MISSING PORTLAND COUPLE MAY BE DEAD

WOODLAND, Wn. July 14.—Discovery of the bandana handkerchief worn by Mrs. Clinton Smith around her hat during the ascent of Mt. St. Helens, and of one of the alpenstocks she and Mr. Smith were climbing with, has caused the searchers on the southeast slope of St. Helens to cease expecting to find anything except possibly the corpses of these two young Portlanders. The handkerchief lay on the top of the snow; the alpenstock was frozen into the snow.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have probably fallen into one of the crevasses met with on this slope of St. Helens. When they became lost last Sunday the snow storm was so severe it was impossible to see more than perhaps 50 feet. They were unable to discern Randolph Carroll and Miss Bertie Monroe, who had slipped and rolled some distance down the mountain. Where they went after that or what they did will not be known, except by conjecture, if the bodies are recovered. If they reached the base of the mountain and turned the wrong way, they would run into Toutle canyon, whence they would have small chance of emerging. A boy was lost three or four years ago on this slope of the mountain and never has been found.

Fifty persons, of whom eight or ten are from Portland, are members of searching parties. It is impossible to keep up to date on the search because the telephone line from Woodland runs only about 25 miles toward the mountain. Cougar, the settlement nearest the base of the mountain is 10 miles farther and it is about eight miles from Cougar to St. Helens proper.

Smith, who is patiently waiting at the home of her son and daughter-in-law at 646 East Sixtieth street north, for news. WANT MORE TOURISTS TO TRAVEL ITALY

ROME, July 14.—With the return today of the two Italian delegates to the recent International Tourists Congress at Amsterdam, steps have at once been taken by the Italian government to offer such inducements as will increase the number of American tourists and especially American automobile tourists in Italy. At the present time an average of 3,000 Americans tour Italy in their own automobiles every year. The first step taken by the government as a result of the recent decisions reached at Amsterdam, will be the establishment in New York of an Italian information office which will be at the disposition of all American automobilists desiring to tour Italy. More favorable tariff regulations are to be made for those who bring their machines here, an international certificate of identification issued, and a general improvement of roads to be undertaken.

NEW CURRENCY LAW

NOW HOLDS ATTENTION

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The "gentleman's agreement" not to transact any important business in the house, expired today. It was the expectation of leaders that from now on the lower house of the national legislature will be busy with the proposed new currency law.

20 NATIONS ADOPT BRYAN'S PEACE PLAN

WASHINGTON, July 14.—A proposal to maintain the status quo as to military and naval preparations among disputants during the period of investigation of international difficulties constitutes the third and final proposal in Secretary Bryan's peace plan. In making that portion of the proposal public Secretary Bryan said that the obligation to maintain the status quo would not be obligatory in the event of danger to either of the two contracting parties from a third party.

The proposal which he submitted to the 20 nations which have accepted his plan in principle as well as to the other nineteen nations not yet heard from, is as follows:

Text of Plan.
"This government is prepared to consider the question of maintaining the status quo as to military and naval preparations during the period of investigation, if the contracting nation desires to include this, and this government suggests tentatively that the parties agree that there shall be no change in the military and naval program during the period of investigation unless danger to one of the contracting parties from a third party compels a change in said program, in which case the party feeling itself menaced by a third power shall confidentially communicate the matter in writing to the other contracting party and it shall thereupon be released from the obligation not to change its military or naval program and this release on the other contracting parties. This protects each party from the other in the ordinary cases and yet provides freedom of action in emergencies."

Net Curtains.

ATTEMPT TO POISON FAMILY DISCOVERED

BAKER, Ore., July 14.—Sheriff Rand and his deputies are still working to discover the perpetrators of the attempted poisoning of the Bumgarner family. It is quite likely that the party whom they strongly suspicion will be taken into custody, as they have located him. The officers are reticent to say whom they suspect in the case, but from the fact that the strychnine used was purchased at a local drug store, their deductions are well grounded.

When Mrs. John Bumgarner, who lives in South Baker, went to the pump, she noticed a piece of white paper in the spout. Upon closed investigation, she discovered the entire wrapping, labelled poison. Some unknown person had placed a pound of strychnine in the pipe in such a way that it would be forced into the pall as water was taken from the pump. That attempted murder of the whole family was planned is conclusive. Mrs. Bumgarner was recently granted a divorce from her husband, who is now on parole from the county jail, having been convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Statistics Show in Italy That Nearly 45 Per Cent Criminals From Country.

ROME, July 14.—The "back to the farm" movement in Italy, especially as far as women are concerned, was given a bad set-back today when the government's criminal statistics were announced. They show that during the past year nearly forty-five per cent of the criminality among women was among those following agricultural pursuits.
