BUCKS TAKE 3 STRAIGHT GAMES

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 1.—Hammering steadily at Shadler's offerings, the Buckaroos managed to make it three straight at Sportsman yesterday afternoon, the crippled condition of the Bear pitching staff being the reason. Welch and Shadler have been the only available men for this series so far and they are weakening fast. Unless some relief arrives today, Pendleton will be up with the league leaders and then look out for them, for Manager Lodell has a nicely working machine now, and a good pitching staff all in good condition.

Berger was in good form and held the bears in good shape throughout with the exception of the last inning, generally a farce affair when these two teams are struggling. One or the other of them always goes up in the air, because of the tension probably, and several runs result.

The Bucks kept right after Shadler from the start, sending a man across in the second, another in the fourth, two in the fifth and three in the seventh, while the Bears did their scoring in the fourth, fifth and ninth, the last two being largely the result of errors.

Lundstrum went in the box at the beginning of the eighth inning yesterday and did creditably, considering Fritz used to pitch ball in his old college days and took perfectly at home on the mound.

In the second inning Dean led off with a hit and was sacrificed to sec-

ond by Reed. Then after Peterson went out, Shadler to Shelly, Augustus delivered a hit, bringing in the run. Davis doubled in the first inning but no one could bring him in. In the second the Bucks pulled off a double play that stopped things suddenly. Peterson out-guessed Johnson, who was attempting to bunt and advance Lundstrum from first. Peterson came in on the run, caught the ball on the fly and doubled Lundstrum off first.

Augustus started the fourth with a hit and after being sent around on a fielder's choice, scored on Johnson's error off Naughton's fly.

In the fifth, Varian walked, Harworth filled out, Dean walked, Reed went out Shadler to Shelly and Peterson hit, scoring Varian. Peterson on first and Dean on third, worked the double steal, Dean scoring. It was the first time this play has been worked on Brown and Davis in many a moon, but both their throws were wild.

In the fifth, Harmon knocked a home run with no one on bases.

The balloon went up in the seventh and the Bucks sent three men across, and it looked for a time that no one would ever get out. Varian, Harworth, Dean, Reed and Peterson all hit in a row and Beck made an error, all told, three men crossing the plate.

That tickle ninth inning came near duplicating Wednesday's performance of tying the score after the game had been apparently lost. Johnson started the rally with a single and Beck followed suit. Brown hit a sacrifice fly, scoring Johnson and Beck came in a moment later on Naughton's error of Martin's easy grounder. Harmon was an easy out, however. Peterson being able to keep his head, and finally Childers struck out.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 1.—By pinning a deadly head lock on Milo Tupper, Ed Warner last night won his match from the Montana wrestler after one of the most exciting wrestling bouts pulled off in the city for a long time. A small crowd was on hand to see the match. Warner took the first fall in seven minutes with a half Nelson and wrist lock. Tupper won the second fall handily in five minutes by fastening a head scissors and wrist lock on Warner that made the Walla Walla wrestler gasp for breath. With each credited with a fall the men went into the third round with a vengeance and some pretty wrestling was the result. Warner took the aggressive and fastened hold after hold on the Montana wrestler which was easily broken. Warner finally fastened a deadly head lock that brought Tupper's shoulders to the mat after six minutes of wrestling. Warner weighed 175 pounds and Tupper stripped at 185.

PIPE LINE IN BAKER WILL BE REPAIRED SOON

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 1.—City Commissioner Henry, in his report to the board at the meeting in regard to the condition of the new syphon on the pipe line leading from the settling tank at the head of the new concrete line, stated that it was in such condition immediate extensive repairs will have to be made, including replacing the line entirely for a distance of 100 feet or more. The old line is so saddled and clamped in many places that no more can be put on, and a leak was repaired last week that was allowing about one-fifth of the supply to seep away. Mr. Henry says that it may be possible to repair the line in 15 or 20 hours, but possibly it may take two days. It will be necessary to turn off the city water supply in the meantime. Just when the work will be done has not yet been decided, but it will be in the near future.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—An anonymous letter appearing in the Standard declares that the English competitors in the Davis cup tennis matches were the better all-round players but the Americans won the trophy because McLaughlin had mastered and concentrated his play on a smashing service, in which any number of English players could have equally perfected themselves.

"Thus the cup was won," the letter continues, "by a trick, though a perfectly legitimate trick within the rules, which does not further the best interest of lawn tennis, and unless this smash service is barred, like the spot stroke in billiards, tennis is with in measurable distance of death."

It involves the mother of several children, who may soon be taken from her custody by the courts.
