Baking Hint.

When baking tea cakes or muffins, should you not have quite enough batter to fill the last pan, put a little water in the empty places in muffin pans. It will save burning the pans. —Los Angeles Express.

Bed Borders.

Those who have traveled about rural England will recall the well known universal custom of placing bricks or stones on edge wherever a border of flowers is placed next to a grass plot. This is an excellent preventive of trouble, says the Cleveland Plain Dealer, since it is effective in keeping the grass from running over the bed, and it also prevents it from rooting under. While not pretty in themselves, a neat line of bricks or stones, so placed, gives a well-cared-for appearance which is very attractive to the borders.

How Grandma Made a Rose Jar.

Gather a quantity of roses on fine, dry days. Remove the petals till you have obtained about half a peck of them. Take a large china or glass bowl and put a handful of table salt at the bottom, then a handful of rose petals, more salt and so on till all the petals are used, scattering salt on top. Let this remain five days, stirring and turning it twice a day. Add three ounces of coarsely powdered allspice and two ounces of bruised cinnamon. This forms the stock. Allow it to remain a week, turning it daily from bottom to top. Then put into the permanent jar or bowl one ounce of allspice and, adding the stock layer by layer, sprinkle with the following mixture: One ounce of cloves, one ounce of cinnamon, two nutmegs powdered, some ginger root, half an ounce of anise seed, half a pound of freshly dried lavender flower, two ounces of powdered orris root and any or the following essential oils: Jessamine, rose, lavender, lemon verbena or rosemary. —Philadelphia Times.

Will Wear Longer.

To insure better wear from Russian shoes wash off with pure Castile soap and when nearly dry rub lightly and slowly with cheese cloth. —Boot and Shoe Recorder.

Card Cases of Silk Remnants.

Very pretty card cases can be made of bits of silk and can thus be fashioned to match or harmonize with the gown worn. Any one handy with water colors could make a very handsome looking case by painting some very simple Japanese scene or a spray of cherry blossoms or wisteria blooms on it, says the New Orleans Picayune.

Gray silk lends itself to the painting

and a card case of gray lined with pink silk, with cherry blossoms as a decoration, would be very lovely.

A gray silk lined with green having a spray of wisteria would also be an effective combination. The leaves and stems should be painted dark green, and the blossoms lavender.

Instead of painting with water colors the designs can be embroidered, and if the embroidery were carefully done the card case would be beautiful. A piece of canvas may be used as an interlining to give the cases the necessary stiffness, or they may be held stiff by means of a piece of stiff white or gray cardboard fitted into each pocket. The case is made in one long strip, which is divided into four sections. The two last divisions are smaller, as they are turned up to form the pockets.

KILLS JAPANESE AND ESCAPES.

Fatal Altercation Among Railway Employees at Othello.

OTHELLO, Wash., July 29.—In an altercation between Japanese employed on the Milwaukee railroad M. Kishimura was killed and N. Opara wounded. Murato, who did the shooting, is at large, but officers expect to apprehend him.

Murato was discharged by Roundhouse Foreman O. C. Finley and had been drinking heavily. It is thought he blamed the two Japanese for his discharge. Opara, who is not seriously wounded, has been employed in the Milwaukee shops here ever since the terminals were established.

SAYS COMPANY NOT IN SUITS

Manager Stoddard Lumber Co. of Baker Makes Statement of Timber Cases.

BAKER, Ore., July 30.—Joseph Stoddard, manager of the Stoddard Lumber company in this city, denies that his company is in any way connected with the suits which were brought in the federal court in Portland against the Hewitt Land company to recover 25 timber claims in Baker county, wherein it is alleged the Stoddard Lumber company provided the money for the entrymen.

In an interview Mr. Stoddard said that his company never had any connection with Mr. Hewitt. "At one time," said Mr. Stoddard, "my brother, J. B. Stoddard, now of La Grande, was associated with Mr. Hewitt in a small saw mill in Sumpter. About ten years ago Lyman Bell, son-in-law of Mr. Hewitt, was active in the Sumpter country securing timber claims, the money being furnished by Mr. Hewitt. At that time my brother had a sawmill in Sumpter in which Hewitt had an interest. For some reason my brother suspended the mill and moved to La Grande. He is in no way connected with the Stoddard Lumber company. I can conceive of no other way that our name should be connected with the suits than that he is a brother of ours and that they have assumed that he is interested in the Stoddard Lumber company.

ROSSLAND MEN FACE DEATH.

ROSSLAND, B. C., July 30.—Rossland residents are much concerned over the fate of Bernard McDonald and Charles Blesel, former Rossland mine managers, who have been made prisoners at Chihuahua, Mexico, and threatened with execution. McDonald was formerly managing director of the Lerol mine and Blesel was office manager for the Consolidated company at Rossland. He is now manager of the Delores mines owned by the Mines Company of America, of which W. H. Aldridge is vice president. Blesel's home is in El Paso, Texas.

Buffalo Bill's Wild West and Pawnee Bill's Far East Will Exhibit in Pendleton Saturday.

Since its last visit here the exhibition has been broadened in scope and presents an almost entirely new menu of the "Far East."

There is a series of scenes and episodes, lifted bodily from lands that have furnished excitement sufficient for a thousand and one "Arabian Nights."
