ASSOCIATION OF FOREST USERS MAY PARTICIPATE IN THE AFFAIRS OF THE FOREST ADMINISTRATION

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(Special)—To give settlers and other local users a larger voice in national forest administration, Secretary of Agriculture Houston has just promulgated a new regulation which goes into effect at once, providing a means by which the forest service may systematically co-operate with duly organized associations of such users.

Any association whose members include a majority of the local residents making use of the national forests may get together and select a committee, to meet with the local forest officers. This committee will be recognized in an advisory capacity in settling questions which may arise between the forest service and the public in the use of the forests.

The exact wording of the regulation is: "Wherever any association whose membership includes a majority of the local residents using a national forest or portion thereof, for like purposes, shall select a committee, an agreement on the part of which shall be binding upon the association, such committee, upon application to the

district forester, may be recognized in an advisory capacity on behalf of the association, and shall be entitled to receive notice of proposed action and have an opportunity to be heard by the local forest officers in reference to any proposed changes likely to materially effect the use or interest in the forest or portion thereof enjoyed by such permittees. The general principles of recognition and responsibility governing co-operation with live stock associations are herewith extended, so far as they are applicable, to the other regular lines of business conducted on the national forests."

The object of this regulation is to extend what may be called home participation in national forest management. It is recognized that the best use of the forests in the interest of the general welfare means the promotion of local welfare, and that the forests must be handled with careful consideration for all local interests involved. It is recognized also that public confidence in the spirit of fairness with which individual citizens are treated is essential, and that local participation in the settlement of many

questions is the best possible safeguard against arbitrary or unwise decisions by local forest officers.

Co-operation is Sought.

In other words, it is desired to prevent any local feeling that a western user in contact with the national forest administrative system is up against a far-away bureau at Washington, represented on the ground by a forest officer who can do as he chooses and against whose actions it is impossible to make effective protest. In the case of the grazing regulations a method of co-operation between the forest service and users of the forest ranges has been developed which is said to have done away completely with any such feeling. Cattle and sheep growers' associations not only assist in the settlement of disputes concerning individual privileges but also join in the formation of plans for the best use of local ranges and through their national associations are given an opportunity to be heard before regulations which affect their industry as a whole are adopted. The local associations insure attention to complaints of unfair action which are found to be justified, while on the other hand they automatically dispose of many cases of complaints that are found, when all the facts are considered, not well grounded.

It is the announced policy of the department to favor the greatest good to the greatest number, and the local user over others. With the help of the advisory boards now provided for many of the problems affecting individuals which the application of such

a policy involves can be settled by submitting them to what is practically the organized public sentiment of their own neighbors. On the other hand the organization can initiate questions and bring them to the attention of the forest service, backed by the voice of the majority or those who are dependent upon the forest industries.

Acts as Clearing House.

Already several associations besides those composed of stockmen are co-operating with the forest service, though there was no provision for their official recognition before the new ruling of the secretary went into effect. One of the pioneers was the Malad Forest Users' association, composed of men who reside in or near the Pocatello forest which lies on the border of Utah and Idaho. The advisory board of this association has acted as a clearing house for complaints and a medium through which mutually advantageous understandings might be reached. It is said to have saved its members and the forest service much trouble, embarrassment, and even litigation.

SHERIDAN PLANS ON REBUILDING

Town Practically Destroyed by Fire is Working Together to Make a New City.

SHERIDAN, Ore., July 22.—A remarkable exhibition of indomitable spirit is on display in Sheridan, where last Friday night damage of from \$300,000 to \$225,000 was done by a fire that cleaned the business section of the north side of the Yamhill river.

This morning several concrete buildings are under way and nearly everyone is doing business again. The new main street is to be between 50 and 60 feet wide; the old one was narrow and rather a drawback to the town. Everyone is pulling with his neighbor. Before the \$80,000 paving contract was let recently, there was a bitter division over the issue. The fire has brought the factions into one camp. The kind of paving and the contract price may still meet some disapproval, but the improvement is to proceed.

WARSHIPS USED FOR HOSPITALS

Cast-off Fighters Will Be Floating Homes for Sufferers from Tuberculosis.

ROME, July 22.—By an order formally announced today by the minister of Marine, Italy, solves the problem of what to do with discarded battleships, and what to do with the entire navy, should world-wide disarmament ever come. As fast as the warships become too antiquated for modern naval use, they will hereafter be given to the National Society for the Care of Tubercular Children of Italy and its colonies.

The society plans to refit the war vessels into hospitals and give them permanent anchorage not only about the coast of Italy, but off the coast in whatever part of the world Italian colonies are to be found. Others will be used as cruising hospitals for those of the invalids who need such treatment.

The action today of the Italian government in giving its consent is the result of a propaganda to that end begun at the International congress of the navy use, they will hereafter be

MIRRORS AT ROAD-CROSSINGS.

(Scientific American.)

Mirrors at road crossings for the use of warning automobiles are commencing to be used in England, it is stated, and the results are very good. They are being put in places where the crossings are especially dangerous, and the use of large mirrors allows the driver to see the reflection of cars which are coming in other directions. The method will probably be extended in the future, as it is likely to avoid many accidents and will be well worth the small cost of putting in. Another use for mirrors is upon heavy motor wagons, where the driver can not hear the signals of automobiles back of him so as to have him take the right hand side of the road to allow them to pass, for the noise of the power wagon often prevents the horn from being heard. It is proposed to fit the power wagons with small mirrors showing the back of the road, but were this to be made obligatory the mirrors might be imposed upon the usual automobile cars as well, and this would give rise to some objections from their owners.

WORLD'S ARMIES USE RAISE COST

GHENT, Belgium.—Considerable apprehension is experienced at present in the Belgian shoe industry, owing to the marked advance in the price of leather. Ox-hide has increased from 0.50 franc to 1.75 francs, and it is believed that prices will continue to advance.

It appears that this increase in leather quotations is not due to any abnormal conditions, but simply to the fact that the supply of skins shows little or no increase, while the demand

for leather is augmenting, new uses being continually discovered for this material, in spite of the efforts made by chemists to find some suitable substitute.

Another factor contributing to the advance in the price of leather is to be found in the enormous increase in the military establishments of the leading European powers, leather forming an important element of military equipment, such as footwear, knapsacks, belts, gaiters, caps, harness and trappings. The Belgian ministry of war recently made proposals for bids for leather goods amounting to 2,300,000 francs. The bids for the different lots were all far above the maximum prices prevailing hitherto, which for certain classes of articles no bids were submitted, thus showing the penury of the leather market in Belgium.

BRITISH FLEET PLAYS AT WAR

Big Battleships of the King Engage in Practice—to Try to Protest the Coast.

LONDON, July 22.—A declaration of war was wireless the Admiralty today, and from midnight 41 great battleships, 39 heavy cruisers, 22 light cruisers, 13 minelayers, 137 torpedo-boat destroyers, 20 torpedo boats and 42 submarines will give battle off the British coast.

The Germans have nothing to do with the conflict, for the "war" is merely the annual British naval maneuvers, and Admiral Sir George Callaghan, commander-in-chief of the home fleet will try to protect the coasts against the attack of his very good friend, Admiral Sir John Jellicoe, Sir Alexander Bethell and Archibald Moore.

The plan of battle is being kept secret by the Admiralty, but it is understood that Jellicoe has orders to try and land a strong force of marines on the east coast and it is up to Callaghan to prevent his doing so. Particular interest attaches to the work of the submarine and destroyer flotillas, which, reinforced by three hydro-aeroplanes, will test the defense of Rosyth, the Humber, Harwich, the Thames, Dover and Portsmouth.

Admiral of the Fleet Sir William H. May is umpire-in-chief and it is reported in naval circles that he and the opposing admirals have put their feet down stringly against interference from headquarters. Although no details were made public, it leaked out that during last year's maneuvers First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill and his advisers at the Admiralty tried to direct the fleets by wireless from London and got them into such awful tangles that a real enemy could have knocked them to pieces with ease.

CHINESE ARE SMUGGLED IN

Dangerous Passes in Rocky Mountains are Being Used to Get Chinks Through.

EDMONTON, Alta., July 22.—Dangerous passes in the Rocky mountains are being used to smuggle Chinese from the province of British Columbia into the states of Washington, Idaho and Montana, according to A. T. Lunney, connected with the immigration department of the state of Washington, who was in Edmonton of official business a few days ago. These passes, he said, are wild and unfrequented and offer every facility for smugglers to outwit the customs officials. He added that Chinese are taken in automobiles and landed within walking distance of a remote railway station on the American side at a certain price per head. The traffic was flourishing a few years ago, he continued, but was finally broken up. Now, however, the smugglers appear to have found a new means of continuing their work, and as a result many orientals are coming into the states.

THE ONLY PERFECT BABY.

In the August Woman's Home Companion the campaign for "Better Babies" is further reported. The "Better Babies" movement is a movement toward the improvement of children by means of baby shows where babies are judged according to their physical condition rather than according to their beauty. Hundreds of these shows are being held in the United States this year, and in each case the children are judged precisely as livestock is judged—according to a strict score card prepared by eminent physicians. Of course the most important part of these shows is the opportunity they afford for distributing among mothers practical scientific suggestions for the care of children. This is being done with thoroughness and great success.

In a report in the August Woman's Home Companion entitled, "Better Babies in Cities," there is an account of two successful contests organized and managed by women of Knoxville, Tenn., and Des Moines, Iowa. Following is an extract from the report of the Knoxville show:

"The final feature proved truly dramatic. First, the physicians had found a perfect baby, Sidney June Chastain, aged twenty-five months, son of a successful young business man and a mother who springs from fine Georgia stock, an ideal American boy. When the youngster was pronounced perfect half a dozen medical

men took him in hand and put him through a second and more rigid examination. But there was no shaking that first verdict. Sidney June Chastain had scored the maximum possible on the Better Babies Score-Card, one thousand points, one hundred per cent.

"It was hard for physicians and committee members to keep the secret, but the feat was accomplished, and when the announcement was made in connection with the prize award, applause shook the building. Sidney and his proud but astonished parents were asked to come to the platform so that the audience could look the one hundred per cent baby over. The little lad received not only the first cash prize in his class but two silver mugs, one presented by the Woman's Anti-Tuberculosis League, the other by the Woman's Home Companion, in recognition of the fact that Sidney was the first child to reach the standards of weights and measurements set in the Better Babies Standard Score-Card."

TO MEET DEFICIT, A SPECIAL TAX IS NEEDED

DENVER, Colo., July 22.—To meet the threatened deficit in the city's finances, three license ordinances went into effect here today. They provide annual taxes upon dealers in meat, hucksters and peddlers, and dealers in cigarettes. The present tax on cigarettes is \$50 a year. It probably will be raised to \$200. From \$75,000 to \$100,000 is expected from these new taxes.
