PENDLETON WINS 11 INNING GAME

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 30.—When Pendleton got through teasing the Bears yesterday, just before the sun went down, and the first day of the round-up was closing, the fans were disappointed to leave Micki Shader the goat, for he pitched a great game and with better support in both fielding and hitting, would have won hands down.

The Buckaroos present a better appearance on the field this season than any time heretofore this season. They played the game from the going, taking the lead by timely hitting after two were down in the eighth. A little speedier base running on the part of Varian would have won for them in the ninth, but he was caught at the plate.

The feature of the game was the spectacular catch by Augustus of Shader's scratch hit over Peterson's head. It was the most wonderful catch ever made in Sportsman park and brought a howl of applause for the speedy little Buckaroo shortstop. Peterson became confused in his judgment and the ball seemed about to drop safe, when Augustus appeared in a few inches from the ground with his gloved hand twisted backwards, and while on the dead run. The play probably saved a score for Johnson was on second and Harmon was coming in up.

The game started off with big league pep and both pitchers worked like steam engines with perfect machines behind them for a time. The many errors finally chalked up does not mean the game was loose and uninteresting. It was one of the most exciting of the season and both teams played good ball in spite of the appearance of the score. The errors made resulted in but one or two runs, the brilliant fielding retrieving the side in the field.

In the sixth, the Bears apparently

signed up the game when they sent two men across the plate. Harmon went out, Haworth to Lodell. Childers hit, but was thrown out at second on Davis' grounder to Peterson. Martini then poled the horsehide over the fence, the third time in the last few days and the seventeenth time this season.

There was nothing doing in the seventh, but in the eighth the Buckaroos donned their war paint and savagely fought their way across the frontier. Varian lead off with a two-bagger and the next two men were easy outs. Then Reed hit, Peterson doubled and Augustus hit, which coupled with Harmon's costly error of one of these hits, sent three men across the pan.

The Bears tied up the game in the eighth on two-baggers by Martini and Sheely after two were down and then came the titanic struggle with both pitchers working strong and all players settling down for the fight of a month.

There was nothing doing in the ninth, although Varian should have scored on Haworth's two bagger which went to the fence in deep right field, but he was caught at the plate, the ball being relapsed from Johnson to Harmon to Brown.

The tenth was a blank and in the eleventh the balloon went up again. Augustus lead off with a hit and after Osborne flew out to Sheely, took second and third on Naughton's gift of first, Childers making an error. Then Lodell hit a long sacrifice fly, scoring Augustus. Naughton came in later on Varian's fourth hit of the game. The box score:

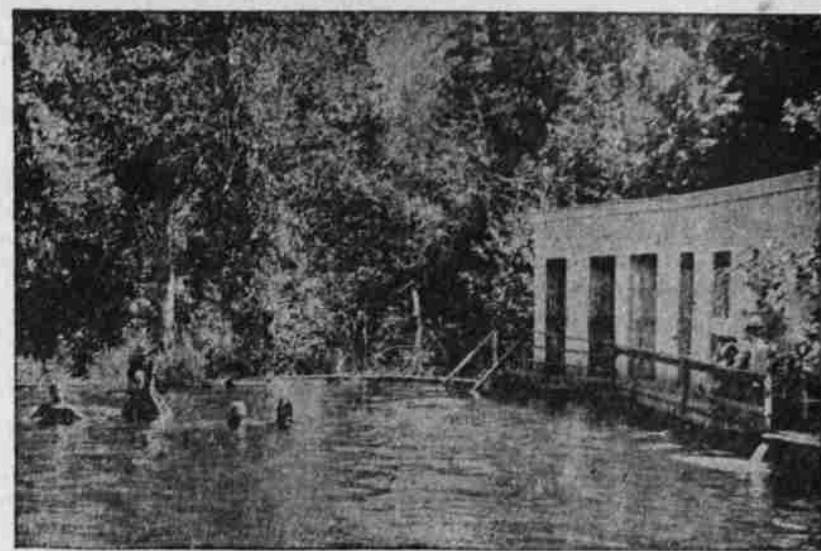
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LA GRANDE MAN WINS THE RACE

Motorcycle Endurance Contest from Baker Is Exciting—Pendleton Man Is Third.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 30.—Flashing by Walker of Pendleton, on the outskirts of La Grande after having been second in place for miles, Tracey Hollister of La Grande, dashed across the finish line on a 4 horse power Flying Merkel a winning by two minutes in the motorcycle endurance race from La Grande to Baker.

It was a sensational race and brought the immense audience in the grandstand to its feet with shouts of joy for the Pendleton entry had maintained a tenacious lead into Hot Lake and was expected to win. Both men, who were leaders after leaving Union on the going trip, were materially delayed between Hot Lake and La Grande and Walker's delay was so serious that he was forced down to third best running time, Olson of Ontario, making a marvelous race of it and pulling in second. Sleg of Baker, missed third best time by a fraction of a minute and made the fourth racer to finish with six minutes of each other in so long a race. Hollister's wonderful performance was made all the greater by reason of the fact that he was riding the smallest powered machine in the batch of eleven starters. Several men were bruised up but no serious injury incurred, and several machines are in the hospital for expensive repairs, one machine especially, that ridden by Howard Geddes, of La Grande, being badly done up.

LA GRANDE FIRE SET IS BELIEF

Evidence Points to Incendiarism—Total Loss to Lumber Yard Will be \$420,000.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 30.—Late yesterday afternoon the fire losses were approximated officially by the Palmer Lumber company officials. They were found to be as follows: Lumber losses, 25,000,000 feet, value \$875,000; loss to yards, cars, rails, etc., \$45,000. Total loss from fire, \$420,000. The plant was practically fully insured.

True American business industry and thrift is reflected in the way that the George Palmer Lumber company will proceed to replenish the lumber yards destroyed Sunday night in the biggest fire La Grande has ever had. The company officials are hastening the repairs that were under way on the mill when the fire occurred, and just as soon as possible the mill will be set running.

The company office torn to pieces somewhat on the night of the fire has been restored to its usual appearance and desks and records put back in place as nearly the same as before the fire as possible. Except that the watchman who discovered the fire re-avers that the

shots he heard just before the fire broke out were fired in close proximity to him, there have been no developments in the origin of the mill fire. The watchman plainly saw the flashes of two shots near him, and the feeling has become general that incendiarism was to blame.

WORKMAN UNDER AUTO LIGHTS PIPE, TOSSES THE MATCH INTO GASOLINE

TACOMA, Wash., July 30.—Because he smoked a pipe, while repairing an automobile, Gus Johnson, 43 years old, an employee of the Kentucky Liquor company, is dead from terrible burns which he received by the explosion of gasoline that followed. Johnson, who was working beneath the machine, lighted his pipe and tossed the burning match aside. It landed in a pool of gasoline, which ignited oil dripping from the automobile. Before he could crawl from under the machine it was a mass of flames. There was a terrific roar as the gasoline tank of the car exploded throwing Johnson 20 feet.

The fire department extinguished the fire before it spread to other combustible matter near at hand.
