AMERICAN EXPLORER WILL WORK FARTHER NORTH; REMAINS TILL '15

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 4.—Harry V. Radford, the American explorer, who discovered a large herd of wild bison in the Great Slave lake district of the Hudson's Bay country, some time ago, sent a note through one of his breed guides to the outpost on Herschel Island last year, telling the factor in charge of the trading station that he intended to work further north and probably would remain in the country until 1915. He has adopted the dress of the Esquimos and will live with them the pattern part of his stay.

Howard Allen, head of two whaling outfits which go out from Herschel every year, who has passed the last four years on the Arctic coast, brought the foregoing news to Edmonton yesterday. This is the first authentic word received on the outside in several years from the explorer who has been in the north four years, making a special study of animal life.

"The half-breed guide laid in a stock of supplies at Herschel," Allen said. "He brought word that Radford would not need any more provisions until he was ready to take the homeward trail as he intended to stay with the Esquimos."

Secures Native Guides. "There was a report two years ago that Radford had lost his mind, also that the guides who accompanied him from Edmonton had deserted him close to the barren lands. The last part is true, but we were told that Radford had secured native guides and is now continuing his investigations."

Radford spent the winter of 1911-12 along the Trenton river, across the barren lands, after leaving Fort Resolution. J. Harding, factor for the Hudson's Bay company at the last named trading post, on Great Slave lake, brought news to Edmonton last September that Radford was alive and well at Trenton river, where he made investigations. The explorer was seen by fur-traders, who talked with him and carried his message to the outside world.

Radford, who is widely known in scientific circles, had as the object of his expedition to visit the home of the wood bison in the almost unknown region of northwestern Canada, west of the Slave river and north of the lower Peace river. This expedition started in 1909 and has included track surveys over many hundreds of miles, and furnished Radford the opportunity of closely studying the wood bison in its haunts, and of making the first recorded observations on this rare animal in life.

Eighteen specimens were seen by him during the first part of his exploration tour, and under a permit from the Canadian government one was killed by him. It weighed 2,402 pounds. Both the skin and skeleton were preserved. The skin was preserved.

sent by Radford to the provincial museum in Edmonton, while the skeleton was forwarded to the National Museum in Washington. The skeleton and the skull are fine specimens, and the skeleton is probably the only one of a wild bison in any museum.

The existence of this race of buffalo has been asserted by hunters and travelers in this portion of the great west, and many have been the opinions of naturalists as to the relations of this so-called wood buffalo to that of the plains. Until recently the subject has been confined to theory and hunters' stories.

Discovers Wood Buffalo. Dr. Cerritos Miller, curator of the department of mammals of the United States National museum, and one of the world's greatest authorities, says that the credit for establishing as a fact the existence of wood buffalo belongs to Samuel Nicholson Rhodes, a life member of the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia, who has collected museum specimens of natural history in every state of the Union, Canada, Mexico and South America.

In a paper prepared for the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences in 1897, Rhodes gave the result of his extended search through all literature touching on the subject, and also gave the result of his examinations of a specimen of the Canadian wood bison. This description convinced him, and most scientific men, that the wood bison and the American prairie bison are of different varieties.

The records of the department of mammals of the National museum show that Dr. William T. Hornaday, director of the New York zoological park, in his monograph on the American bison, written in 1887, while he was chief taxidermist of the National Museum at Washington, refused to assent to the claim that the wood bison belonged to a different race from the American prairie bison.

At that time Dr. Hornaday had never seen a wood bison, and, in the absence of facts based on personal observation, he contended there was not the slightest ground for believing that the wood buffalo is entitled to rank even as a variety of the bison Americanus. He believed at that time that the wood buffalo of Canada were nothing more than American prairie buffalo, which had changed their characteristics somewhat as a result of taking up their residence in a rugged and precipitous mountain region.

Only Wild Bison. Ernest Thompson Seton, who has lived much in the Canadian backwoods, and given close study to the Canadian mammals, took a position about the same time diametrically opposed to that of Hornaday. In a

paper he read to the Canadian Institute at Toronto, Seton said he had been told by Mignault of the Hudson's Bay company, who spent twelve years in the Great Slave Lake country, that the wood buffalo was a distinct species. At that time Seton insisted that, instead of the Canadian wood buffalo being descended from the American prairie buffalo, the plains buffalo was nothing more than an offshoot of the ancient wood buffalo stock which had exclusively inhabited this continent before the prairies as such ever existed.

These opinions by Hornaday and Seton were expressed nearly thirty years ago. It is only within the last fifteen years that scientists have recognized the wood buffalo as a different variety of bison. Experts believe that the buffalo discovered by Radford is probably the only herd of wild bison in the world.

WILL PROSECUTE FAKE LOCATORS THIS FALL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Prosecutions of land locators who have been steering settlers into claims that have proved worthless will be deferred until the October sitting of the United States grand jury, according to a statement of United District Attorney Reames this morning. All the evidence will be gathered in the meantime and indictments returned in a bunch.

Mr. Reames would not say how many of these locators will be liable to punishment, nor what law would be invoked. He and L. L. Sharp, special agent of the government land office, are working up the evidence together and expect to have a great mass of information to show how bonafide homeseekers were led on to pay fees with no possibility of establishing any rights to the lands selected for them.

\$900 TIP GOES BACK TO CHARLES GATES

Change from \$100 Dinner Amazes Waiter, and Minneapolis Cafe Sends Sum to Plunger's Son.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 5.—Charles G. Gates, millionaire son of the late John W. Gates, nearly caused the collapse of a negro waiter in the Rogers Hotel cafe last night.

Mr. Gates, who figured recently in another cafe episode in Minneapolis, was in the Rogers with friends. His dinner check amounted to about \$100.

Mr. Gates called the waiter, pulled out a roll of thousand-dollar bills, slipped off the top one and said: "Here, boy, keep the change for yourself."

"Why, Mistah Gates, did yo'-all know that was a thousand-dollar bill?" gasped the astonished negro.

Whereupon the Gates party left the cafe. The waiter reported the facts to the manager, turned \$900 over to him and the cafe mailed Mr. Gates a check for the amount.

Woman and Her Varied Interests

TRIED RECIPES.

Virginia Fritters.

Put a pint of water, into which has been stirred a teaspoonful of salt, over the fire and bring to a hard boil. Add a teaspoonful of butter, and without removing from the fire turn into the boiling water two cupfuls of sifted flour. Stir steadily until it has boiled three minutes. The flour will have absorbed all the water. Turn the paste into a bowl and set aside to cool. When cold stir into the paste the well beaten yolks of four eggs, and when these are well incorporated with the paste add the beaten whites. Drop by great spoonfuls into boiling fat (deep) and cook to delicate brown. Drain on a heated colander. Can be sifted over with powdered sugar if desired.

Almond Gingerbread.

Sift together three cupfuls of flour, one half teaspoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one fourth teaspoonful of cloves, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one half cupful of sugar. Dissolve a teaspoonful of soda in a tablespoonful of water and then beat thoroughly into one cupful of molasses until light and foamy. Beat two eggs until light and then beat into them one cupful of sour milk. Melt two rounding tablespoonfuls of butter (or one of butter and one of lard) and add to the eggs and sour milk with the rest of the ingredients. Beat the cake mixture thoroughly until of a smooth, glossy appearance, and then pour into a buttered pan and place in a moderate oven. When half done strew over the top almonds that have been blanched and cut lengthwise in strips. When done turn out on a cloth and then right side up on a platter. This should be served warm. A cupful of seeded raisins improves it.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

Escalloped Carrots.

Take small fine-grained carrots. To six carrots take two white onions. Boil them tender, changing the water once or twice, and having only just enough to keep them from burning. Do not scrape the carrots, they will retain flavor and color better, and do not cover the saucepan. Remove the onions when tender, and when the carrots are done peel them and slice thin. Butter a baking dish and put in a layer of carrots; sprinkle with salt and pepper and add bits of butter. When all the carrots are used, add a cup of milk mixed with a beaten egg and a pinch of salt. Cover the top with buttered crumbs, and bake until a nice brown, and the custard is set.

Ramekin Toast.

Mix with four tablespoonfuls grated or shaved cheese, two teaspoonfuls of dry mustard; half teaspoonful of salt, dash of white and dash of paprika pepper, two level tablespoonfuls butter rubbed smooth with a teaspoonful flower, and beaten yolks of four eggs. Mix all together and heat, spread on six slices buttered toast, and brown quickly in hot oven. The broiling over of your gas stove does the work quickly.—Washington Herald.

Needle Notes.

New knot stitch designs are quite picturesque in character. Two colonial figures dancing the minuet were depicted on a pillow. They were surrounded by twining floral sprays and baskets of flowers.

The darning stitch is still much used as a filled for motifs on guest towels.

Sprays of autumn leaves, done in rich colors are now used as a decoration for white linen dollies, edged with cluny. The effect is strikingly beautiful, as if the leaves had just fallen, accidentally upon the linen.—San Diego Union.

Corn Oysters.

A delicious way of making corn oysters is this: Grate the corn from the ear, and to a cupful of the pulp, add a well beaten egg and quarter of a cupful of flour; season well with salt and pepper. Drop by the spoonful into deep fat.—Newark News.

EUGENE AND MONROE LINE WILL SOON BE READY

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 5.—"The Portland, Eugene & Eastern will open its new line between Eugene and Monroe to traffic between August 29 and September 1, and one train a day each way between Eugene and Portland over the west side system will be run for the present," said Robert E. Strahorn, president of the P. E. & E., who spent last night in Eugene, making a trip of inspection over the new road yesterday afternoon.

"This is the first announcement I have made with reference to the time of opening the new road," continued Mr. Strahorn, "but the condition in which I have found the lines warrants the announcement. The work of ballasting the road is progressing rapidly and the first coat of gravel ballast will be completed by September 1 easily, and the road will be in fair condition for traffic."

President Strahorn said that steam trains will be run over a portion of the new Coos Bay road into the S. P. depot at Eugene but that when the road is electrified trains will stop at the corner of Eleventh and Williamette streets, near the heart of the

CHILD SWALLOWED COIN; MUST BE OPERATED UPON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Baby Ronald Grassens, 3 1-2 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Grassens, of 446 East Market street, was playing with a silver quarter given him by his mother one day six weeks ago. Baby-like he tried to swallow it. The coin wedged in his throat about half way down and has lodged there since.

The child will be put on the operating table at St. Vincent's hospital next Wednesday for what doctors say is an unusually rare operation, to remove the obstruction, which is now endangering its life.

For some time after the coin was swallowed the parents could not tell what was ailing their baby. His symptoms were peculiar. He could not eat any solid food, but took liquid nourishment without much difficulty. At times there were painful retchings.

The baby was put under the X-ray last Saturday by Dr. Alex. Robb, X-ray specialist, and the resulting negative showed clearly the cause of all the trouble and its position. The coin was in the oesophagus, the tube between the throat and stomach, about five inches below the throat and imbedded firmly against the spine. It had made a pocket for itself in the walls of the oesophagus. So tightly was it wedged that when the bronchoscope was used, the quarter was twice caught by instruments, but could not be removed.

It was decided that an operation was necessary to save the child's life, as in time an abscess would be certain to form about the coin.

In this operation it will be necessary to enter the chest cavity, pass the windpipe and make an incision in the oesophagus large enough through which to remove the coin.

The opening into the chest will be made through the lower part of the neck from the front. Physicians expect the operation to be entirely successful.

SWIMS ON AUTO TIRE AND ARRESTS CHINESE

Constable Shows Inhumanity When He Comes to River.

STOCKTON, Aug. 5.—Constable Roy Jones ingenuously accomplished the arrest of three Chinese opium smokers last night. Jones suspected that the dream stuff was being smoked in a Chinese colony in the Delta land, and he started out in his automobile at night after them. On arriving at Middle River he found that the Celestials were on an island. Jones pumped up an inner tube of one of his automobile tires, placed his clothing and weapon in an old tub, and using the inflated tire as a life-preserver, swam the 200 feet of intervening water, pushing the tub ahead. 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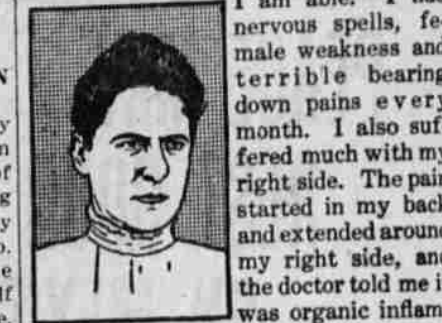
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
