An Office on Wheels.

Buffalo Bill's advertising car No. 1 is due to arrive in this city on Saturday, July 12th, via the O.-W. R. & N. railway, and will remain on the side track near the station until the towns and country for fifty miles in every direction are thoroughly billed.

This modern office on wheels is a marvel of compactness and elegance, embracing as it does a press bureau, with agents, writers, cuts, copy and illustrations equal to the best equipped newspaper office. It also carries a supply of all kinds of printing, posters, programs, circulars and lithographs sufficient to advertise a week of one-day stands, and this abundance of material is judiciously distributed throughout the country from house to house and on the billboards. The car is 70 feet long, and is divided into compartments to accommodate everything required. It contains a business office, buffet, state-rooms, Pullman berths for the workmen, lockers, closets and drawers for various kinds of advertising matter; also a steam boiler for making paste, and a baggage room for cans, brushes and tools of trade. POSTAL SPACE RENT FIGURED AT MILLIONS

Washington.—That the space used by the postal service in federal buildings has a rental value aggregating more than \$5,250,000 annually is shown by statistics gathered by Jonathan Bourne, Jr., chairman of the joint committee on railway mail pay and second class postage. This rental value has never before been ascertained and has never been considered in computing the cost of the postal service. In making the figures public Mr. Bourne said:

"Under present methods of post-office bookkeeping, if the government is paying \$5000 a year for rent of quarters for a postoffice, that expenditure is charged as an expense of the service. But if the government expends \$100,000 for a public building and locates the post office therein, the rental charge ceases, showing according to the books, a decrease of \$3000 in expenses, whereas, in fact, a charge of three per cent interest on the investment would equal the former rent. No account has been kept of the rental value of public buildings.

"Believing that definite information should be available upon this subject, I asked customs of all federal buildings to submit estimates of the rental value of buildings under their jurisdiction. From information thus secured, and with a statement of the proportion of space used by the postal service, it was ascertained that the rental properly chargeable to the postal service is \$5,514,787 in the 719 buildings concerning which reports were received. I submit that intelligent business methods should require that this amount be debited against the postal service in addition to the \$4,280,000 now debited for rental of buildings not owned by the government."

MILLION FRANCES AUCTION PRICE FOR REMBRANDT

Paris, France.—Nothing is spoken of in Parisian art circles but the fabulous price of 1,000,000 francs given at the Steengracht sale for Rembrandt's "Bathsheba." The price, which is a record for a picture at auction, was given by Messrs. Duveen of New York, and London after a stiff fight with Mr. Wildenstein, who was supposed to be representing the Rothschild family.

Rembrandt's "Bathsheba" was painted in 1643 and three years later appeared in the sale of Willem Six's pictures in Amsterdam and was sold for 550 francs. In 1741 it was sold at The Hague in the Van Zwieten sale and entered the collection of the Count de Brühl at Dresden. About the end of the eighteenth century it became the property of M. Poulain of Paris and figured in the le Brun sale in 1791 when it fetched 800 francs.

In 1814 it passed from the collection of Alexis de la Haute London, into that of Sir Thomas Lawrence, and in 1830 was sold for 3237 francs. After again being sold at the G. J. Vernon sale for about 80 francs more and at the Emerson sale for 6300 francs it passed for 7875 francs into the Steengracht family in 1841 and did not again appear upon the market until, at the Galleries Georges Petit, it surpassed the Mantegna record of 775,000 francs at the Weber sale in 1912, by 225,000 francs, and reached the figure of 1,000,000 francs.

IS YOUR COLT TRAINED FOR FAIR SHOW RING?

In showing horses at county and state fairs and horse shows, especially in showing colts, it is important that the animals be trained for the occasion, or they are unlikely to show their work.

"One of the first things is to teach the colt to behave himself and be quiet, so that he will not get excited, tear around, and 'act up' like a naughty child before company, when led into a crowd," said Prof. E. L. Potter, of the animal husbandry department of the Oregon Agricultural College, discussing the subject.

"The next step is to teach the colt to stand still when it is required," he continued, "then he must be taught to stand in the proper position, with his feet squarely under him, his front feet side by side, and his hind feet also side by side, his head up and

his ears forward.

"This will not only require training; it will mean that the owner or attendant will need to be constantly on the lookout to see that the animal maintains his position. One frequently sees, at county fairs, men bringing in good horses, and standing with their hands in their pockets while allowing the horse to stand down on one side with their heads at one side, in no way showing off their points as good horses. Neither the owner nor the horse, in such case, shows at his best.

"The horse led into the show ring should always have a good bridle, and never should be brought in with just a halter, as it is impossible to handle a horse properly without a bridle.

"The colt should be taught to lead properly to show his action to good advantage. He should learn to walk or trot up by the side of the attendant and pull forward on the lead rein, not backward. The attendant should

hold the horse with but foot of rein between his hand and the bit.

"In trotting the colt to the bridle it should be taught to step up in good shape, and pull forward on the rein instead of backward. In teaching the colt to trot for show, the attendant must run beside the horse's shoulder always keeping step with the horse. An attendant who stumbles along in his own gait cannot be expected to make the horse travel at his best.

"Attention to these points will make a world of difference in the appearance of the horse in the ring. It will make a poor horse look better and will prevent a good horse from appearing badly."
