HELPING CHILDREN PLAY AIM PRAISED IN EDINBURGH

Edinburgh, Scotland.—A demonstration in aid of the Edinburgh Children's Play Center Society has recently been held in Edinburgh. It was attended by a large and appreciative audience.

The society, which is non-sectarian, was established about six years ago. There are four centers at work, at Canongate, Castlehill, St. Bernard's and Dalry, and the society is very anxious to increase still further its sphere of usefulness. Four or five hundred children are connected with the centers, and besides teaching them games and ways of amusing themselves, they are, as soon as possible, taught sewing, handiwork, cobbling and carving.

Lord Salvesen, the president of the society, said that the way in which the society appealed to him in the

first instance was from the concrete side. They did very little in Edinburgh for the children of the humbler classes. He had recently returned from a visit to the German town of Frankfurt, and while there he was delighted to find that there were hundreds of places distributed about the town, where children had an opportunity of playing in sand gardens or sand pits, and the children were taking advantage of that opportunity. These gardens were situated very close to their homes and the little children came there and played with their pails and spades just as if they were at the seaside.

As yet they had done nothing of that kind in Edinburgh, and although they had plenty of public parks for the use of adults, the number of children who could take advantage of these parks was strictly limited to those who lived in their immediate neighborhood. The result was that

they were faced with the problem which the society was endeavoring to solve. They had devised a method of helping the mothers of the poorer children, by collecting the children in to play centers, but they did a great deal more than that; the purpose of the society was to refine and to instruct as well as to amuse, to raise the tone of the children, to make them tidier, cleaner and better mannered.

CHARGED BURNING HIS WIFE ALIVE

Capestrano, Italy, July 5.—Marconi Ascenzio, recently returned to his native town from New York, is under arrest today charged with burning his wife alive. Following the receipt of anonymous letters at New York telling him that his wife was unfaithful to him during his absence Ascenzio returned to his home here immediately. He is declared to have greeted his wife the first day of his return with every show of affection. The second day, the couple went for a walk in the woods. This was the last ever seen of the woman. A priest, however, who was passing through the timber at the time, heard piercing shrieks from a distance. He made his way towards them and found a fierce fire blazing about a tree. Supposing it to be only the work of urchins, however, he passed on. The day following when the disappearance of Mrs. Ascenzio became known, the priest led a number of citizens to the burnt tree. The woman's finger ring and gold earrings were found in the ashes. Ascenzio was arrested just as he reached Chiasso, on the Italian-Swiss border, presumably making his way back to New York.
