GRAFT CASES IN DETROIT COME UP FOR TRIAL TODAY

Detroit, Mich., July 2.—The first of Detroit's aldermanic graft cases against ten indicted councilmen went to trial here today when "Honest Tom" Glinnan, former president of the council, faced a jury in recorder's court, charged with bribery and with conspiracy to accept a bribe. After nearly a year of delay since the indictments were returned on July 27, 1912, the recent court warning of Judge Phelan that "only death or serious illness should further impede the proceedings," finally brought the cases to trial.

chanism, embodied in the dictagraph, will be pitted against the word of the accused and his witnesses. Prosecutor Shepard will base his case chiefly upon evidence secured by the dictagraph and upon the testimony of Detective Walter J. Brennan of the Burns agency, who is alleged to have handed Glinnan \$1000 in bills to in-

fluence his vote on a question before council in which the Wabash railroad was interested. While in Detroit Brennan posed as a representative of the Wabash.

Defense attorneys indicated today that in the event of Glinnan's conviction in the lower courts, they would carry the case to the supreme court for final decision, and it was believed that the cases against the other accused aldermen would be held up pending the final outcome of Glinnan's trial.

The other accused aldermen are Louis Brozo, Louis E. Tossy, Martin J. Ostrowski, Frank Mason, David Rosenthal, Joseph Thelsen, W. H. C. Hindle, Alois A. Deimel and Andrew Walsh, all of whom were indicted for bribery and for conspiracy to accept bribes, and Edward R. Schreiter, former clerk of the council committees, who is charged with conspiracy to accept a bribe.

LEONARD LOSES HIS FIRST GAME

FITCHNER TURNS TRICK
DESPITE POOR SUPPORT

Ten inning game is replete with sensations—Final Score 3 to 1 With Yakima on the Big End—Fitchner Strikes Out 14 Bears and Wins Own Game in Tenth.

Walla Walla, July 2.—With a big league scout in the grand stand, Leonard lost his first game of the season yesterday afternoon at Sportsman, when the Bears and Braves met for the first time in their history in a heart rendering struggle that hung in the balance for five innings. The game went ten innings, the final score being Yakima, 3; Walla Walla, 1.

"Tiny" was out of form yesterday and seemed unable to get his famous curve ball working properly, but for all that he maintained such a steady pace for nine innings, that the Braves infield could hardly stand the strain and the league's crack shortstop made two bingles in the tenth which came near proving costly.

Fitchner was the star of the day, earning his victory. Striking out 14 Bears during the melee, he won his own game in the tenth, when with two down, he stepped into a three bagger to the fence, scoring Fuller who had previously got on by a bunt hit, and later scoring himself on Ford's accidental hit, obtained when the ball hit his bat in some manner unknown to him, and rolled safely down the third base line.

Yakima run in one in the fifth, when Taylor hit, stole second, took third on fielder's choice of Fitchner's grounder, and scored on Ford's hit.

The Bears tied the score in the ninth on a walk, a hit and an error. Borleske opened the inning by striking out and Davis was passed to first. Martini then was cheered into a neat single to right, which Ford fielded. Davis kept on around the bases and was sent in when Engel fumbled and's return throw. Ford was a little slow in throwing but Engel was equally to blame for his error. This was a lucky unearned run, and Fitchner really deserved a shut out.

Things looked dark for Yakima then for Leonard had never been known to lose an extra inning game, and the fans were confident of his ability to bring home the bacon, but he proved unequal to the occasion, allowing five hits and two runs, all of them earned, although Stolke's opening two bager was fair by a few inches only. He was put out at third however so luck never figured in his case.

Yakima's offense was hard to beat. Several times they laid bunts down the first base line. Walla Walla, weak spot, beat them out for hits that seemed lucky but were really earned and showed that some inside stuff was working somewhere.

With Johnson on third in the sixth and two down, Bobby Davis landed on what appeared to be a hit good for three bases and the fans went wild. Phil Nadeau ran from center and with a mighty leap into the air close to the right center fence, speared the ball with one hand for the prettiest catch ever seen on the local field.

HENLEY REGATTA IS BEGUN ON THAMES

London, July 2.—Henley Regatta, England's greatest river festival, opened today at Henley-on-Thames amid scenes of great brilliance. During the four days racing the pick of Britain's amateur oarsmen will be opposed by Canadian, Australian, Belgian, French and German rowers, and the contests for the principal events are expected to provide plenty of excitement.

The chief events are the Diamond Sculls, for single oarsmen, which practically carries with it the amateur championship of the world, the Grand Challenge Cup, the corresponding event for eight and the Stewards Cup for fours. Oxford and Cambridge universities sent strong contingents, and the elite of European society was present to waste their efforts. King George and Queen Mary were unable to attend, having undertaken a series of official visits to the provincial towns.

The finals for the big event will be rowed Friday and Saturday.

VICTIM OF FAKE HOLDUP WILL FACE GRAND JURY

Vale, Ore., July 2.—Dr. C. S. DeLong is in jail on being unable to give \$700 bail for appearance before the grand jury in September on the charge of living with a woman not his wife, after deserting a wife and two small children in Weller, Idaho, and the woman in the case, Henrietta Bayles, was freed on her own recognizance, and will appear as a witness before the grand jury. Dr. DeLong is the man who figured in an alleged holdup of the auto stage two weeks ago, when he claimed to have lost several hundred dollars at the hands of highwaymen at midnight. This he now acknowledges, was a fake and the driver of the auto stage, who is a brother of the woman in the case, claims that DeLong hypnotized him and thus forced him to tell the story of the holdup. DeLong says the holdup story was given out to stand off his creditors, whom he could not pay. Henrietta Bayles is said to have deserted a husband and two children to join DeLong.
