820 head compared with 6755 a year ago. Cattle run for the month was 6115 head, compared with 5830 head a year ago. The run of calves for June, 1913, totaled 666 head, compared with 244 a year ago, while sheep for the month were 27,053 head compared with 20,250 during the same month in 1912.

There was another quite fair run of cattle over Sunday. Trade was on good basis and values were generally considered steady, although in some offerings a loss of a nickel was reported from previous figures.

Italy Again Asks France to Hurry.

Rome, Italy.—The railway between Coni and Nice was the subject of discussion in the Italian Chamber recently. M. De Sata, public works, stated that the Italian portion of the railway between Viareggio and Tende was complete, and that the section between Ventimiglia and the frontier had reached an advanced stage. To his information concerning the Italian portions of the railways, M. De Sata added that his government had several times made representations to the French government on the necessity for the hastening of the construction of the French sections of the railway. In reply the French government had expressed the keenest interest in the work and had issued instructions for the hastening of the works on French territory.

Several Italian deputies recommended their government, at the close of the discussion, to make further representation to the French government in order that the opening of the railways might not be postponed indefinitely.

Kaiser Honored by Club Boats.

Berlin, Germany.—The annual rowing regatta took place recently at Gruenau on the Upper Spree. The Kaiser, who has done so much to further all aquatic sports, always makes a point of being present, and of presenting the prizes. This year everything was on a much more comprehensive scale in consideration of his majesty's jubilee.

As soon as the imperial river steamer Albrecht made her appearance, bring the Kaiser and various members of his family from Potsdam, the bands struck up the national anthem, and as soon as the yacht had anchored, 600 club boats passed before the Kaiser amid general enthusiasm and to the strains of a patriotic march. The effect was very fine, and the rowing delighted the Kaiser by its exactness. His majesty remained till nearly the close of the regatta and then presented the prizes.

Argentine Ship on Long Voyage.

New York.—With a dozen young officers and 19 midshipmen aboard the cruiser Presidente Sarmiento, training ship of the Argentine navy, arrived here on Sunday from Barbados. Her voyage will continue until October.

After about ten days in this port, the President Sarmiento will go to Boston, thence to Halifax and across the Atlantic. Today the men have shore leave to see the city. The vessel carries a total of 26 officers and a crew of 292 men.
