CITY MAY SECURE A STOVE FACTORY

Directors of Commercial Club Receive Letter Stating Concern Wants Location.

Pendleton has a chance to secure a large stove factory providing it meets certain conditions. An offer from J. A. Burrichter of Prince Albert, Canada, reached the board of directors last night through the medium of the O.-W. R. & N. Co. and was referred to the committee on promotion and trade extension of which G. M. Rice is chairman.

In his letter, Mr. Burrichter states that he is a broker seeking a location for a stove factory. He is representing a number of Chicago business men who have purchased the machinery and are desirous of establishing a big institution for the manufacture of stoves and ranges and eventually of radiators.

The original plant, he states, will consist of eleven buildings the dimensions of which are as follows: 80x80, 20x80, 60x120, 20x40, 50x80, 40x60, 45x120, 20x20, 40x50, 25x40 and 40x50. The company will employ 75 men at the start and hopes to employ 250 men within 18 months and 500 men within three years, but will give no bond to employ any stipulated number of men on any stipulated date.

To secure this factory, a city would have to donate a site of 20 acres and subscribe \$75,000 secured by a first mortgage, 6 per cent bonds, and a trust deed for the entire plant. The bonds would mature over a period of ten years, commencing in the third year. The money must be forthcoming as follows: \$10,000 when the foundations are in, \$20,000 when the buildings are completed, \$20,000 when the machinery is installed, \$15,000 thirty days after the plant is in operation and \$10,000 thirty days thereafter.

Mr. Burrichter states that he has just located an iron and steel factory at Prince Albert.

WOMEN WOODCRAFT MEET IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—Fifty-nine delegates from the states west of the Rocky mountains representing the Pacific jurisdiction of the Order of Women of Woodcraft, gathered at Women of Woodcraft Hall for the sixth grand circle.

The final social event will be the ball to be given Saturday night, August 9. On the preceding night there will be a competitive drill between six or eight prominent drill teams in competition for the handsome silver trophy which for two consecutive times has been won by the Fresno, Cal. team from Aencia Lodge No. 13. This team will arrive in the city by boat and will make a strong effort to secure the cup as its permanent property, which it will be if the team wins this year.

CURRENCY BILL AND TARIFF BILL TO PASS

MAN IN HIS 80'S FISHES UP TO MORNING'S DEATH

JASPAR, Ore., Aug. 1.—John Morehouse, known to the countryside as "Uncle John," died at his home here aged 82 years, and was buried at Mt. Vernon cemetery. He leaves a wife, four sons and two daughters. In the 25 or more years he had lived here he made many friends. If late years he had devoted much time to fishing, pursuing his favorite pastime until the very morning of his death.

MINNESOTA'S NOSE.

How did the United States come to get that small corner of land which juts out from the extreme northern boundary of Minnesota? History of that little "nose" which sticks out into Canada from Minnesota and which constitutes the northernmost point of the United States is very interesting.

Under the treaty of 1783 boundary between the United States and British possessions was fixed. A certain point on the Lake of the Woods was mutually agreed to as one starting point, this being considered the headwaters of the St. Lawrence river and great Lakes system.

At that time it was not known whether this point was north or south of the forty-ninth parallel, but it was known to be close to it. The understanding was that from that point the boundary should go north or south to the forty-ninth parallel as the case might be.

Later and more accurate surveys showed that point was about twenty-five miles north of the forty-ninth parallel and so at this place the boundary makes a jog above the line.

Uncle Sam thus has a little piece of territory of about 160 square miles in extent north of the general boundary. And the joke of it is that any one has to go by water in order to reach this little piece of territory unless one want to go through Canada.—Pathfinder.
