## LAWS AGAINST CHINESE MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

Residents of Panama Will Come Under Ban—Will Legislate Chinese Out of There.

PANAMA, July 16.—The Chinese situation which has arisen in this republic rivals the Japanese question of California and is quite likely to involve the United States more or less seriously before it is settled. This is the belief today of Panama government officials.

New laws, directed against the Chinese residents of Panama, recently passed, together with official decrees issued by President Perras, will practically legislate the Chinese out of this section of Central America, a spot where they have been steadily growing in numbers for many years. Failing to get any satisfaction from the Panamanian government the Chinese Republic has appealed to Washington for help and holds that the United States must see that the Chinese residents of Panama are given commercial protection.

The new laws come pretty close to taxing everything and anything a Chinaman in Panama does. The Chinese merchants claim that they pay nearly 70 per cent of the import customs duties of the country, yet, under the new law, their chamber of commerce here is to be taxed \$1,000 in gold a month which will drive it out of existence.

The social and religious organizations are heavily taxed. The Chinese stores are restricted as to the class of goods they may sell, the members of the race are required to register frequently—and pay a fee each time—and other restrictions are placed almost upon their every move.

The Chinese claim that this is in direct violation of the Panamanian constitution which guarantees equal rights to the citizens of all nations. They also charge that when American Minister Dodge, acting on instructions from Washington, appealed to the Panama government he was promised that the laws would be made less drastic, but the matter was then allowed to rest.

The laws of Panama do not permit of a test of the constitutionality of any new law unless the president and his cabinet disagree on that law. There has been no disagreement on the Chinese situation.

The Chinese of Panama and Central America are a thrifty, industrious lot. They never mix up in any of the political affairs of the nations and their dollars have done much to put many of these nations on a firmer financial footing. The credit of the Chinese merchants of Panama ranks very high with the wholesalers of the United States from whom they buy heavily.

## ANNIVERSARY OF THE COCKTAIL

American Drink Seventy-eight Years Old Today—How It Came Into Use Here.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—This is the anniversary of the American cocktail, that well known ante-prandial concoction being in its seventy-eighth year. It was born in a rustic tavern on the edge of Washington, and here is the way the story of its birth goes:

One fine old southern gentleman, John A. Hopkins, of Fairfax, Va., journeyed over to Bladensburg, Md., on July 15, 1836, to fight a duel and there by satisfy a long-standing grudge with an enemy. The sword of his enemy pricked him severely and Hopkins becoming weak and faint, was taken to the Palo Alto Inn, where Jack Henderson, the jovial inn-keeper was called upon to minister to his wants.

On the spur of the moment Henderson invented the cocktail. It was his conception of what a real "bracer" ought to be. Its high success in bringing Hopkins "back" convinced some of the habitués of the Palo Alto that their good host had invented some drink, and though none of them was injured, they demanded some of the excellent beverage. Enough for all was made and they named it the cocktail.

Secretary Redfield will thoroughly familiarize himself with the fur and sealing industries both of which are under the jurisdiction of his department. The secretary will do his traveling by water on one of the Pacific coast revenue cutters. Secretary Redfield expects to return to the east by way of Chicago about the middle of August.

## SHATTERS TRIPLE GOOSE EGG; VICTORY CLEAN CUT

Score 4 to 1 Tells Story of Game at Round-up Park Yesterday in Which the Walla Walla Bears Go Down to Defeat—Berger in Form Pitches a Great Game.

Let whistles blow and bells ring out. Sound 'em loud and long. Let voices raise in glad praise. Let lips burst forth in song. On with the dance, forget the grouch. To all the world proclaim The joyous news, "We did not lose. The Bucks have won a game."

Yes it's a fact. Pendleton shattered the triple goose-egg that has stood opposite her name for a week and broke into the win column. The victory was clean-cut, decisive, complete, a four to one affair and that which makes it seem like watermelon to a starving darky is the fact that the defeated bunch represented our ancient and hereditary foe of the two Wallas.

It was the most satisfactory game the fans have yet witnessed this year. Though the line-up of the Bears was slightly disarranged owing to the absence of Harmon and Lundstrum, the Bucks too were shifted about. It was Pendleton's time to win and that's all there was to it. The psychology of the situation all favored such an end. Fresh from a series of six defeats, the Terrymen knew that it was up to them to do something or be forever damned. On the other hand the Bears had taken their last four games from the strong Yakima team and were now pitted against a club going bad and which had always been easy pickings for them.

However that may be, the Bucks played winning ball and they earned their victory with their clubs. But the one man of all to whom the biggest slice of credit belongs is Joe Berger, the Joe Berger as we like to know him. His control was perfect and his spitters were breaking wickedly. The Bears simply couldn't locate their course of travel and sixteen times they took three swings and went back to the bench. Twice he allowed clean hits and twice others were scratched by the infield, and that was all. Brown and his men were pretty lucky to escape a shutout.

That lonesome score of theirs came in the first frame. Johnson, first-up, managed to scratch a safe one through sort and then, after he had stolen second and Childers and Davis had both breezed, Martini connected for a beautiful drive to right, sending Johnnie across the rubber.

It was in the second and third innings that the offerings of Welch looked fat to the Bucks. With one down in the second, Manager McKune himself started things by a terrific drive to center for three bags. King followed with a beautiful single over second and it was good for two. When Kelly, playing center, allowed the ball to slide his mitt. Another drive in the same territory by Augustus sent King over and Augie took the second bag on the throw to the plate. Berger thereupon, laid his willow against the pill for a three-ply drive through center, chasing in one more run. The signal for the squeeze was given but Rader failed to connect and Berger was caught at the plate.

In the third, Lodell, first up, got life when his grounder to Brown took a bad hop. Reid and Haworth both struck out but Naughton's bunt hit put men on second and first. Again McKune swatted the spheroid into safe territory and Lodell sailed into harbor. A double steal was started but Davis' pretty peg and Johnson's pretty tag caught Naughton at the plate.

That ended the scoring for the game for Welch staided down and retired the Bucks in one, two, three order until the eighth when two hits put men on bases only to die there. Walla Walla's best chance to break into the run column again came in the ninth when Davis, first up, laid a hot one toward McKune which the manager knocked down but could not handle cleanly. As Martini stepped to the plate, Berger tried to slip a strike across on him but instead sent the ball against the Italian's broadside. This put two on with none down. Sheely breezed but the runners advanced a base on Kelly's infield out. Big Bear Brown was up but Berger had his number and whiffed him for the third time.
