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Woman and Her Varied Interests

Tried Recipes.

Cod, Italian Style—Put a medium sized fish into a saucepan with a clove of garlic, a bay leaf, one or two sprigs of thyme, a small lump of butter, two or three cloves and salt and pepper. Dredge in a little flour gently until the fish is cooked, then cover the fish with milk. Boil, remove and drain. Put in with the cooking stock a few boiled button onions and boil quickly for 10 minutes. Sprinkle some grated cheese on the bottom of a deep dish, put the cod on it, place the onions and some fried slippers of bread around it and strain the sauce over. Cover the top with grated cheese and bake for 15 minutes in a brisk oven. Serve on the same dish. —Montreal Star.

Beets in Cream Sauce—Wash the beets, but do not break the skin, or cut off the roots, as this would let out the color; cook in boiling water until the skin will slip off when pressed; drop into cold water and slip the skin off as rapidly as possible, so as not to have the beets cold when ready to use. Cut into small bits and cover

with a white sauce made after the usual rule, set the dish containing them in a pan of boiling water for a few minutes, then serve with a seasoning of pepper and salt.—Commoner.

Shrimp a la Bechamel—Cook three tablespoonfuls of butter with one half tablespoonful of finely chopped onion five minutes, stirring constantly to prevent onion from burning. Add three tablespoonfuls of flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, three fourths cupful each of highly seasoned chicken stock and milk. Bring to the boiling point and let boil two minutes. Add one and one half cupfuls of shrimps, broken in pieces, and, when thoroughly heated, the yolks of two eggs slightly beaten. Season with salt and paprika.

Sultana Sticks—Cut two squares of unsweetened chocolate in pieces, put in a small saucepan and place in a larger saucepan containing boiling water, let stand on range until chocolate has melted. Mix one cupful of

sugar, one fourth cupful of melted butter, one egg, beaten just enough to blend yolk and white, melted chocolate, on half cupful of pastry flour (once sifted), one fourth cupful of English walnut meats, cut in pieces, and one fourth cupful of Sultana raisins, cut in pieces. Line a seven inch square tin with paraffin paper. Spread mixture evenly in pan, using a case knife. Bake in a slow oven. As soon as taken from oven turn onto a board, remove paraffin paper and cut cakes in strips three and one half inches by one inch.—Woman's Home Companion.

Shantung Coats.

Shantung silk is popular for outdoor coats, and is usually lined with nylon, says the New York Press. These coats are fascinating when trimmed with lace of deep ecru, or white or cream.

Mixed Pickles.

Two quarts of pickles of cucumbers, two quarts small onions, one large head celery, one head cauliflower, two carrots, four sweet peppers, cut up small. Put in salt brine over night. Next morning drain, scald with clear water, drain again. Heat half gallon vinegar then take three cupfuls sugar, two-thirds cupful flour, one-fourth pound powdered mustard, one-half ounce turmeric, one-half ounce curry powder, mix with cold vinegar to a paste, add to boiling vinegar, one chili pepper cut up. Salt to suit taste. Boil all 10 minutes.—Los Angeles Express.

SOCIALISM IS LOSING GROUND

Party in Germany Is Said to Be on Wane—Enthusiasm Is Slowly Dying Out.

BERLIN, July 31.—The social-democratic movement in Germany, the home of socialism, has, temporarily at least, reached the crest of its wave and is receding, according to the anti-socialistic press. There has been a decrease in the membership in some sections of Germany, sympathetic rather than marked. Socialist leaders themselves are raising the cry of "stagnation" in the party, which now numbers some 4,000,000 voters and has the largest representation of any party in the reichstag.

Is socialism on the wane? Reports from socialist meetings would tend to affirm this, but present signs may be but a temporary relaxation in the hitherto unceasing propaganda. At a recent meeting of the central organization, Herr Ernst, chairman, reported a falling off of 2010 male members but an increase of women members which partly offset the decrease. The treasurer made a strong appeal for funds. He told of falling revenues. He said that voluntary contributions to the "cause" which formerly came in freely, have ceased almost entirely.

"There are serious times ahead of us, comrades," he said. "We need not only members but money." On top of this, Herr Stadthagen, a member of the Diet and editor-in-chief of "Vorwarts," the central organ for the party, told of a decrease in the number of subscribers to that paper. "Today," he said, "we have to admit that a slight recession has taken place in our organization. It demands the minutest investigation and we must not forget self-criticism." Stadthagen declared that the recession was coincidental with the increasing "conservative tendency" in the party organ. He virtually confirmed rumors that serious differences have arisen among the leaders of the party of whose "iron discipline" so much has been written. The talk of a general political strike was severely denounced.

The youth of the country is the prize for which socialists and government are both battling. The government sees in it the check of the socialist movement and is going to extremes to keep the youth free from socialism until after service in the army. The socialists on the other hand see in the conversion of the young men the wedge they have long tried in vain to drive into the army. So far the government has had the advantage. It has appealed to the fondness which almost every boy has for military display. Field Marshal Von der Foltz has organized a "Boy Scout" movement and "Pathfinders," against which the socialists can make little headway.

"Good government is the greatest obstacle in and to democracy in and the republicanism of Germany," is the way a leading national democrat described another factor which he said tended to make the German people apathetic in politics.

MUSTACHE IS TO BE COMPULSORY STYLE IN BRITISH ARMY

LONDON, July 31.—British army circles and the general public don't know whether to laugh or become alarmed over the nearest approach to a strike the British army has experienced. The whole thing hinges on the question of a compulsory mustache for English army officers. Since the beginning of the nineteenth century British army officers have been compelled to wear mustaches, or at least such hair as could be cultivated on the upper lip. The king's regulations distinctly say "the chin and under lip shall be shaven, but not the upper lip. Whiskers of moderate length may be worn." Recently, however, society has set its face—not literally but figuratively—against whiskers. Including mustaches, and officers have been agitating for the right to shave. Many have openly defied the regulations and done so, an act that led to their appearance before the colonel. The original offense, of course, is counted purely as a technical one but it becomes rank insubordination after that. It could even be called mutiny. Easy going colonels have urged the war office that it is silly to punish officers for so slight a thing as shaving one's upper lip but Whitehall stands by red tape, and the red tape says there must be mustaches—so mustaches there will be. In the meantime, delinquents are pointing out that King George himself ignores the regulations by wearing a beard.

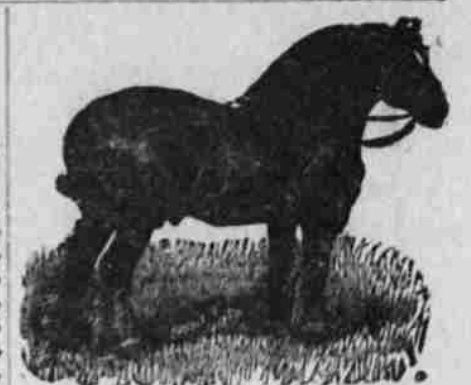

NEW JERSEY VOTERS CONSIDER BOND ISSUE

CAMDEN, N. J., July 31.—Taxpayers and citizens were given an opportunity today at a special town meeting to discuss a proposed bond issue of \$540,000 for the establishment here of a municipal plant. It is suggested that bonds worth \$140,000 be floated in October; \$100,000 in December; \$100,000 in February and similar amounts in April and June. The local lighting companies are strenuously opposing the plan. They are receiving the support of all other public service corporations in Camden.

IMPORTANCE OF MISSION STUDY CLASSES URGED

CAMDEN, N. J., July 31.—"Importance of Mission Study Classes" was the topic of the principal address today at the sessions of the annual Camden Camp. The Rev. Lawrence Correll, of Millville, N. J., was the speaker. He pointed out that the standard of work of missionaries in both home and foreign countries could be increased fifty per cent if the missionaries attend regular classes for from six months to one year previous to their taking up their duties. "Missionary Study Classes" were urged.
