By dint of inquiry the jilted girl ascertained that the girl who had stolen her lover's affections was Miss Henrietta Aiken of Bridgeport, Ohio. Just across the river from this city. Securing permission from her parents, Miss McIntyre had her hair cut off, and donning one of her brother's suits she visited Bridgeport and met Miss Aiken.

It was a case of love at first sight on the part of the Bridgeport girl, Miss McIntyre, masquerading as

Lawrence Dessing, was a devoted lover and every night found "Lawrence" at the home of Miss Aiken. FISH WILL CAUSE PROSECUTION

Game Warden Orat Watching Ditches to See That They Are Screened.

BAKER, Ore., July 18.—Prosecution of ranchers who have failed to put in screens in their irrigation ditches along Pine creek, will be started August 1, according to Game Warden Charles B. Orat. Many of the trout which were placed in that stream last year are reported as running down the ditches owing to improper protection.

Reports have come to the game warden that many fishermen are catching trout less than three inches in length and it is the intention of the

official to prosecute all cases that come to his notice.

SPANISH FIGHT SIX DAYS WITH MOORS

Sixty Killed and 150 Wounded in One Battle With Tribesmen.

TETUAN, Morocco, July 18.—Fighting has been continuous in this vicinity for the last six days. A column of 12,000 Spanish troops met a fierce reception from the Moors. After fighting all day and burning a few of the natives' huts, they returned to their original positions, having lost sixty killed and 150 wounded.

The hostile tribes are increasing in strength and activity, and are not giving any rest to the fifteen thousand Spanish troops stationed here.

CHUCK WAGON DINNER WILL BE A FEATURE

LAS ANIMAS, Colorado, July 18.—About seven hundred motorcyclists from states east of Colorado will be entertained at a chuck wagon dinner here tonight. The motorcyclists represent the Southern and Short Grass tours to Denver where the national convention and race meet of the Federation of American Motorcyclists will be held from July 23 to 26. The first party started from Indianapolis and was joined by the Hutchinson, Kan., cyclists at that city. The tourists will leave tomorrow for Canyon City and northern points.

SONG BIRD STIRS LOVE 'CROSS SEA

Pretty Singer's Picture in Newspaper Awakens Rejected Sailor in Distant Land.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—"Mr. and Mrs. Walter M. Kendall" were names tucked in among other plain Americans on the cabin list of the steamship Sierra, which sailed for Hawaii. But this brace of names spelled Romance to those who happened to know how Kendall won his bride. When Kendall arrived from the islands a few weeks ago he was a bachelor.

The Kendall romance began on Pike's Peak five years ago. He and Marie Elizabeth Smith, daughter of Harry Wayne Smith of Denver, happened to be in a party that had gone to the summit to see the sunset. Kendall, who had gone from Memphis to Denver to make his fortune, did not see much of the sunset. All the world grew dark for him when Miss Smith refused him. She would not take him seriously. She laughed at his drawing protestations of love. But something about the man and the place had struck home in her girlish heart.

BAKER FOOTBALL STAR TO O. A. C.

Leslie Finch Will Join Squad—Played With Baker High and Considered Fast Man.

BAKER, Ore., July 18.—Leslie Finch, a Baker high school football star and a graduate of the local institution this spring, left for Corvallis with Dr. Stewart, head coach of the football team of the Oregon Agricultural College. MUST MUZZLE ALL THE DOGS

La Grande Takes Action Following Reports of Deaths From Bites in Portland.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 18.—Muzzles must be put on dogs in this city at certain times of the year and this week happens to be one of these times. Profiting by the experiences in Portland where two men have died within a week the city council last evening passed an ordinance with the emergency clause attached that puts muzzles on every canine found running at large on the streets or alleys. The pound master is the chief factotum in the enforcement of this ordinance and the penalty is heavy. The ordinance becomes effective as soon as signed by the mayor and is posted and because of the importance of the case it was suggested by Councilman Halsten that the law be posted in various sections of the city to save the populace from hunting out the stray trees and bulletin boards where the laws usually are introduced to the people.

It was first suggested that the dates include May 1 to October 1, but a compromise was struck resulting in June 15 to September 15 as the muzzle days.

MILL WORKING NIGHT AND DAY

Oregon Lumber Co. Trying to Catch Up on Work and Has 40 Extra Men Busy.

BAKER, Ore., July 18.—In order to make up lost time the Oregon Lumber company's planer and box factory are now running night and day, employing 40 extra men. The company was handling the unfinished orders for the Baker White Pine plant at the bottom of the fire. Its own engine then broke down during the rush. The two accidents threw the work back so far that night and day shifts had to be employed to catch up. They will be on for some time.

SPECIAL CLASSES OPENED FOR BACKWARD CHILDREN

LYNN, Mass., July 18.—Despairing parents had a great burden lifted from their shoulders today and a number of youngsters were plunged into gloom when the school department assumed much of the responsibility of the kiddies and opened special classes for pupils who do not learn readily and for those who are prone to prank more and study less during the winter school term. Twelve classes with as many teachers were opened today.
