

# WHEAT MARKETS

CHICAGO, July 26.—Sentiment was bearish in the wheat market all day. Closing figures were 1-8c to 1-1-8c a bushel lower than Thursday with the principal pressure in the July. The market opened with initial figures for July down 1-2c, while the two options each lost a fraction.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the steadiness in Canadian offers and the expectations of light world's shipments this week helped to establish a steady feeling and offerings were light. Later some pressure developed on reports of better weather in Europe and the eastness in Paris. July was generally liquidated.

The local market is practically the only one in the country that is showing strength at this time. The offerings of swine of late have been very small, while the demand has been unusually good. Portland is so far above other markets of the country for hogs and prospects for the future are so good, that it is likely that values here will continue at a record for some time.

 There is a scarcity of real good cattle on the local market. The total run for the day was small, and none of this was of top quality. A number of loads came in from a valley point but none of them were tops.

Top steers are still quoted as high as \$8.50, but it takes exceptional quality to bring above \$8.25@8.35.

 Only a small amount of sheep came forward to the local yards during the day. The trend of the state is uniformly weak, even lambs being subject to depression. With recent sales not beyond \$5.50, it would take something extra in quality to bring even this figure.

The entire sheep trade here has been permeated with weakness for so long that it has become chronic. An improved feeling has been noted for some days at points east of the Rockies, but seemingly the trade here has been getting more than its requirements, therefore can see nothing but extreme bearishness in values.

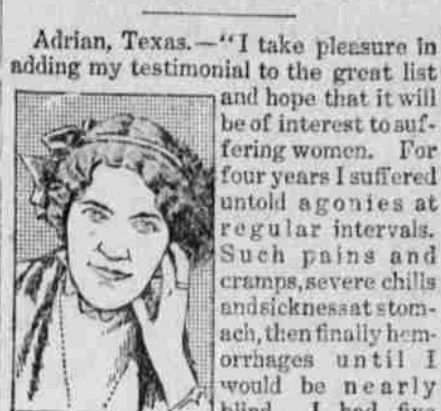
