MINIMUM WAGES NOT WHOLLY TO BLAME

SEATTLE, Wash., July 12.—It is a mistake to put too much emphasis on the so-called sex morality argument in discussing the question of minimum wages, was the advice given by Father Edwin V. O'Hara, chairman of the Industrial Welfare Commission of Oregon, addressing a sectional meeting of the National Conference of Charities and Correction.

"It is indeed fundamentally a moral issue," he said, "one of social justice. But the insinuation that under-paid girls are largely immoral, and that the increase in wages is going to make it possible for them to lead moral lives is false in fact, and dangerous in policy. Girls will not cooperate with reformers who begin by casting reflections on their virtue. It is more to the point to show that under-paid girls are preserving their virtue, but are living on two meals a day and are forced to practice other pitiable economies which undermine their health and unfit them for the

duties of wife and mother, and thus sap the foundation of society."

Large Sales Autos in Russia.
ST. PETERSBURG, Russia.—The fourth international automobile exhibition, held recently in St. Petersburg met with great success.

This year the attendance and sales far exceeded expectation, and credit is due to the organizers for the manner in which the stands were arranged. The exhibition remained open for two weeks, and more than 200 cars were disposed of during that time in addition to which, of course, many orders for later delivery were given.

Whilst the exhibition was in progress, Herr Christian the well known aviator, arrived from Brussels, having driven direct by motor car in three days, the actual time spent on the road being only 61 hours. The exhibition was opened by the Dowager Empress, who showed keen interest in the cars, and visited every stand.

Owes Much to Athletics.
EASTBOURNE, Eng.—Lord Willington, the governor of Bombay, Lord Brassey said, owed in a considerable degree his success in life to cricket and horse-riding, lawn tennis and other games.

It appears that Lord Willington, when lord in waiting, was a favorite partner with the king in the game of lawn tennis.

Butter Exports of Victoria, Aus.
MELBOURNE, Vic., Aus.—During the week ending May 8, 3,973 boxes of butter weighing 102 tons, were inspected in Victoria. Of these 3,408 boxes were of butter in bulk, weighing seven tons; and 274 were of butter in tins weighing 10 tons.

The butter inspected was for export to ports beyond the commonwealth, 3,167 boxes of which 909 were of salted and 2,258 of unsalted butter, being for export to the United Kingdom; 512 for export to South Africa; and 294 for export to eastern and other ports.

During the same week the actual exports of butter to the United Kingdom totalled 133 3-4 tons; to South Africa 26 1-4 tons; and to eastern and other ports, 10 tons. The total value of the butter exported approximately was 17,850 pounds.

DREDGE TO RESUME WORK ON THE SNAKE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—Lower waters on the Snake river will now make it possible for the United States engineers under Major Morrow to resume operations in the channel there and dredge and drill scows are to resume work next week. They have been tied up because of the high water for some time.

The United States steamer Umatilla is scheduled to leave Lewiston to resume her work on the Snake river Monday. She will operate in the channel at Five Mile rapids, where extensive work in clearing the channel of rocks is being done. Drill scow No. 2 will commence working at Reserve Island about the middle of next week, going from Lewiston where she has been tied up, to that point.

The resumption of work in the bad places in the channel of the Columbia river above Celilo will not take place for about six weeks, as that river is still too high for the drill scows to do effective work. The engineers are handicapped in the work on both the upper Columbia and Snake rivers during the high and extreme low water periods, when it is difficult for the steamers and drill scows to work.

The steamer Wallowa is now out of commission at Celilo and it is expected that work will begin on her new hull early next week, as all of the material is now on the ground and ship carpenters will be sent up there Monday to begin the work. The present engines and dredging machinery will be taken from the old hull and installed in the new one as soon as it is completed.

Burns' Early Editions Sold.
EDINBURGH, Scotland.—The selected portion of the books of G. W. Hill, Glasgow, recently sold, contained some interesting copies of Robert Burns.

The first or Kilmarnock edition, 1786, "Poems Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect," by Robert Burns went for 140 pounds. The volume is slightly soiled and the margins and corners are repaired. The book is bound in crushed crimson morocco. The Huth copy which was perfect, and in the original boards, fetched 730 pounds, and the impression in the Alloway museum cost 1000 pounds.

The first Edinburgh edition of the "Poems," 1787, made 5 pounds, 10s., and the "Century Edition" 5 pounds. It will interest owners of the Edinburgh edition of R. L. Stevenson's "Life, Letters, Bibliography, and Stevensoniana," 1894-1903, to learn that a set of this work fetched 61 pounds.

Utensils Mended Readily With Assistance of Reeds.

Every housewife should learn something of the handling of reeds, for she can apply the knowledge to many every-day services, such as mending a broken border on a waste basket, weaving a new handle for an old basket or replacing a broken ball on a favorite Chinese teapot. Half a pound of number two reed at a cost of about 20 cents will save many times its cost in making damaged utensils useful again, says the Youth's Companion.

To make a ball or handle for the Chinese teapot, cut six lengths of flexible number two reed at least six inches longer than the old handle of the teapot. Soak them for a few minutes to make them pliable. Thrust one end of the group of reeds through the china loop on the teapot from the outside, so that the short ends point toward the lid. Draw the reeds through for about three inches, and bend the short ends gently up against the long ends. Do not attempt to make a sharp angle where the reeds go through the china loop, for if you do, the stems may snap.

Now divide your reeds into three groups and keeping each short end pressed against its own long end, begin an ordinary braid. That incorporates them into the braid so that they will not pull out.

Continue braiding rather loosely after you have worked the short ends in, until the braid is long enough to make a suitable handle. Pass the loose ends through the china loop on the opposite side of the cover. Since you cannot braid in the short ends on that side, work them back into the braid one by one. If you use care not to bend them abruptly, you will have no difficulty in pushing them in and out through the braid until the ends are used up. When you have worked them all neatly into the braid, cut off the projecting ends with the scissors.

PETITIONS FILED FOR 8-HOUR DAY THROUGHOUT STATE
SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 12.—Petitions for a universal eight hour statute were filed today in every county of the state under the initiative law. More than 50,000 signatures to the petitions were secured by the socialist party.

Queensland Dairies Increase.
BRISBANE, Q., Aus.—The dairying industry is making rapid progress in the Kingaroy district of Queensland, some 15 new names having been registered as suppliers of cream during the past few months.

Permanent Rabbi Method Advised
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—Presiding at the sessions of the Central conference of American Rabbis, Rabbi Samuel Schulman of New York recommended the election of rabbis by their congregations for life. He also urged that the constitution be amended so as not to prohibit the reelection of a conference president after a second term.

Rabbi Schulman declared against the organization of sectional conferences and called for a strict observance of the Jewish Sabbath.

UMATILLA PLANS TO BE RESUMED SOON

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Secretary of the Interior Lane authorized the reclamation service to proceed with plans for the West Umatilla project. He laid down certain conditions which were elaborated for the guidance of all concerned.

This, the sixth unit, being the 10,000-acre unit of the west extension, is authorized on condition that the Oregon Land & Water company will agree to a modification of its decree to the effect that these lands may be sold in farm units to be fixed by the secretary of the interior, not exceeding those fixed for Northern Pacific lands in the same project; the purchasers to file water right applications and charges per acre to be fixed by the secretary of the interior.

The result follows several years of hard work by Senator Chamberlain, who has been an active and aggressive worker for the extension whenever there was prospect that anything could be done. There has also been hearty co-operation between him and Senator Lane in furthering the project ever since the latter's arrival in Washington. The secretary's action today is very pleasing to all friends of reclamation here, who looked with some discouragement on the turn of affairs immediately following the change of administration, especially on account of Secretary Fisher's failure to advance the project to a settlement before his retirement.

Under the terms of the contract, the Northern Pacific practically agrees to permit the secretary of the interior to fix the price at which its lands shall be made part of the project. The Oregon Land & Water company lands are in private ownership, and the company's assent to the secretary's order will complete the essentials necessary for work to begin.

English Schools in for More Aid.
LONDON.—At the annual dinner of the Association of Municipal Corporations held in London recently J. A. Pease, M. P., president of the board of education, referred to the inadequate amount of money which was received by the municipalities from the national exchequer.

Though he was not present, he said, to make any announcement as to the government education schemes, yet he would state that they intended to give more power to the education committees, as well as monetary assistance, to enable them to go on with that good work which had been so ably performed during the last 10 years. Imperial grants in aid were helpful when properly administered and controlled, since they encouraged expenditure which was likely to benefit the country in the future. Though it was right that there should be central control of large amounts of money, which came out of the pockets of ratepayers, yet local distribution must be left in the hands of the local management.

HEARING SOON ON THE EQUAL SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON July 12.—Representatives of the National Suffrage association have been promised a hearing before the house rules committee December 1 on the suffrage amendment to the constitution.
