Woman and Her Varied Interests

Freshening Organdie Bands.

I want to tell of a way of giving new life to the organdie bands which are used so much by ladies in mourning. Usually these bands are thrown away after one or two wearings as of no further use.

If one-quarter cupful of granulated sugar be dissolved in about two quarts of hot water and if the little collars and cuffs are then washed in this, shaken out and rolled in a clean dry cloth for about fifteen minutes and then ironed with a good hot iron they will be found to be as good as new.

Laces washed in this way will be found to have the same crispness as when new. No soap, no starch, or bluing should be used. The French do all their laces, etc., in this simple way.

Buttermilk Scopes.—Add to a pound of sifted flour a heaping teaspoonful of baking powder and a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt. Stir well to mix; then rub in with the tips of the fingers three ounces of butter

or part lard and part butter. Mix to a light paste with buttermilk and roll out quarter of an inch thick, cut in three cornered pieces and bake a nice brown.

Eggs en Cocotte.—This dish derives its name from the individual pot shaped dishes generally of brown and white enamel in which they are cooked. Butter the dishes well and line with a thin coating of minced ham or tongue and carefully break into each an egg, dusting with a very little paprika. Now place the dishes in a vessel of hot water and cook in the oven until the eggs are slightly set, basting each with a teaspoonful of melted butter. Serve as they are cooked in the correct cocotte dishes. Pour over each a tablespoonful of thick tomato puree.

WALLA WALLA IS WINNER, 8-2

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 2.—(Special).—Featured by four double plays, two for each infield; the steady pitching of Manager Wade's new hurler, Dudley, ex-coast leaguer; and the consistent stick work of the Bears yesterday's game broke the winning streak of the Buckaroos and the hoodoo's scalp is now tied to Cap Brown's belt. Score, Walla Walla 8, Pendleton 2.

Atmospheric conditions, almost the worst of the season at Sportsman took none of the ginger out of the players and the game progressed with a pep that is always pleasing to the fans, both infields working like Trojans throughout the game, with several spectacular plays being logged.

Daley was never in danger after the sixth inning, when the Bucks could have tied the score, had Haworth been a trifle speedier on the bases. After singling and stealing second, Haworth attempted to score on Dean's single between first and second, which went almost to the fence, but Johnson returned the ball in a magnificent throw and Brown had the runner out by two feet. Had the score been tied here Pendleton's offensive work might have improved, and another one of those agonizing extra inning games dished up for dinner.

Another if, and we will proceed with the story. The Bears three runs which broke up the game in the seventh and took the heart out of the Bucks would probably never been scored if Osborne had not attempted to strike out Sheely with such vim that he walked him with two down. Three clean hits followed that pass to first and three men tapped the plate. Dean went in to pitch in the 7th and held the Bears to one run.

The Bears went after the Bucks with big bore rifles from the start and never stalked around in the brush a bit about it. Finding the trail from the gong they hung to it like bloodhounds until the last man was out.

Harmon led off with a walk, was sacrificed to second by Childers and scored on Davis' pretty single over second.

Another run was scored in the second, Lundstrum hitting for two bases, taking third on fielder's choice of Johnson's error and scoring on Daley's timely single over third. Some debut at the bat.

There was nothing doing then until Daley's weak inning in the sixth, when after two down, three hits in a row sent one man across and came nearly tying the score with a second.

It was easy sailing for Daley after that, the big right-hander easing up and handling the situation in masterly style. His drop and cross-fire always did the work, and perfect control placed strikes over the pan at will. In the ninth, the Bucks had their death flurry, finding themselves cornered and about to die. A three-bagger and a single sent one man across, but the rally was not for long.

The Bear's other runs, came in the sixth and seventh innings, three each. In the sixth with two out, Sheely was passed to first and Lundstrum, Johnson and Brown hit, the first three scoring. In the seventh, Harmon hit one over the fence, Childers flew out to Naughton but Davis and Martini both connected for two bases, Sheely was hit by pitcher and Lundstrum singled, Davis, Marty and Harmon scoring. The side was finally retired by a double play, Johnson hitting a line drive to Augustus who caught Sheely off third.

In the eighth inning, the Bucks pulled another double. Brown hit and Daley sent a grounder to Peterson, who threw to Naughton to Lode.

The Bears two double plays occurred in the third and seventh innings, the last one being made by Sheely unassisted. Augustus had hit when Osborne hit a line drive to Sheely, who stepped on the bag ahead of Augustus.
