SAYS EVENING SCHOOL IS A MORAL ASSET

Educator Would Occupy Time of People When Misdemeanors are Committed.

SALT LAKE, July 9.—"The man behind the gun," the need of considering the personal element in selecting leaders in school work, was brought out in an address at the general session of the National Educational association convention here by William H. Campbell, of Chicago. Morning meetings only were held in Salt Lake City, the teachers spending the afternoon at Great Salt Lake, where former Governor Hoch, of Kansas, was scheduled to make an address.

"A system that bases the selection of teachers upon the bare ability to answer set questions is vicious," said Campbell. "And it is time to question the wisdom of classifying our children by herds."

Lee F. Hanmer, of the Russell Sage Foundation, gave facts about school-house evening centers as a paying community investment. He pointed out students of corrective agencies claim that 80 per cent of all misdemeanors occur between the hours of 8 p. m. and 11 p. m. and showed how the school-house evening center is being made a strong counter influence by occupying this free time of the people with wholesome activities.

Hanmer described a cented in actual operation, and gave in detail the money cost of this new line of educational work, which totalled for the year throughout the United States 338 centers operated at an expense of \$129,535. In 1912, he said, 104 cities carried on some form of evening centerwork.

STRANGE NOISES MAY ACCOMPANY AURORA BOREALIS

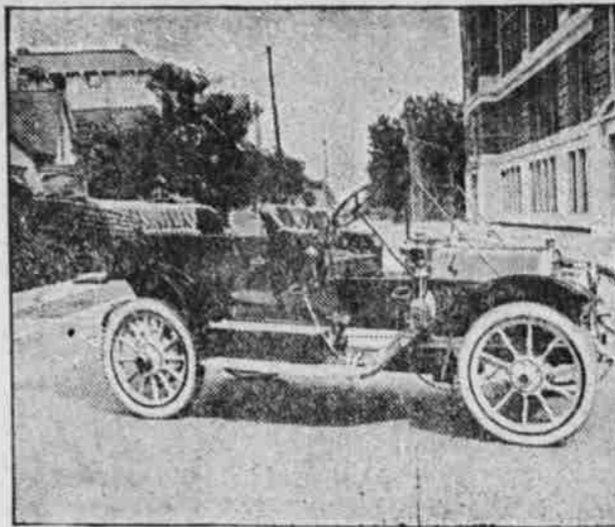
Christiana, Norway.—An interesting discussion has been going on recently in the Norwegian papers regarding the aurora borealis.

Those living in the northern part of Norway have always maintained that they often hear sounds accompanying the northern lights. These sounds are described by most people as similar to the crackling of flames, while the Laplanders say it resembles the sound made by a reindeer running.

Several men of science have studied the matter, and one of them, Onlay Aabakken, has spent a long time at the Halde observatory in Finmarken. Mr. Aabakken thinks that it is very unlikely that any sound is to be heard from the northern lights. He maintains that the human senses are not to be relied on, especially regarding the phenomena of sight.

He considers that the idea of sound connected with the northern lights may result from the fact that those lights, in their most beautiful form, look like flames, and as people are accustomed to associate the crackling sound with flames, the rather uncritical observer of the blazing movements of the aurora borealis may extend to so near the earth's surface, that the sounds might perhaps be heard, caused either directly or indirectly by electric currents resulting from this attraction.
