CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—There was a
very quiet tone in the wheat trade yes-
terday. July was the only option showing
activity and it went into history
with a loss of 7-8c bushel from Wed-
nesday. Other options were un-
changed at the end of the day.

character but there was little de-
cided change at any point.
